3	OPENING REMARKS AND OBJECTIVES
4	CHAIRMAN POWERS: The meeting will now
5	come to order. This is the second day of that meeting
6	of the Advisory Committee on Reactor Safeguards
7	Subcommittee on Siting. I am Dana Powers, Chairman of
8	the Subcommittee. Members in attendance are Sam
9	Armijo, Michael Ryan. And we're told that Dennis will
10	join us. We also are joined at the table by our
11	consutlant John Flack.
12	The purpose of the meteing is to continue
13	our examination of the MOX fuel fabrication license
14	application and associated NRC safety evaluation
15	report. Again, the Subcomittee is in the business of
16	gathering information and licensing relative to issues
17	and facts to forumlate proposed positions and actions
18	as appropriate for deliberation by the full ACRS.
19	Neil Coleman is the designated federal
20	official for this meeting.
21	Let's see. We will close the meeting for
22	proprietary information shortly.
23	A transcript of the meeting is being kept.
24	And the portion of that transcript dealing with the
25	open portions of this meeting will be made available.
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5 It is requested, of course, that speakers first 1 2 identify themselves and speak with sufficient clarity 3 and volume so they can be readily heard. 4 I don't have any requests for making 5 statements from the public for this part of the And I don't have any opening comments to 6 meeting. make this morning. Do any of the other members have 7 8 comments they would like to make? 9 (No response.) 10 CHAIRMAN POWERS: We will proceed with the 11 meeting. And I think our first step will be to close 12 the meeting. (Whereupon, the foregoing matter went off 13 14 the record at 8:29 a.m. and reconvened in closed 15 session. Open session was reconvened at 4:52 p.m., as follows.) 16 17 16. SUBCOMMITTEE DELIBERATION 18 CHAIRMAN POWERS: Let's go on the public record now. We need to do two things. We need to 19 20 talk to them about what to present to the full 21 Committee. And we'll give you faint guidance on that 22 because I can't tell you very much what to do there, 23 but I'll do my best. And then we need to discuss 24 draft positions members think that should come forward 25 on this. **NEAL R. GROSS**

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1	MR. COLEMAN: Dr. Lyman, this is Neil
2	Coleman. I had promised to tie you into the meeting,
3	give you a chance to place some remarks on the record.
4	Sorry we missed you. We ran a little later than
5	according to the schedule. But feel free to send us a
6	letter. If you need additional details, you can
7	contact me at (301) 415-7656. Thank you.
8	CHAIRMAN POWERS: Okay. I think we can
9	MR. COLEMAN: We are in open session. We
10	are technically in open session here.
11	CHAIRMAN POWERS: We are not just
12	technically. We are officially in open session. The
13	schedule for the full Committee is two hours, of which
14	some substantial period of time has to be allowed for
15	a presentation, I mean, questions by the Committee.
16	I am ill disposed to give you much
17	guidance on this because it's not much time to present
18	all of this. It seems to me that if I were MOX
19	Services, that I would formulate a presentation that
20	said, "Here is what our facility will do," much like
21	you did at the beginning of this. But you might want
22	to be a little more elaborate on that because most of
23	the members of the current ACRS were not members of
24	the ACRS during the CAR. Okay?

And then I would in a fairly summary

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fashion say that in developing this facility, we have 1 2 addressed the questions posed by the ACRS at the CAR, maybe give a capsuled description of how you have 3 4 handled those things. But you just simply don't have 5 the time to go to the depth you did, but, for instance, you can certainly say, "Look, in the area, 6 we have gone beyond the Defense Nuclear Safety Board" 7 8 and you have this strategy, which leaves us an open 9 position that resolves questions that are raised in 10 DPO and things like that. And try to treat it in a fairly capsule fashion, hitting the high points of 11 12 what you talked about here, but it's going to have to be fairly truncated and whatnot. 13

14 For the staff, you need to explain what 15 you did in your review. And in general, your 16 presentations here have been just fine. I mean, they 17 have been lovely. But to the extent you can say, "Look, we certainly looked at the documentation, but 18 if you can give us some sense of the magnitude of the 19 additional work you did, what you were comparing 20 21 against," I think that helps the Committee understand 22 better how much you have done. You don't have to be 23 too maudlin about thousands and thousands of hours, 24 but you can say, "Okay. We certainly went into their 25 offices. We looked at the additional documentation on

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these items."

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And, again, hitting the high points of those things that we have covered today, perhaps reinforcing, you know, "We had these variety of questions that I am going to talk about especially --I mean, we viewed the whole damn thing, but here are the ones that I am going to talk to you about."

And Committee members can ask questions. And you can practically assure that the digital instrument system that Mr. Rahn discussed, he's going to get additional questions on it. I mean, he did a marvelous job there. Mike did a tremendous job on his presentations as well and whatnot.

I am going to try to hold down the discussions on the ISA as a regulatory entity, but I will fail miserably on that. But your objective is not to defend the fact that that is a regulation. Your objective is to say, "Here is what we've done."

Now for the members, we have two chores. The staff is asking for us to write a letter that comments on the quality of the review. The Commission is asking us, can this facility be built and operated with no undue risk to the public health and safety? Okay?

So we have a twofold job. I mean, our

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letter is going to go to the Commission. So we have to cover both aspects. So I will ask if members have any particular issues that they think should be addressed.

5 MEMBER BLEY: Framed in that vein, I think I have a few other comments, but I 6 probably not. think in that vein, I have been impressed with the 7 8 level of detail and the digging. there were some 9 things on fire, but I am pleased they're doing the 10 didn't know about when we had those things I 11 discussions they told us about later that I think will 12 address some of my concerns.

13 CHAIRMAN POWERS: John, did you have any 14 points?

15 MR. FLACK: Well, no. I mean, I think 16 that the approach they took, I mean, the ISA was very 17 impressive. The summary, of course, is very 18 impressive, thousands of pages of information there.

I think the four pillars and the strategies they used was really nice. I like the way they laid that out, you know, how they addressed these issues using these four pillars and the strategies.

I think the lessons learned from the French, I mean, that really made --

CHAIRMAN POWERS: That certainly helps.

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10 MR. FLACK: Yes. I think you can also 1 2 look at that as being supportive of the whole process. CHAIRMAN POWERS: My tendency is 3 Yes. 4 certainly to acknowledge that information comes from 5 the French as the knowledge base they have, but they still have to build a facility here and run it here. 6 There are differences. MR. FLACK: Right. 7 8 CHAIRMAN POWERS: They get information 9 that way, and they get lessons learned. But I don't 10 to portray this thing as a carbon copy of want 11 somebody else's facility. You carry a lot of baggage 12 when you do that and whatnot. MR. FLACK: Well, the red oil, I guess the 13 14 red oil thing, we'll have to close the meeting if they 15 want to get into details on that, but we're trying to keep the meeting open, I guess, the full Committee, at 16 17 that point. 18 CHAIRMAN POWERS: My tendency is, but if we get the questions that have to be answered in a 19 20 closed meeting, we can close the meeting. I mean, 21 there is just no question about that. But my tendency 22 -- I mean, I would gear my presentations for an open 23 meeting. 24 MR. 11 ask questions, will close it and do that 1 we 2 separately. 3 MR. FLACK: Yes. 4 CHAIRMAN POWERS: Sam? 5 MEMBER ARMIJO: Well, first of all, Ι 6 think there's been excellent work by the applicant and the staff on a very complex process and engineering 7 8 job. About the only place where I think there's a big 9 ticket safety issue that should be addressed, whether 10 it's in the regulations or not in the regulations, is 11 the issue of external fire of a large, deliberately 12 set fire by virtue of the aircraft impact. don't think anybody 13 And Ι builds а 14 facility with walls nine feet thick for the fun of it. 15 So somebody must have had in their minds protection 16 against something like an aircraft impact. That would 17 be a localized fire, massive fire, with very little 18 warning and assessment of the capability of the MOX facility to perform or shut itself down, protect its 19 20 people I think should be done. But other than that, 21 everything else within the process I think has been 22 covered very thoroughly. 23 MEMBER RYAN: I will add my thanks for 24 extremely well-prepared briefings by both the 25 applicant and the staff. 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productive two days. And we have covered an awful lot of ground. So thank you for that.

Let's see. A couple of things. I think if maybe the conversation about the waste was sharpened a little bit along the lines of the points we talked about so that handoff is a little bit clearer to the full Committee, it would be helpful. So I think that's one.

9 And I guess, just for my own interest, a few more sentences here on the radiation protection 10 11 program and how that's going to work would be helpful. 12 I am going to guess that, for the most part, external 13 exposure is not a huge hill to climb, but it really 14 boils down to the internal dosimetry program and led 15 by plutonium, which is hard to detect. And it's a If you do have an intake, do you 16 tough radionuclide. 17 even quantify it as a dose? So a little bit, just a 18 few lines on that, might be helpful to understand.

And if you want to just add that into your industrial safety discussion or something along those lines, that would be fine. And, again, I repeat my recommendation to think about the combination of fixed-area air samples, BZAs, and mobile CAMs and all that other stuff and how you would stay ahead of that tough-to-monitor situation.

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13 So thanks very much. I appreciate it. 2 And, again, my compliments on a wonderful two days. Well, certainly we have 3 CHAIRMAN POWERS: 4 progressed substantially since we did the construction 5 authorization. And certainly I think the approach to red oil is robust. And you have gone well beyond the 6 And I think that certainly addressed our 7 DNFSB. 8 questions. 9 You have a much more mechanistic treatment 10 of HAN, and his issues I think is well-founded. I am 11 still concerned а little bit about plutonium 12 precipitation in relation to that. I suspect that can be resolved by looking at some of your modeling. 13 14 And so maybe we can look at that report. 15 I know the staff reviewed it. And so if we could look at that, we could resolve that issue. 16 17 Criticality safety is pretty classic here. 18 It looks like it's followed pretty well, kind of And, to be honest with you, you have 19 expectations. 20 gone a little beyond what I expected because you're 21 not so heavily reliant on double contingency. You 22 have gotten more with your four-pillar approach. So I 23 think you are in good shape on that. 24 Fire analysis in the facility is certainly 25 treated and following industrial standards. 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5 The external fire, I think because you 6 have a good way to interrupt the system, that, in 7 fact, you can respond to external fires in a much more 8 deliberate fashion. I think at some point you've got 9 to lay that plan out. But I am not very concerned 10 about it.

11 Т do like what you done have on 12 interrupting services. And it's an interruption of your ability to transfer material across the fence 13 14 line. I'm concerned for the ACRS. So it does not 15 hurt to bring that up and talk, say some stuff about that because, I mean, it sounds like you've got that 16 17 worked out pretty well.

18 I'll add thought Again, Ι the presentations were vastly better than I anticipated 19 20 them to be and appreciated every bit of the amount of 21 effort, including the backup slides. I was glad you 22 included the backup slides. It helped a lot because, 23 I mean, you can read. Some people don't think the 24 ACRS members can read, but we can --

PARTICIPANT: If it's in big print.

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CHAIRMAN POWERS: -- if you don't mind us moving our lips when we're doing it. But it's been time well-spent. And I think everybody concerned, I think we've covered the material.

And all I can say is good luck in the Committee meeting because I can't tell you what to anticipate. I am just at a loss on what to predict. So bring your dancing shoes so you are agile and whatnot, but understand that most of the members are going to have very little exposure to it.

11 I mean, this is going to be the first time 12 they seen this. So in a choice, be more have informative than worrying so much about the details of 13 14 the regulations and whatnot like that, more strategic 15 in how you reviewed. Rather than the details of the 16 review, you know, a little higher level than we 17 covered here is how I would tend to bias myself. Ιf 18 people want to plunge into the details, I'm pretty 19 sure you can and whatnot.

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That's the best I can do for you.

21 MR. FLACK: Just a question on the details 22 is that, of course, if you have backup slides, it's 23 going to have to be some that are open to the public 24 and some that are closed to the public. So they're 25 going to have to --

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1	CHAIRMAN POWERS: Yes. We will have to
2	work that out in some way. And the best thing to do
3	is pass out what's open and allow if we have to go
4	into the details, we'll do that via words and stuff
5	like that. We can work that issue.
6	MR. CAMPBELL: I just have one question.
7	I guess the site was analyzed for aircraft crash.
8	But, as I understand, the comment was a deliberate
9	MEMBER ARMIJO: I am talking about the
10	fire from all of the I don't know the results of
11	your impact analysis on the building. I don't know if
12	that was done, but fully fueled, large aircraft has
13	the Pentagon fire. Is a fire located right up against
14	your building
15	MR. CAMPBELL: But you are talking like in
16	the area of a security assessments base.
17	MEMBER ARMIJO: In the area of where your
18	diesels were, will your people be
19	MR. CAMPBELL: If you had kind of like a
20	fully engulfing fire or something like that.
21	MEMBER ARMIJO: Yes. It's similar to what
22	the designers are doing on new plant designs. They
23	assess that. And, of course, they go into a lot of
24	detail.
25	CHAIRMAN POWERS: But it really is not
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17 something that we are writing about this time. 1 2 MR. CAMPBELL: Oh, that's right. I just 3 ___ 4 CHAIRMAN POWERS: We are writing on 10 CFR 5 70.64 and a couple of letters. MR. FLACK: But having said that, there is 6 actually a foot in part 50 under "Production Reactors" 7 8 because the reprocessing piece is really under 50. 9 We're looking at this under 70.
