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## Computational Benchmark for Estimated Reactivity Margin from Fission Products and Minor Actinides in BWR Burnup Credit

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#### ABSTRACT

This report proposes and documents a computational benchmark for the estimation of the additional reactivity margin available in spent nuclear fuel (SNF) from fission products and minor actinides in a burnup-credit storage/transport environment, relative to SNF compositions containing only the major actinides. The benchmark problem/configuration is a generic burnupcredit cask designed to hold 68 boiling water reactor (BWR) spent nuclear fuel assemblies. The purpose of this computational benchmark is to provide a reference configuration for the estimation of the additional reactivity margin for partial burnup credit (ISG-8) and document reference estimations of the additional reactivity margin as a function of initial enrichment, burnup, and cooling time. This benchmark model will also be used as the base case in future sensitivity studies, to be documented in a companion NUREG/CR. The geometry and material specifications are provided in sufficient detail to enable independent evaluations. Estimates of additional reactivity margin for this reference configuration may be compared to those of similar burnup-credit casks to provide an indication of the validity of design-specific estimates of fissionproduct margin. The reference solutions were generated with the SCALE 6.1 package. The SCALE depletion and criticality sequences have been extensively validated elsewhere for a variety of applications, including light water reactor fuel. Note that the reference solutions presented in this report are not directly or indirectly based on experimental results. Consequently, this computational benchmark cannot be used to satisfy the ANS 8.1, 8.24, and 8.27 requirements for validation of calculational methods and is not intended to be used to establish biases and bias uncertainties for burnup-credit analyses.

#### 1. INTRODUCTION

This report develops and documents a computational benchmark for the estimation of the additional reactivity margin available from fission products and minor actinides, relative to calculations based on major actinides only, in a boiling water reactor (BWR) burnup-credit storage/transport environment. Relevant reference configurations for baseline and comparative analyses are provided, similar to what was developed for pressurized water reactor (PWR) fuel in NUREG/CR-6747 [1]. Herein, the major actinides are consistent with those specified in NUREG/CR-6747 (i.e., <sup>234</sup>U, <sup>235</sup>U, <sup>238</sup>U, <sup>238</sup>Pu, <sup>239</sup>Pu, <sup>240</sup>Pu, <sup>241</sup>Pu, <sup>242</sup>Pu, and <sup>241</sup>Am). Although additional reactivity margin is primarily due to fission products, a few minor actinides (<sup>236</sup>U, <sup>237</sup>Np, and <sup>243</sup>Am) that have been identified as being relevant to burnup credit [2] have been included in this benchmark to provide a more complete assessment of the additional reactivity margin beyond the major actinides. The proposed benchmark problem was developed to be similar to current burnup-credit-style casks, including similar materials and dimensions. While preserving all of the important features, it approximates (or eliminates) nonessential details and proprietary information. The documentation of this computational benchmark includes all of the necessary geometric and material specifications to permit independent evaluations and sufficiently detailed reference solutions to enable meaningful comparisons. Select isotopic compositions are provided to facilitate comparisons. The reference solutions were generated with depletion (TRITON and ORIGEN-ARP) and criticality (STARBUCS and CSAS5) sequences of the SCALE 6.1 package [3] and the SCALE 238-group library based on ENDF/B-VII.0 nuclear data. It is important that the reader and potential users of this report understand that this is a computational benchmark, and as such, the reference solutions are based on calculations. Although the CSAS5 and TRITON sequences have been validated using laboratory critical experiments, commercial reactor criticals (CRCs), measured radiochemical assay data, and reactivity worth measurements with individual fission products important to burnup credit, the reference solutions provided herein are not directly or indirectly based on experimental results.

#### 1.1 PURPOSE

The purpose of this computational benchmark is to provide a reference configuration to help establish a method for the estimation of reactivity margin available from fission products and minor actinides, and document estimates of the additional reactivity margin as a function of initial enrichment, burnup, and cooling time. Estimates of the additional reactivity margin for this reference configuration may be compared to those of similar burnup-credit-style casks to provide an indication of the validity of design-specific estimates of the additional reactivity margin. Detailed geometry and material specifications are provided to enable independent estimations and comparisons. As reference solutions are provided in terms of differences in effective neutron multiplication factors ( $\Delta k$  values), benchmarking of depletion and criticality codes, individually, is not the intent. Comparison of calculated results to the reference solutions does not satisfy the ANSI/ANS 8.1 (Section 4.3 of Ref. 4), ANSI/ANS 8.24 (Section 6 of Ref. 5), and ANSI/ANS-8.27 (Section 5 of Ref. 6) requirements for validation of calculational methods. In particular, footnote 11 of ANSI/ANS 8.1 states that validation of a calculational method by comparing the results with those of another calculational method is unacceptable. Consequently, this computational benchmark is not intended to be used to establish biases for burnup-credit analyses.

The computational benchmark model described in this report is presented for use as a reference model for sensitivity study calculations to quantify potential impacts on the calculated

system  $k_{eff}$  values. Additional sensitivity studies, to be documented in a companion report, will explore the effects of varying reactor depletion parameters and burnup-credit analysis modeling approximations.

#### 1.2 BACKGROUND

In the past, some criticality safety analyses for commercial light-water reactor (LWR) spent fuel storage and transport canisters [7,8] have assumed the SNF to be fresh (unirradiated) fuel with uniform isotopic compositions corresponding to the maximum allowable enrichment. This "*fresh-fuel assumption*" generally provides a well-defined, bounding approach for the criticality safety analysis that eliminates concerns related to the fuel operating history, and thus considerably simplifies the safety analysis. However, because this assumption ignores the decrease in fuel reactivity due to irradiation, it is very conservative and can limit the SNF capacity for a given package volume.

The concept of taking credit for the reduction in reactivity due to fuel burnup is commonly referred to as *burnup credit*. The reduction in reactivity due to fuel burnup is caused by the change in concentration (net reduction) of fissile nuclides and the production of actinide and fission-product neutron absorbers. If criticality calculations are performed based on all fissile nuclides and a limited subset of absorber nuclides present in the burned fuel, the calculated neutron multiplication factor ( $k_{eff}$ ) is less than the calculated  $k_{eff}$  value using the fresh fuel assumption but remains conservative (i.e.,  $k_{eff}$  is overestimated), because some absorber nuclides are omitted. The typical approach for burnup credit in storage and transportation casks has been to qualify calculated isotopic predictions via validation against destructive assay measurements from SNF samples. Thus, utilization of nuclides in a safety analysis process has been primarily limited by the availability of measured assay data. An additional consideration has been the chemical characteristics (e.g., volatility) that could potentially allow the nuclide to escape the fuel region.

Numerous studies have been performed nationally and internationally to develop a detailed understanding of the issues and phenomena associated with PWR burnup credit. The findings from these studies have supported the allowance of burnup credit for PWR fuel in transportation and storage casks. Although some studies have been performed [9, 10, 11] to support burnup credit for BWR fuel, the issues and phenomena have not been addressed in a thorough and systematic manner for relevant dry cask storage and transport systems as has been done for PWR fuel. This has been due in part to the complexity in modeling and analysis of BWR SNF caused by radial and axial variations in fuel enrichment, extensive use of fuel rods that also contain  $Gd_2O_3$  as a burnable absorber, and significant axial moderator density variation due to a combination of two-phase flow and varying core flow. However, current conditions have caused the industry to consider burnup-credit applications for BWR SNF. This report is part of a larger effort to establish the requisite technical basis for allowance of burnup credit for BWR fuel in storage and transportation casks. The computational benchmark defined in this report provides a framework for future studies into the issues associated with implementation of burnup credit for BWR fuel.

#### 1.3 REGULATORY GUIDANCE

The NRC issued Interim Staff Guidance 8 (ISG-8), Revision 0 [12] "Limited Burnup Credit" in May 1999, providing the first allowance of burnup credit for PWR fuel. Based on technical work performed at ORNL and elsewhere, ISG-8 has undergone two revisions, which have eliminated or lessened a number of the restrictions present in ISG-8, Revision 0. However, ISG-8 is specific to PWR fuel in transportation and storage casks, and no such similar guidance permitting burnup credit for BWR fuel in storage and transport casks has been developed. The regulatory standard review plans for dry cask storage [7] and transport [8] do not allow credit for BWR fuel burnup or fixed burnable absorbers. Relevant excerpts from NUREG-1617 include the following: "For BWR fuel assemblies, NRC staff does not currently allow any credit for burnup of the fissile material or increase in actinide or fission product poisons during irradiation; therefore, the enrichment should be that of the un-irradiated fuel" and "because of differences in net reactivity due to depletion of fissile material and burnable poisons, no credit should be taken for burnable poisons in the fuel."

#### 2. BENCHMARK SPECIFICATION

To provide a reference burnup-credit-style cask configuration that is not constrained by unnecessary detail or proprietary information, a generic 68 BWR-assembly burnup-credit cask design was developed. This generic cask design is proposed as a reference configuration to normalize analyses and estimations of the additional reactivity margin available from fission product and minor actinide nuclides. A physical description of the generic burnup-credit (GBC) cask, referred to herein as the GBC-68 cask, is provided in this section. Reference fuel assembly dimensions, corresponding to a 10×10 BWR fuel assembly design, are also provided in this section.

#### 2.1 GBC-68 CASK SPECIFICATION

The primary motivation for burnup credit is to increase storage and transportation cask capacities for a constant canister volume. A variety of BWR dry-storage casks are available from different vendors with significant variation in capacity (44 to 89 BWR fuel assemblies). They also vary in dimensionality and incorporate different attributes to account for design objectives. However, a common feature is the use of neutron absorber panels between fuel assembly basket cells. A basic space optimization study was conducted by Bahney and Doering [13] to evaluate assembly capacity versus amount of free volume space. Based on this assessment, 68-assembly and the 89-assembly capacity configurations had the least amount of space wasted, 24.5% and 21.6%, respectively. From a criticality perspective, having 68 assemblies or 89 assemblies represented will have little impact on the neutron leakage rate; consequently, the smaller 68-capacity configuration was selected for the generic cask design. The physical dimensions for the generic cask design are provided in Table 1 with material compositions provided in Table 2.

#### 2.2 BWR FUEL ASSEMBLY SPECIFICATIONS

BWR fuel assembly lattices have considerable variability. BWRs have used a variety of array configurations including  $6 \times 6$ ,  $7 \times 7$ ,  $8 \times 8$ ,  $9 \times 9$ , and  $10 \times 10$ , as well as a quad design with an internal "water cross" feature. Within each of these different lattice configurations there are other design features, including differences in numbers and placement of water rods, numbers and placement of gadolinium fuel rods,  $Gd_2O_3$  content of gadolinium fuel rods, radial and axial variation of <sup>235</sup>U enrichments, use of part-length fuel rods, and the use of axial blankets. Each of these design features in conjunction with different reactor operating strategies will impact fuel assembly residual reactivity at discharge. Many BWR plants have a variety of lattice designs currently stored on-site, which provides an additional complexity to criticality safety evaluations for spent fuel storage and transportation.

For the GBC-68 benchmark model, a simplified BWR assembly design was adopted. The design, similar to a GE14 lattice, utilizes a  $10 \times 10$  lattice in which eight of the fuel rods have been replaced with two large water rods. The base GBC-68 model uses the same initial <sup>235</sup>U

enrichment for all fuel rods and does not include gadolinium fuel rods or part-length fuel rods or axial blankets. Evaluation of the impact of these simplifications may be performed in future studies.

Fuel assembly geometry information used in the GBC-68 benchmark model is presented in Table 3. With the exception of the active fuel length and fuel channel dimensions, fuel assembly dimensional information was taken from Table D1.A.3 in the SCALE 6.1 manual [3] for the GE14 assembly design. The active fuel length and fuel channel dimensions from the LaSalle Unit 1 CRC data [14] were used, because sensitivity studies based on the LaSalle CRC data are planned for future work. The initial (fresh) fuel assembly material composition data are provided in Table 4, where the UO<sub>2</sub> density used is 96% of the UO<sub>2</sub> theoretical maximum density (10.96 g/cm<sup>3</sup>) [3].

#### 3. ANALYSIS

## 3.1 COMPUTATIONAL METHODS

The computational methods necessary for this benchmark analysis include codes for fuel depletion and criticality simulation. All calculations were performed using the publicly released version of SCALE 6.1[3] and the ENDF/B-VII 238 neutron energy group library distributed with SCALE 6.1.




Figure 1. TRITON depletion model used to generate the rodded ORIGEN-ARP libraries.

Depletion calculations were performed using the STARBUCS sequence and ORIGEN-ARP libraries generated using the TRITON T-DEPL 2-D lattice depletion sequence, which utilizes the NEWT module for flux calculations and the ORIGEN module to calculate burned fuel compositions. New ORIGEN-ARP libraries were generated for the generic 10 x 10 assembly for use in the GBC-68 benchmark model. New libraries were needed, because the GE14 ORIGEN-ARP libraries distributed with SCALE included some fuel rods with Gd<sub>2</sub>O<sub>3</sub> and the existing libraries were generated without control blades being inserted. The GE14 lattice was depleted in TRITON with the control blades fully inserted for the entire depletion. To create the ORIGEN-ARP libraries used by STARBUCS, depletion calculations were performed with initial enrichments varying from 1.5 to 6 wt%<sup>235</sup>U, with moderator densities varying from 0.1 to 0.8 g/cm<sup>3</sup>, and for fuel assembly average burnup values up to 88.5 GWd/MTU. The parameters used in the TRITON depletion model are provided in Table 5, and the fuel depletion model is shown in Figure 1. The depletion parameters used are generally consistent with the parameters used to generate the GE14 ORIGEN-ARP library distributed with SCALE 6.1 and are considered representative of average conditions fuel might experience during irradiation. These TRITON calculations produced ORIGEN-ARP libraries for initial enrichments between 1.5 and 6 wt % <sup>235</sup>U and burnup values up to 88.5 GWd/MTU. These libraries were used in STARBUCS calculations, for determining the nuclide concentrations in the burned fuel used in the GBC-68 model. Assembly average burnup values up to 60 GWd/MTU were used for the actinide and fission product reactivity margin calculations. The maximum assembly average burnup value for the non-uniform axial burnup case described in Section 3.3.3 was 79 GWd/MTU.

A 512 K moderator temperature was used during the depletion calculations that generated the new ORIGEN-ARP libraries to be consistent with the conditions used to generate the GE14 ORIGEN-ARP libraries distributed with SCALE 6.1. This moderator temperature is low for a BWR operating around 1030 psia where  $T_{sat}$  is about 560 K. However, the moderator

temperature has only a minor impact on the depletion calculations because the water density, which has the primary impact on the flux spectrum, is modeled explicitly and independent of the moderator temperature. The moderator temperature variation has only a minor impact through temperature-dependent adjustments to the scattering cross sections.

The STARBUCS sequence automates calculation of burned fuel compositions using the ORIGEN-ARP methodology to perform a series of cross-section preparation and depletion calculations to generate a comprehensive set of spent fuel isotopic inventories for each burnup region of an assembly. The spent fuel nuclide concentrations are subsequently input to CSAS5, which performs a KENO V.a criticality calculation of the GBC-68 model to determine the neutron

multiplication factor ( $k_{eff}$ ) for the system. The user can specify the assembly-average irradiation history, the axial variation of the moderator density, axial and horizontal-burnup profiles, and the nuclides that are to be applied in the criticality safety analysis. Nuclide correction factors may also be applied to the predicted concentrations to account for known bias and/or uncertainty in the predicted SNF compositions. Nuclide correction factors and horizontal burnup gradients were not used for the GBC-68 calculations.

The STARBUCS sequence was used when it was necessary to calculate burned fuel compositions. The CSAS5 sequence was used when burned fuel compositions were already available from a previously performed STARBUCS calculation. All criticality calculations performed to determine  $k_{eff}$  used 11,000 neutrons per generation and skipped the first 100 generations. Calculations were run until the standard deviation on the average  $k_{eff}$  value reached 0.0001  $\Delta k$ . This criterion resulted in 20 to 80 million individual neutron histories for each criticality calculation, with an average of 44 million neutron histories per KENO V.a calculation.

Example input files for the TRITON, STARBUCS, and CSAS5 calculations are provided in Appendices A, B, and C, respectively.

## 3.2 GBC-68 COMPUTATIONAL MODEL




Figure 2. Radial cross section of the GBC-68 model with reflective left boundary condition.




Figure 3. Cross-sectional view of assembly cell in GBC-68 model.




Figure 4. Cutaway view of bottom part GBC-68 model. Poison panel and cell walls removed to reveal fuel assembly axial zoning. Note that the reference cases utilized a single axial zone.

Based on the benchmark specification provided in Section 2, a computational model of the GBC-68 cask, loaded with BWR fuel assemblies, was developed for KENO V.a. Cross-sectional views of the computational model are shown in Figure 2 and Figure 3. A 3-D cutaway view, generated by KENO3D, is shown in Figure 4. To aid users of this proposed benchmark in verification of their criticality models, calculated  $k_{eff}$  values corresponding to fresh fuel without axial or radial enrichment variation and without gadolinium fuel rods are provided in the next section for initial enrichments of 2, 3, 4 and 5 wt% <sup>235</sup>U.

The active fuel length of the assemblies is divided into 25 equal-length axial regions to facilitate the variation in axial composition due to the axial burnup distribution, which will be considered later in this report. The reference calculations were performed with a uniform axial burnup profile. Calculations using more realistic burnup profiles were also performed and are discussed later in this report.

For the criticality calculations, it is necessary to define the isotopes considered. Many studies have been performed to rank the reactivity worth of the actinide and fission product nuclides. Based on these analyses, Ref. 2 lists "prime candidates" for inclusion in burnup-credit analyses related to dry storage and transport, including several nuclides for which measured chemical assay data are not currently available in the United States. Cross-section data are generally available for all nuclides identified in Ref. 2 as being the most important for burnup-credit criticality calculations. Therefore, in this benchmark, all of the actinide and fission product nuclides identified in Ref. 2, including those for which little or no chemical assay data are available, are used in the estimation of the additional reactivity margin.

The two "nuclide sets" used here for the estimation of the additional reactivity margin are listed in Table 6. The first set, which corresponds to the major actinides specified in a DOE topical report [16], is used for the reference actinide-only calculations. The second set includes all of the actinide and fission product nuclides identified in Ref. 2 as being important for burnup credit criticality calculations; the first set is a subset of the second set. These nuclide sets are consistent with those used in NUREG/CR-6747[1], NUREG/CR-7108[17], and NUREG/CR-7109[18].

For the purpose of this benchmark report and the cited results, the additional reactivity margin available from fission products and minor actinides is due to the nuclides that are exclusive to the second set. These "additional nuclides," which are exclusive to the second set, are listed in Table 7 for clarity and are designated as "set 3." Throughout this report, where reference is made to the additional reactivity margin due to the additional actinide and fission product nuclides, the additional reactivity margin is due to the nuclides listed in Table 6.

Finally, it should be noted that these "nuclide sets" are defined for the purposes of this analysis only; other terminology and specific sets of nuclides have been defined and used by individuals studying burnup-credit phenomena.

### 3.3 RESULTS

Results for the computational benchmark are presented in this section. Based on the nuclide sets identified in the previous section, calculated  $k_{eff}$  values are provided as a function of initial enrichment, burnup, and cooling times, within the ranges relevant to storage and transportation. A rather large volume of results is included for completeness. It is not anticipated that users of this benchmark problem will attempt to reproduce the complete set of results, but rather compare to a subset of the reference results that are relevant to their application.

#### 3.3.1 Reference Results

Calculated  $k_{eff}$  values for the GBC-68 cask as a function of burnup and cooling time for initial enrichments of 2, 3, 4, and 5 wt % <sup>235</sup>U are listed in Tables 8 through 11. Values are provided for the burnup range of 0 to 60 GWd/MTU, in increments of 10 GWd/MTU, and for post-irradiation cooling times of 0, 5, 10, 20, and 40 years. The  $k_{eff}$  values were calculated with a uniform axial burnup profile and a moderator density value of 0.6 g/cm<sup>3</sup>. Control blades were present (i.e., fully inserted for the entire depletion) in ORIGEN-ARP calculations to generate nuclide concentrations based on the initial fuel enrichment, assembly burnup, and cooling time values. Standard deviations for all calculated  $k_{eff}$  values were approximately 0.00010.

The individual components of reduction in  $k_{eff}$  ( $\Delta k$ ), relative to fresh fuel, associated with (a) the major actinides and (b) the additional nuclides as a function of burnup and cooling time are listed in Tables 12 through 15 for each initial fuel enrichment. The second column from the left in Tables 12 through 15 lists the  $\Delta k$  reductions due to the presence of the major actinides alone (nuclide set 1, see Table 6), while the third column lists the  $\Delta k$  reduction due to the presence of

the fission products and additional actinides (i.e., due to the nuclides present in set 3, see Table 7). Thus, the results listed in the third column may be interpreted as the additional  $\Delta k$  margin associated with the fission products and additional actinides. The fourth column from the left in Table 12 through Table 15 lists the total  $\Delta k$  reduction as a function of burnup for the cooling times considered. Finally, the two columns on the right-hand side of the table list the percent contributions from the two sets of nuclides to the total  $\Delta k$  reduction, and thus provide an assessment of the reactivity reduction, relative to fresh fuel, associated with (a) the major actinides and (b) the fission products and additional nuclides.

When associating practical meaning to these results, it is important that the reader and potential users of this report understand that this is a *computational* benchmark, and as such, the reference solutions are based on calculations alone (e.g., no isotopic correction factors are applied). The reference solutions are not directly or indirectly based on experimental results. However, note that the computational tools used to generate the reference solutions have been validated elsewhere [18,19].

As noted above, the reference results presented in Tables 8 through 15 are for a uniform axial burnup profile. Because conservative axial burnup profiles are not available, the reference results were generated using a uniform axial profile. Future BWR burnup-credit work should include identification of conservative axial burnup profiles and generation of reference results using those axial burnup profiles.

In addition to the uniform axial burnup distribution simplification, the computational benchmark uses a uniform axial moderator density for simplification. This is necessary because, as with axial burnup distribution data, very little work has been done to collect and evaluate realistic axial moderator density profiles. The potential impact of varying the average moderator density and of modeling the axial distribution of moderator density will be addressed in future reports designed to improve the bases for BWR burnup credit.

#### 3.3.2 Related Information

Additional results and supplementary discussion, which should not be considered part of this computational benchmark, are available in Appendix D. Discussion of the reference results, including graphical representations and relevant observations, is given in Appendix D.

#### 3.3.3 Additional Results with Non-Uniform Axial Burnup

Considerable work has been done to characterize and develop axial burnup profiles for PWR fuel. A review of this subject as applied to PWRs is provided in NUREG/CR-6801 [19]. For BWRs, assessment of the impact of axial burnup distribution is significantly more complicated than for PWRs because of the extensive use of axial design features such as axially varying <sup>235</sup>U enrichment, part-length fuel rods, axial blankets of natural uranium, and axial variation of initial gadolinia burnable absorber in some fuel rods. Reactor operations affect axial burnup by the use of control blades for long-term reactivity control and the significant axial variation in effective moderator density, which is caused by both reduction in density due to increased temperature and the presence of steam voids generated by boiling. For example, in the LaSalle Unit 1 CRC data, the effective moderator density varies from 0.74 g/cm<sup>3</sup> at the bottom of the core to 0.17 g/cm<sup>3</sup> at the tops of some assemblies [14].

Due to the axially dependent complexities associated with BWR SNF and the lack of an established database of evaluated axial burnup distribution information for BWR fuel, the GBC-68 benchmark model in Sect. 3.2 did not include axial design features or axial burnup or moderator density distributions. Recognizing that these issues are still relevant for BWR SNF, two additional series of calculations were performed to provide an example of the potential impact of using axial burnup distributions and of modeling natural uranium blankets.




Figure 5. Normalized axial burnup distributions used. These distributions are based on data for assembly B2 from the LaSalle Unit 1 CRC data.

To demonstrate the potential effects associated with axial burnup distribution, a few calculations were performed with axial burnup distributions extracted from the CRC data for LaSalle Unit 1 While it is not clear from the reference, these data were most likely inferred using a nodal code and Transverse Incore Probe (TIP) measurements. The 25-node burnup data for assembly ID B2 from Ref. 14 were used, because this assembly reached the highest assembly average burnup in the LaSalle Unit 1 CRC data. The axial burnup distributions used in this report are shown in Figure 5 and Table 16. These five profiles had assembly average burnups closest to the assembly average burnup values of interest.

From Figure 5, there appears to be an axial shift in the power distribution between the 10 and 20 GWd/MTU profiles. This is likely due to control blade withdrawal near the assembly. Because of the extensive and long-term usage of control blades to control reactivity and power peaking, axial power shifts due to control blade movements are likely seen by most assemblies. The example provided in this section is a single sample being used to show that modeling of axial burnup distributions will be necessary for application of BWR burnup-credit.

In the first series of calculations, the burnup-dependent normalized axial burnup profiles (see Table 16) from LaSalle Unit 1 assembly B2 were applied to the benchmark model with initial enrichments of 2, 3, 4, and 5 wt % <sup>235</sup>U, burned to 10, 20, 30, 40, 50, and 60 GWd/MTU, and cooled for 5 years following irradiation. Note that these calculations did not include modeling of natural uranium blankets. The resulting  $k_{eff}$  values and the  $\Delta k$  values with respect to the base model are provided in the middle two columns of Tables 17 through 20. The comparison demonstrates that the "end effect" previously seen for PWR burnup credit also exists for BWR

burnup credit. Note that, as was seen for PWR burnup credit, the reactivity increases are significantly larger for the actinide plus fission products cases (set 2 nuclides) than for the major actinide only cases (set 1 nuclides).

A description of LaSalle Unit 1 assembly B2 design is provided in Table 21. Note that only the axial burnup distribution data were used. No attempt was made to model the axially dependent enrichments, axial variation in gadolinium rod loading, or the axial dependence of the moderator density. Comprehensive detailed studies of the impact of such axially varying features should be performed, but is beyond the scope of the work presented in this report. Modeling the additional axial detail shown in Table 21 would not impact the general conclusion that it will be necessary to model axial burnup distributions for BWR BUC at middle to high burnup values.

The actual relative burnup in the natural uranium blanket zones is significantly lower than it would be for unblanketed fuel. An additional series of calculations was performed with natural uranium blankets modeled in the two end fuel zones. These calculations provide a more realistic assessment of the impact of axial burnup distribution on the GBC-68 models. The results are provided in the two right-most columns of Tables 17 through 20. These results from the models with blankets show an increase in  $k_{eff}$  that is significantly smaller than the increase observed when a blanketed normalized assembly burnup profile is applied to unblanketed fuel.

Note that the reactivity worth of the fission products increases with burnup and that, with the axial burnup distribution present, the lower burnup region near the top of the assembly controls the reactivity. Thus, for a given assembly-average burnup, the reactivity margin due to fission products will be overestimated if the axial burnup distribution is not included in the model. Therefore, it should be emphasized that the computational benchmark results with uniform axial burnup are provided to enable comparison with a simpler benchmark problem and should not be considered to be representative of actual reactivity margins. This modeling simplification reduces the volume of composition data by a factor of 25 (i.e., the number of axial regions used to represent the axial burnup and cooling time combinations are provided in Appendix E to enable comparisons of calculated spent fuel compositions.

Comparison of the results within Tables 17 through 20 shows that, with the uniform axial burnup distribution, the calculated total reactivity reduction due to actinides and actinides with fission products is overestimated for burnups greater than approximately 10 GWd/MTU. Thus, for typical discharge burnups (30–50 GWd/MTU), the individual components of reactivity reduction associated with (a) the major actinides and (b) the additional nuclides are both overestimated with the uniform axial burnup distribution. Additionally, at the higher burnup values the  $k_{eff}$  values calculated for the uniform axial burnup distribution appear to be significantly non-conservative.

#### 4. CONCLUSIONS

This report proposes and documents a computational benchmark model for use as a reference case in the estimation of the additional reactivity margin available from fission products and minor actinides in a BWR burnup-credit storage/transport environment, based on a generic 68 BWR-assembly cask. The proposed benchmark problem was developed to be similar to existing designs for burnup-credit casks, including similar materials and dimensions. While preserving all of the important features, the proposed benchmark problem approximates (or eliminates) nonessential details and proprietary information. The documentation of this computational benchmark includes all of the necessary geometric and material specifications to permit independent evaluations and sufficiently detailed reference solutions to enable meaningful comparisons. This benchmark model will also be used as the base case in future sensitivity studies exploring the impact of varying reactor depletion parameters and burnup-credit analysis modeling approximations.

The purpose of this computational benchmark is to provide a reference configuration to help establish a method for the estimation of the additional reactivity margin and document reference estimations of the additional reactivity margin as a function of initial enrichment, burnup, and cooling time. Calculated  $k_{eff}$  values for the benchmark problem are provided as a function of burnup and cooling time for initial enrichments of 2, 3, 4, and 5 wt% <sup>235</sup>U. Values are provided for the burnup range of 0 to 60 GWd/MTU, in increments of 10 GWd/MTU, and for cooling times of 0, 5, 10, 20, and 40 years. The individual components of the reactivity reduction associated with (a) the major actinides and (b) the additional nuclides as a function of burnup, cooling time, and initial enrichment are also provided. In addition, results for 2, 3, 4, and 5 wt% <sup>235</sup>U initial fuel enrichment with a 5-year post-irradiation cooling time are given for two cases to provide an indication of the potential impact associated with modeling axial burnup profiles with and without axial blankets. The reference estimations were all based on the SCALE 6.1 code package and the SCALE 238-group ENDF/B-VII library.

The reference results are plotted and examined in Appendix D, and in some cases, observations and conclusions are offered. For typical discharge enrichment and burnup combinations, the results show that approximately 70% of the reactivity reduction is due to the major actinides, with the remaining 30% being attributed to the additional nuclides (major fission products and minor actinides). For a given burnup, an increase in the initial enrichment is shown to result in a small decrease in the fractional contribution from the major actinides and a simultaneous increase in the contribution from the additional nuclides. During the time frame of interest, the reactivity reduction associated with the major actinides is shown to increase with cooling time. In contrast, the reactivity reduction associated with the fission products and minor actinides is shown to increase initially with cooling time, but then decrease somewhat in the 5-to 40-year time frame. Finally, the minimum additional reactivity margin available from fission products and minor actinides is quantified for the burnup, initial enrichments, and cooling times considered in this report..

Where applicable, estimates of the reactivity margin for this reference configuration may be compared to those of actual burnup-credit-style casks to provide a check of the design-specific estimates. However, when associating practical meaning to these results, it is important that the reader and potential users of this report understand that this is a computational benchmark, and as such, the reference solutions are based on calculations alone. Although reference solutions are not directly or indirectly based on experimental results, it should be noted that the SCALE depletion (TRITON) and criticality (CSAS5) sequences have been validated using laboratory

critical experiments, commercial reactor criticals (CRCs), measured chemical assay data, and reactivity worth measurements with individual fission products important to burnup credit [2].

An additional purpose for development of the GBC-68 computational benchmark model is to provide a reference model to be used in future sensitivity studies exploring the impact of varying fuel depletion parameters and the use of burnup-credit analysis techniques, approximations, and simplifications.

The work described in this report does not include evaluation of the impact of realistic axial variations in BWR fuel assembly designs. Such features include axial zoning of fuel rod initial enrichment, axial zoning of gadolinium content in fuel rods, use of part-length fuel rods, and reduced or natural uranium enrichment blankets on the ends of the fuel. It is possible that the reactivity reduction associated with the major actinides and the additional actinides and fission products will be affected by modeling such axial design features.

Additional work is needed to identify bounding axial burnup distributions appropriate for application to BWR fuel assemblies and to evaluate the interdependence of axial burnup distributions and axial design features. From experience with PWR burnup credit, and as was demonstrated with one example in this report, neglecting the axial burnup distribution may result in conservative  $k_{eff}$  value estimates at low assembly average burnup values and in non-conservative estimates of  $k_{eff}$  values for assembly average burnups greater than 10 to 20 GWd/MTU. The actual crossover point where using a uniform axial profile changes from conservative to non-conservative will vary with assembly axial design features used and with reactor operations (e.g., control rod usage). It is expected that usage of bounding axial burnup profiles would yield lower estimates for the reactivity margin available from burnup credit nuclides.

Further work is also recommended to quantify the impact of the use of realistic axially dependent reactor operation conditions during fuel depletion calculations. Such conditions include long-term partial insertion of control rods, moderator density axial variation, and fuel temperature axial variation. In the case of the LaSalle Unit 1 CRC data [14], the effective moderator density varies from 0.74 to 0.17 g/cm<sup>3</sup> as the moderator moves from the bottom to the top of the fuel. This will lead to a significantly harder neutron spectrum near the top of the fuel and, consequently, higher plutonium generation in this axial region.

## **APPENDIX D. DISCUSSION OF REFERENCE RESULTS**

## **D.1 DISCUSSION OF REFERENCE RESULTS**

Although the intended scope of this report does not include analysis and interpretation of the results, some limited examination, discussion, and conclusions related to the reference results are offered in this appendix.

To assist in the examination of the reference results, plots of a select set of the reference results are presented for a cooling time of 5 years. Figures D.1 through D.4 plot the  $k_{eff}$  values in the GBC-68 cask for the two nuclide sets (refer to Tables D.1 and D.2 for specification of nuclide sets) as a function of burnup for initial enrichments of 2, 3, 4, and 5 wt%<sup>235</sup>U, respectively. Although, for consistency, results were generated for burnups up to 60 GWd/MTU for each of the enrichments, it should be noted that typical discharge burnups for fuel assemblies with initial enrichments below 3 wt %<sup>235</sup>U are below 40 GWd/MTU. Similarly, for initial enrichments above 3 wt %<sup>235</sup>U, typical discharge burnups are greater than 30 GWd/MTU. Thus, one should be cognizant of these facts when examining the results for the various burnup and enrichment combinations. Limited data for actual initial enrichment and discharge burnup combinations for SNF discharged from U.S. reactors through 2002 are available in Ref. D.1.

The reactivity reductions due to the major actinides (set 1 in Table D.1), additional nuclides (set 3 in Table D.2), and all of the nuclides considered (set 2 in Table D.1) are plotted in Figures D.5 through D.8 as a function of burnup for each of the initial enrichments considered. Finally, bar charts showing the individual contributions from (a) the major actinides and (b) the additional nuclides to the total reactivity reduction for 5-year cooling as a function of burnup are plotted in Figures D.9 through D.12. The relative reactivity reductions due to (a) the major actinides and (b) the additional nuclides are similar at low burnups, but quickly diverge for higher burnups. For typical enrichment and discharge burnup combinations, the figures show that approximately 70% of the reactivity reduction is due to the major actinides, with the remaining 30% being attributed to the additional nuclides (major fission products and minor actinides).

To compare the reactivity reductions for various initial enrichments, Figure D.13 shows the reactivity reductions (in terms of  $\Delta k$  values) for the major actinides as a function of burnup from Figures D.5 through D.8 for initial enrichments of 2, 3, 4, and 5 wt % <sup>235</sup>U. Similarly, Figure D.14 shows the reactivity reductions for the additional nuclides as a function of burnup from Figures D.5 through D.8 for initial enrichments of 2, 3, 4, and 5 wt % <sup>235</sup>U. The variation in these contributions to the reactivity reduction versus initial enrichment is shown to be relatively minor. However, Figure D.14 does reveal that, for a given burnup, an increase in the initial enrichment results in a slight increase in the contribution from the additional nuclides. The individual contributions to the total reactivity reduction from (a) the major actinides and (b) the additional nuclides from Figures D.9 through D.12 are compared for various initial enrichments in Figures D.15 and D.16, respectively.

To examine the effect of cooling time, Figures D.17 and D.18 show the reactivity reductions (in terms of  $\Delta k$  values) as a function of burnup, for an initial enrichment of 4 wt % <sup>235</sup>U, for (a) the major actinides and (b) the additional nuclides, respectively. During the time frame of interest to storage and transport, the reactivity reduction associated with the major actinides increases with

cooling time, primarily due to the decay of the <sup>241</sup>Pu fissile nuclide ( $t_{1/2}$  = 14.4 years) and the buildup of the neutron absorber <sup>241</sup>Am (from decay of <sup>241</sup>Pu). This behavior has been well documented [D.2,D.3]. For the fission products and minor actinides considered as the "additional nuclides" (see Table D.2), the associated reactivity reduction increases initially with cooling time due to the buildup of <sup>155</sup>Gd (from <sup>155</sup>Eu which decays with  $t_{1/2}$  = 4.7 years), but then decreases somewhat due to the decay of <sup>151</sup>Sm. In general, however, the reactivity reduction due to the additional nuclides does not vary significantly in the 5-to-40 year time frame.

As there has been a great deal of interest in quantifying the minimum additional reactivity margin available from fission products and minor actinides, Figure D.19 plots the range of calculated reactivity margin (in terms of  $\Delta k$  values) for all of the burnup, initial enrichments, and cooling times considered in this report. Specifically, the range for burnups from 10 to 60 GWd/MTU, initial enrichments of 2, 3, 4, and 5 wt % <sup>235</sup>U, and cooling times of 0, 5, 10, 20, and 40 years. In all cases, the minimum values correspond to zero cooling time.






































