Dear Chairman Meserve:

As Executive Director of the Certification Board of Nuclear Cardiology, I was very disappointed that the Senate Energy and Water Appropriations Bill for FY 2002 denies funds for implementing 10 CFR Part 35, Medical Use of Byproduct Material, as approved by the Nuclear Regulatory Commission on October 23, 2000. The new rule provides a second pathway to authorized user status through board certification. The Certification Board of Nuclear Cardiology made application to the NRC for recognition in November 2000. However, recognition of the CBNC by the NRC will not occur until the new 10 CFR Part 35 is printed in the *Federal Register* as a final rule.

Members of the Board of Directors of the Certification Board of Nuclear Cardiology invested considerable time and effort in public hearings, testimony and letters of support for this new rule. The revised rule would immediately relieve some of the more burdensome aspects in the current regulations that limit public access to diagnostic services and increase the overall costs of providing health care services. The Senate action is a major setback for those who have worked long and hard on the new regulatory framework. I urge the Nuclear Regulatory Commission to work with stakeholders who support 10 CFR Part 35 revision to reverse the Senate's action.

Nelligan, CAE Executive Director Years of work went into shaping this regulation and the end result is a rule that would protect public health and safety while eliminating unnecessarily burdensome regulatory requirements. Excessive training requirements for nuclear cardiologists to become authorized users of medical isotopes are reduced. The NRC agreement states must adopt NRC standards for training and experience, a requirement that assures a uniform national standard for authorized user status. These proposed changes are the result of careful consideration by many experts and literally thousands of hours of work, principally by your own staff at the NRC. These changes are long overdue and would facilitate training of physicians to perform diagnostic cardiology services using nuclear materials.

The cardiology community needs the new 10 CFR Part 35 to better serve patients with heart disease. I ask your assistance and that of the other commissioners in working to guarantee that the House position on NRC funding prevails when the Energy and Water Development Appropriations Bill for FY 2002 goes to conference between the House and the Senate next month.

Thank you for your consideration and the service which you give to our nation through your work as chair of the Commission.
