Dear Congresswoman Kelly:

I am responding to your letter of May 26, 2000, in which you expressed continued concern about the safety of operations at the Indian Point Nuclear Generating Unit No. 2 (IP2). You specifically expressed concern about the steam generator tube failure at IP2 on February 15, 2000, and about the efforts being undertaken by our Office of the Inspector General (OIG).

Following the tube failure event, the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission dispatched an Augmented Inspection Team (AIT) to IP2. The AIT determined that, theugh there were some areas in which there is room fold improvement, the systems and procedures in place at IP2, including emergency preparedness procedures, are adequate. A detailed report of the AIT findings was forwarded to you electronically on April 28, 2000.

Since the February 15, 2000, event, the plant's owner, Consolidated Edison Company of New York, Inc. (Con Ed), inspected the tubes in all four steam generators. As a result of this inspection, Con Ed removed some tubes from service. Con Ed evaluated the tube inspection data and concluded in its Operational Assessment Report of June 2, 2000, that there is reasonable assurance that the tubes that have been left in service will maintain their structural integrity for 10 months of operation. Con Ed has stated their intention to begin replacement of

the steam generators by the end of the year. The NRC staff is reviewing Con Ed's report and, based on this review, the Office of Nuclear Reactor Regulation (NRR) will determine whether ernot continued operation of IP2 with the current steam generators poses an undue risk to public health and safety. Our Regional staff are also continuing their inspection activities in order to ensure that all appropriate corrective actions have been completed.

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An OIG review of issues surrounding the February 15, 2000, event is ongoing. Consistent with its standard process, the OIG will provide any safety-significant information to the staff, as appropriate. This information will be taken into account when making the decision whether to allow IP2 to resume operations. The NRC staff has kept the Commission informed of the status of IP2 and its findings since the February 15th event. The NRC staff will inform the Commission, internal stakeholders including OIG, as well as the public in the vicinity of the plant, of the results of the NRC staff to the restart of the plant.

I trust that this letter addresses your concerns.
