while I was reading your publication, federal; register, Part 11, Nuclear Regulatory Commission, 10 CFR Part 19 et al.

I was appalled at section VI pages 8645-8646, to read that the critical hazard population in Amargosa Valley was portrayed as a bunch of people with unusual habits, and sensitivities. This phrase repeated again, evidently with the approval of N.A.S., N.R.C. and D.O.E.

The article gives D.O.E. the task of taking personal habit surveys of this critical group. I feel that my civil rights have been denied.

Why should the population of Amargosa Valley be subjected to this gross invasion of their private lives in their own homes by a governmental agency, with no qualifications to compile psychological profiles, for the use of any agency requesting the files.

A criminal has more civil rights than the residents of Amargosa Valley. A criminal who is suspect, must have his rights read to him, and council provided.
