
Dear Senator Kerry:

I recently had the opportunity to visit the Republic of Korea (ROK) and meet with the U. S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission's (NRC) regulatory counterparts, the Ministry of Science and Technology (MOST), and the Korean Institute of Nuclear Safety (KINS) to share perspectives on regulating the nuclear industry. During that visit, I also met with senior executives of the sole utility in the ROK, the Korean Electric Power Corporation (KEPCO), to discuss important matters facing the international nuclear industry and its regulators. As you may know, KEPCO is the world's fifth largest utility and currently operates 16 nuclear power plants which produce 41% of the ROK's electricity. KEPCO also provided me with a tour of two of their nuclear power plants, Ulchin and Kori. Lastly, I visited the Korean Atomic Energy Research Institute (KAERI) to discuss current and potential future collaborative research efforts between KAERI and the NRC.

As you are the ranking member of the U.S. Senate Subcommittee on East Asian and Pacific Affairs, I would like to extend an offer to personally brief you on the results of my visit. Not only will this allow me to share with you my insights on the ROK's nuclear power program, but I can also discuss my own views of how electric industry restructuring in the United States and our reinvention efforts at the NRC may affect your constituents in Massachusetts.
