Better ways must be used to manage radioactive wastes!

If the NRC proceeds with this rulemaking: concentrate on identifying and requiring isolation, monitoring, and management for the entire hazardous life of all wastes: Keep careful records of and isolate all radioactivity and all materials contaminated by it, generated by the nuclear power and nuclear weapons fuel chain industries, from the environment, workers, and the public.

Option 6: I do strongly approve: All radioactive wastes already released should be recaptured. The claim that these releases have had no negative effects should be investigated: identify where the nuclear wastes have been placed and check what effects there have been.

It is totally unacceptable, and I consider it a crime, to put radioactive materials especially in anything that contacts humans and other living forms: for example, jewelry and kitchen utensils.
