As you know, the agency is currently reviewing the website to "restore" information that will not be helpful to terrorists. The DOD asked us to take down our web and to scrub it using the following criteria for removal:

- Locations (even general locations) of the facility site.
- Physical vulnerabilities, potential weaknesses
- Construction details, including wall thicknesses
- Diagrams, schematics, cutaways all but very general layouts of plant designs
- Anything which describes how secure our plants are
- Information which could be used to defeat or breach barriers

Since much of the web information under "News and Information" is used by our staff in responding to reporters and the public, I am asking you to provide me a list of those items on this webpage having the highest priority for restoration. Also, include specific publications that you use and send out. We intend putting a comprehensive list together and passing it to the "Web Group" charged with getting the web back into operations. Note that the Information Digest will not be going on the web. We can't be hamstrung in providing information and we don't want to be inconsistent, so I'm asking each of you to give me your list. If you get calls for certain documents or other information that used to be on the web, we should decide as a group whether that information can be provided so that we are consistent with what we provide outside the agency.

There are plans to put a few things up on the external web today. This likely will include press releases from Aug. 1, Public Meeting notices, contracting information, NRC mission statement, employment opportunities, reporting a safety concern. As other information is reviewed and cleared, it will be added. We're not intending to put out a press release on "return of the web" since it will be piecemeal and gradual over weeks/months.

There are still a lot of questions, I know, about information we can provide. We're trying to work through this as systematically and carefully as possible, using our new glasses as to what information would be useful to terrorists. Thanks.

If this is a wish list, then the Status Summary would be the number 1 item we need to put back on the web. This is used by financial markets, reporters and industry newsletters to keep track of which plants are down for refueling etc. (As was pointed out in a previous e-mail, anyone within 10 miles of a plant down for refueling will know about it, and grid operators and lots of others are certainly aware when a plant trips for any reason.)

Number 2 would be the plant assessment area, including inspection reports. Reporters can actually use this to get specific information on plant performance and inspections.

Number 3 would be the information pages for all the public issues like waste transportation, Yucca Mt., license renewal, Indian Point 2, etc.

Number 4 would be press releases. Reporters actually do go to the website to get the latest press release sometimes.

Number 5 would be the educational material for children and school teachers, and our basic brochure telling what the NRC does.
