I. SECY-87-65 - Revision to NRC Policy Statement, "Guidelines  
for NRC Review of Agreement State Radiation Control  
Programs"

The Commission, by a 5-0 vote,\* approved minor revisions to the NRC policy statement on "Guidelines for NRC Review of Agreement State Radiation Control Programs," subject to the deletion of the words "in Agreement States" from the second to last sentence in the first paragraph on page 3 of Enclosure 2.

Commissioner Carr noted that he endorsed the plan to work with Agreement State representatives in a joint effort to explore the feasibility of developing objective performance indicators for materials licenses regulated by the Agreement States and the NRC. He would like to be informed regularly of progress in this effort.

The policy statement should be amended as noted and forwarded to SECY for signature and publication in the Federal Register.

\* Section 201 of the Energy Reorganization Act, 42 U.S.C. §5841, provides that action of the Commission shall be determined by a "majority vote of the members present." Commissioners Roberts and Asselstine were not present when this item was affirmed. Accordingly, the formal vote of the Commission was 3-0 in favor of the decision. Commissioners Roberts and Asselstine, however, had previously indicated that they would approve this paper and had they been present they would have affirmed their prior votes.

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
