

DOE MEETING WITH STATES AND INDIAN TRIBES

COMMITMENTS

Dallas, Texas
October 1, 1987

1. DOE will provide its position to the States and Indian Tribes as soon as possible on pending Department of Transportation legislation related to the Hazardous Materials Transportation Act (HMTA).
2. DOE will release the Environmental Regulatory Compliance Plans (ERCs) by or before the January 8, 1988 release of the consultative draft SCPs and the Environmental and Socioeconomic Monitoring and Mitigation Plans (MMPs).
3. If the Secretary sends a letter to Congress on DOE's position regarding any bill amending the NHPA, DOE will provide copies of the letter to the States and Indian Tribes.
4. After the consultation workshops are held, DOE will continue to consult with the States and Indian Tribes and provide opportunities for comments on the consultative draft SCPs and MMPs.
5. DOE will provide immediate written notification of any projected change in the release date for the consultative draft SCPs.
6. DOE will continue to provide status reports to the States and Indian Tribes on the prognosis for release of the SCPs, with approximately 30 days notice before the SCPs are released.
7. DOE will provide the MMP references, as well as the consultative draft SCP references, when the documents are released.
8. The States and Indian Tribes will provide input by the end of October to the Project Managers on the location and number of meetings for the consultative draft SCP workshops, and then DOE will develop site-specific action plans for the workshops.
9. DOE will check on the status of the State of Mississippi's request for the draft SCP chapters.
10. DOE will work with the States and Indian Tribes to award full-year grants and/or approve scopes of work as soon as possible after uncertainties regarding program budget and direction are resolved.
11. At the next ISCG, there will be discussion of whether it would be possible for the two remaining grantees to adjust to a calendar year basis for grants rather than a fiscal year.
12. BWIP will meet with the Umatilla and Yakima to clarify scopes of work in relation to FY 88 funds for the upcoming quarter.

13. At the next ISCG and at the next DOE Meeting with the States and Indian Tribes, DOE will review and discuss the grant process and how best to develop procedures for multi-year programs.
14.
 - a. BWIP will arrange a meeting in coordination with the State of Washington and USDOE representatives to discuss the proposed definition of site for PETT.
 - b. DOE will continue to negotiate with the States and Indian Tribes regarding PETT and financial assistance issues prior to initiation of a formal rulemaking.
15. NNWSI intends to release the Environmental Program Plan with the consultative draft SCP and will inform the State if that schedule changes.
16. DOE will investigate to what extent it can respond to the State and Indian Tribe request that DOE provide to them copies of all communications between DOE and the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) regarding repromulgation of 40 CFR 191.
17. In the meeting highlights, DOE will include copies of the slides on budget alternatives presented at the meeting.
18. DOE will provide copies of the FY 89 budget request to the States and Indian Tribes as soon as it is submitted to Congress.
19. The committee of DOE and State and Indian Tribe representatives that previously met to discuss the DOE Meeting with the States and Indian Tribes will reconvene to discuss a number of questions, including: how to make the triannual meetings as effective as possible; how to coordinate discussion of issues at the various program meetings; and how to reduce the total number of program meetings.
20. As preparation for the next meeting on PETT and financial assistance, the States, Indian Tribes, and appropriate local governments will provide to DOE/HQ within 30 days suggestions, ideas, alternative interpretations, etc. regarding PETT and related issues.

Attached is the Headquarters' Proposed Plan for State, Indian Tribe, and NRC Interactions on the Consultative Draft Site Characterization Plans (SCPs) (see Attachment A). This plan was prepared as a result of the announcement by the Director, Office of Civilian Radioactive Waste Management, that consultative drafts of all three SCPs would be released on January 8, 1988. It is intended to provide a framework for organizing, planning, and conducting the technical consultation interactions on these consultative draft SCPs. It is to be supplemented by site-specific plans prepared by each of the Project Offices.

On Monday, November 16, 1987, representatives from Headquarters and the Project Offices will meet in Washington, D.C. to develop plans for these consultations. The meeting will be held in Room GH-019 of the Forrestal Building from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. In preparation for this meeting, each Project Office should take the following actions.

1. Bring with you the data requested in my fax (Nov. 2) (attached). Please provide HQ this data by November 13.
2. Establish a team that will be responsible for the SCP consultation process. This team should include staff responsible for directing and participating in consultation meetings and workshops, technical support staff responsible for detailed explanations of the SCP, and staff responsible for logistical support.
3. Prepare draft project-specific plans consistent with the overall framework presented to the proposed Headquarters plan for discussion at the November 16 meeting.
4. Review the attached proposed plan and be prepared to offer your comments at the November 16 meeting.
5. Develop and bring with you any briefing materials you plan to use in the project-specific discussions at the plenary meeting.

**Proposed Plan for
State, Tribe, Regulatory Interactions
on Consultative Draft Site Characterization Plans**

The Director, Office of Civilian Radioactive Waste Management, has announced that a new initiative will be followed in issuing and consulting on Site Characterization Plans (SCPs). As presented in Ralph Stein's memorandum of August 24, 1987, this initiative consists of releasing consultative drafts of the SCPs for all three candidate sites simultaneously on January 8, 1988. This release of consultative drafts of the SCPs will be accompanied by release of copies of the Environmental and Socioeconomic Monitoring and Mitigation Plans (MMPs) for all three candidate sites. Following the release of these documents on January 8, the Department will consult with States, Tribes, and the Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) over the three-month period from January through March 1988 to explain the consultative draft SCP and assist reviewers in conducting their review. In so doing, the Department will conduct meetings during which technical questions and comments will be received and addressed, and issues of concern will be identified and resolved to the extent possible. The purpose of the first such meeting will be a plenary session to introduce the three site-specific SCPs and the monitoring and mitigation plans, receive State/Tribe input on technical areas of concern and finalize arrangement for technical meetings. This plenary meeting will be followed by a series of site-specific technical workshops whose aim would be to fully discuss and receive input on selected technical topics identified by particular States/Tribes as being of interest. At the end of the three-month consultation period, the Department will complete the SCPs giving appropriate consideration to all comments received and incorporating such comments as appropriate.

The Department will issue the SCPs on a schedule determined by the results of the consultation period, and will then conduct the formal consultation process, including public review and comment with public hearings, called for in the Nuclear Waste Policy Act. HQ has developed a framework, presented below, for organizing, planning and conducting the public interactions on the consultative drafts of the SCPs. In completing plans for conducting the consultations, HQ will work with each of the Project Offices to receive their input and suggestions. Each Project Office should proceed to develop site-specific suggestions for conduct of the consultation process for their candidate site and should identify a contact person responsible for providing this input to HQ and working to develop consultation plans. A separate plan for conducting the consultation and outreach program associated with the formal issuance of the SCPs is being developed by the OGR's Institutional Branch in cooperation with the Office of Policy and Outreach. Steps will be taken to ensure that the approach to conducting interactions on the SCP consultative draft support and are consistent with the approach to consulting on the SCPs, after issuance.

APPROACH/FOCUS

The interactions on the consultative drafts will take place primarily in technical workshops focused on explaining the very complex and highly technical SCPs to State, Tribal, and NRC representatives. These interactions are not intended to deal with policy or issues. The primary contact for such interactions will be the waste management organization designated by each of the States in which a candidate site is located. Representatives of the State, any affected Indian Tribe, and the Nuclear Regulatory Commission will be invited to participate in these workshops. Members of the public may attend as observers.

CONSULTATION TEAM

Consultation workshops will be conducted by site-specific teams composed of HQ, Project Office, and contractor representatives. These teams will generally contain a core group by two HQ representatives and four Project Office representatives, supplementing as appropriate, by a technical support group chosen to address detailed technical questions. Because all three consultative draft SCPs will be available for review at the same time, HQ believes that it is important that a consistent, consolidated approach be followed in organizing and conducting the workshops. Therefore, HQ will work with each of the three Project Offices to identify those persons participating in the site-specific consultation teams and to develop plans for the workshops. A meeting of HQ and Project Office consultation team members will be held in Washington, D.C. during the third week in November to develop plans for these consultations. During the meeting participants will discuss programmatic and policy issues which may be expected to arise during the consultation workshops, develop approaches to responding to these issues, and review and revise meeting materials.

CONSULTATION ACTIVITIES

There will be two phases of consultation activities associated with release of consultative draft SCPs. The first will be an internal planning phase which will occur from October to January, 1987, prior to release of the consultation drafts. The second phase will be the actual consultation interactions themselves, and will occur during January, February, and March of 1988. Consultation on the consultative draft SCPs will close at the end of March, when the Department begins the process of considering comments received and completing the SCPs. The general activities undertaken during each phase are discussed below.

Planning Phase

During the planning phase, a number of activities will be conducted, including:

- 1) identifying the site-specific team of persons who will participate in the consultation process;
- 2) developing site-specific plans for carrying out consultations, including identification of desired number, time, location, and State

contact for conducting technical workshops (plan should include input from State/Tribes due by end of October);

- 3 interacting with the Project Offices to develop integrated plans for such workshops;
- 4) providing State and Tribe representatives with information on the Department's proposed approach;
- 5) and obtaining suggestions for modifications from States and Tribes;
- 6) Identifying a proposed set of technical concerns suggested for discussion at the workshops;
- 7) interacting with the Nuclear Regulatory Commission to ensure that the designated set of site-specific workshop interactions will be structured to meet their needs for deriving information on the consultative draft SCPs;
- 8) developing information materials to be used during the briefings and workshops;
- 9) meeting with Project Office representatives to develop consolidated, consistent approach to conducting workshops, including review and revision of information materials;
- 10) coordinating with OCRWM personnel responsible for policy, outreach, and institutional interactions to ensure that the approach to conducting consultations on the consultative drafts is consistent, compatible, and integrated with the approach to conducting public consultations on the SCP after issuance for formal review;
- 11) notifying State, Tribe and NRC representatives of the schedule and logistics for conducting a general introductory meeting following release of consultative draft SCPs;
- 12, conducting dry run presentations in preparation for the January plenary
15) session;
- 13) completing the consultative draft SCPs and their supporting documents and
- 14) prenotification of Congressional Hill staffers regarding release of consultative draft SCPs.
- 16) briefing to NRC staff on consultative draft SCPs.

Consultation Phase

During the consultation phase of interactions the emphasis will be on direct interaction with the State in which the candidate site is located, the NRC, and affected Indian Tribes. These consultations will include both general and site-specific interactions. They will begin following release of the three consultative draft SCPs and will close at the end of March, 1988. The first interaction will be a general briefing and plenary session scheduled to be held in a central location such as Denver, Colorado during the week of January 25, 1988. The purpose of this meeting will be to introduce the three SCPs to consultation participants, allow opportunity for initial site-specific technical interactions, and to define specific topics and logistics for the technical meetings to be held throughout the remainder of the consultation period. A tentative agenda for this meeting is attached at A. After this initial general meeting, a series of site-specific technical workshops will be conducted for each of the candidate sites according to the agreements reached in interactions between the Project Office and State/Tribes in advance of the plenary session.

COMMENT RECORD

In addition to providing information and educating potential reviewers of the SCPs, a main purpose of the consultation interactions on the consultative draft SCPs will be to receive questions and comments and to identify and resolve technical concerns wherever possible. Pertinent comments will be incorporated into the SCPs as they are completed following the close of the consultation interactions. Therefore, creation of a clear comment record will be of major importance during the consultations. This will be accomplished by creating a formal summary record for the general meeting and for each of the site-specific meetings and consultation workshops. The summaries of record from the general meeting and site-specific meetings and workshops should identify comments, technical concerns and proposed resolutions, agreements, action items, and dates and locations of future interactions. These summaries will be entered into the comment record.

After close of the consultation period, summaries of record will be reviewed and a comment log identifying substantive technical comments will be prepared. This log will identify the comment, commentor, date of comment, and appropriate section(s) of SCP affected by the comment. This log will be used to ensure that pertinent comments are addressed in the SCP, deferred until the semi-annual progress reports, or referred to other SCP companion documents as appropriate. The log will also be used in the preparation of a comment resolution matrix which will be available when the SCP was issued. The comment resolution matrix should indicate by numerical section where the comment was addressed in the SCP, or where it was addressed in a companion document or SCP reference document, or when it is expected to be addressed in a semi-annual progress report. If a comment were not to be addressed further, a brief explanation should be given for not addressing it. The comment records associated with consultation interactions on the consultative draft SCPs will become part of the permanent SCP administrative record.

COORDINATION

It is important to ensure that consultation interactions on the consultative draft Site Characterization Plan are fully coordinated throughout OCRWM and are consistent with plans for conducting NWPA-specified public consultations after issuance of the Site Characterization Plans. Therefore routine coordination meetings will be held among representatives from the Engineering and Geotechnology Division, Economic and Intergovernmental Analysis Branch, Policy and Institutional Planning Division, Information Services Division, and Weston, Inc. to ensure development of a consistent, consolidated consultation approach.


As part of our continuing consultation and cooperation program, I am establishing the following schedule to ensure that the Participation Plans are completed as soon as possible:

While I recognize that there are uncertainties about the program that make long-term institutional planning difficult at this time, it is possible for us to define the near-term opportunities for States, Indian Tribes, and local governments. However, the Participation Plans can define how in the upcoming year DOE will provide opportunities for participation in technical activities. Therefore, the initial plan will cover CY 1988 with semiannual updates in accordance with the OGR Participation Guidelines.

I want to again emphasize that these plans are to address the participation of States, Indian Tribes, and local parties, as well as the public. In the absence of C&C Agreements, these plans will define and document how we are consulting and cooperating with the States and Indian Tribes, and how we are interacting with local governments and the public.

I hope that the required informal discussions with States, Indian Tribes, and local parties are well underway by the December ISCG Meeting and that there is substantive progress to report on the development of the plans at that time. As the informal discussions proceed, your staff should coordinate with Carol Peabody and Barry Gale of my staff, who will be working closely with Ginger King of OPO.

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ADJUSTING THE ISCG ROSTER

Purpose

DOE would like to reduce the number of persons on the ISCG roster to a more manageable level by identifying those individuals who should receive meeting materials.

Cutting the roster would reduce resource requirements for reproduction and distribution of memos, agendas, reference packages, and action items, by reducing mailing costs, and DOE and WESTON hours.

Reducing the roster is not intended to restrict meeting attendance.

Background

Prior to the February 1986, Dallas, Texas ISCG meeting (the first meeting open to States and Indian Tribes), the ISCG distribution list consisted of 62 representatives from HQ, POs, and their contractors. Since then, virtually anyone attending a meeting or requesting information regarding the meeting has been added to the distribution list for meeting memos, agendas, action items and reference packages. The current distribution list has 207 representatives and the December 1987 ISCG meeting may generate still more. Attachment A shows the number of persons on the ISCG roster by organization and State.

Possible Steps

The roster can be adjusted in a number of ways. DOE may want to try one or more of the following:

- Send a memo to each person on the roster announcing DOE's intention to cut the roster due to resource constraints and asking if the addressee wishes to remain on the roster.
- In the memo announcing the ISCG meeting, ask that those interested in receiving meeting materials call or mail back an attached return form (See example letter, Attachment B).
- Send a memo to key organizational contacts listing the names of their organization's representatives on the roster and asking them to identify those persons who should receive meeting materials.
- Ask States and Indian Tribes to identify their contractors, in order to clarify the "Others" category in the roster (Attachment C, page 27-30).
- Use attendance history as one of the criteria for remaining on the distribution list (Attachment D).

- Establish a maximum number of representatives from HQ, POs, States, Indian Tribes, contractors and special interest groups/consultants and have the key contact for each organization update the distribution list for each meeting.
- Include only key contacts on the distribution list and send multiple copies of meeting materials to them, for distribution within their organizations.
- Establish a limit for distribution to other HQ offices; e.g., send one copy of the reference package to each OCRWM office to be routed by intra-office distribution or maintained as a display copy.

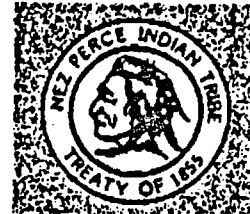

Dear Mr. Macca:

We have just received your Draft BWIP Consultation Plan, dated November 09, 1987. The schedule proposed in this plan appears to be inadequate, especially the closing date of March 31, 1988, for the consultation period. This date allows less than three months for review of the complete draft consultative SCP, the associated references and Study Plans, and the EMMP and SMMP. Although we have seen early versions of the SCP, EMMP, and SMMP, we have seen neither the references, the Study Plans, nor the final consultation version of the SCP & MMPs. We therefore request additional time for Tribal review prior to the closing date.

The proposed date (January 26-27, 1988) and location (Denver) of the plenary sessions seem reasonable, but the agenda contained in the Ralph Stein memo of November 4 is inadequate. The Day 2 agenda should be at least as detailed as that of Day 1. The Site - Specific and Discussion should include at least the following topics:

1. Introduction to the BWIP SCP, EMMP, SMMP
2. Discussion of SCP References and Study Plans
3. Comments to date by LAR teams, States, Tribes, and NRC on adequacy of SCP & MMPs
4. Changes to SCP & MMPs due to #3

The first workshop is scheduled too long after the release of the documents. This meeting should be held near the beginning of February to allow DOE to present a detailed overview of each document. This overview should include simultaneous workshops on each of the three major documents--SCP, EMMP, and SMMP--during the first day. On the second and third days, workshops should be held on each major topic--geology, geoengineering, geology, geochemistry, climatology, conceptual repository design, waste package, QA, SCP schedule, Study Plans, EMMP, and SMMP. Some of these workshops may have to be held concurrently, but the same personnel should not be required for concurrent sessions due to size limitations of the Tribal technical staff. For example, geology and QA might be scheduled at the same time, but geoengineering and conceptual repository design should not be concurrent.

We agree with the proposal to create a "formal summary report" and a "comment log" of the meetings. These are, however, merely tools for maintaining a record of the meetings. These comments should not carry the same weight as formal written comments from the affected States and Tribes or the NRC. We are concerned that DOE will interpret the comment log as a consensus of the comments received from the affected parties.

Thank you for allowing our review of this plan.

The agenda should include items such as organization of the three SCP's, reviews by DOE on each SCP, the existing documentation attached to the SCP, how to find the existing information to the SCP, and what specific activities will be ongoing at each site until the SCP is finalized, including what direction will be given those activities. We propose this meeting to be held in Denver, Colorado.

We feel these meetings should be organized topically so that only the staff and consultants responsible for scrutinizing the relevant area will need to attend that particular meeting. The meetings should also be scheduled so that our reviewers have had adequate time to review and comment on the SCP. We believe the DOE, the Westinghouse staff and consultants, the Nuclear Regulatory Commission should be involved in all these meetings. We would prefer a workshop/discussion format to a briefing style format for these meetings.

This letter is in response to your requests regarding the State's input into the development and implementation of workshops or other forums related to the Department of Energy's (DOE) consultative draft of the Site Characterization Plan (SCP) for Yucca Mountain. As I have indicated to you previously, the ability of the State of Nevada to participate in these DOE meetings is conditioned in a couple of ways. First, that the State receives all SCP-related plans, programs, studies and the like prior to the commencement of these workshops. I envision that this will include not only the SCP, but all of the technical field study plans, the environmental program plan, environmental regulatory compliance plan, environmental field study plan, the environmental monitoring and mitigation plan, the socioeconomic field study plan and the socioeconomic monitoring and mitigation plans. Next, that the technical staff of the Nuclear Regulatory Commission be present at and be a participant in these aforementioned workshops.

Proposed below is an outline of the type of consultative draft workshops that this Office believes would be important for the DOE to undertake in order to describe what it knows about the site currently and for the DOE to demonstrate an understanding of what information needs to be obtained not only to prepare for a license application, but also for an environmental impact statement.

RECOMMENDED WORKSHOP OUTLINE

- 1st** The first workshop should be a management overview of the Site Characterization Plan and site characterization activities that I envision as a generic introductory session on the entire subject. This workshop should be conducted somewhere around four weeks after the release of the consultative draft. In addition to providing a general overview, it should clearly demonstrate the linkages between the SCP and the technical study plans, the complete environmental program, and the complete socioeconomic program. Based upon a successful demonstration of these important linkages, the Department then should proceed to the second tier.
- 2nd** A series of technical topics workshops should be held that review the individual technical topics described in Chapters 1-7 of the draft SCP. These workshops should focus on demonstrating a thorough and complete understanding of the existing conditions at the site and the data that support the Department's understanding of those conditions. In short, DOE should describe everything it knows about the site, and should continue to pay special attention to the need to demonstrate linkages between all of the related sub-plans and activities including socioeconomics and the environment and how they relate to the other aspects of the program. A discussion of historic activities in these areas should be included.
- 3rd** The Department should conduct a workshop or workshops specifically and exclusively related to topics treated in Chapter 8. Again, the focus of this series of workshops should be for the Department to demonstrate not only what information and data need to be collected and why, but how the comprehensive program strategy incorporates the individual study and data collection efforts with, once again, linkages being clearly described regarding the impact of such activities on the environment and the social and economic fabric of the area.
- 4th** The DOE should conduct a wrap-up-type workshop which should clearly demonstrate how the Site Characterization Plan is coordinated and integrated leading toward the submission of a license application to the Nuclear Regulatory Commission as well as the preparation of an environmental impact statement.

I hope that you find this proposal concerning conduct of these workshops useful. Of course, it is our requirement that

all of these workshops be available to any interested party on an observer status in addition to any public workshops which may be planned. Additionally, we have not as yet reviewed this recommended workshop outline with the affected local governments. As I anticipate consulting with them in the very near future, this recommended outline should be considered tentative until such input is received.

I would be happy to work with you in planning the actual logistics for conducting these workshops. Should you have any questions, please do not hesitate to contact me.



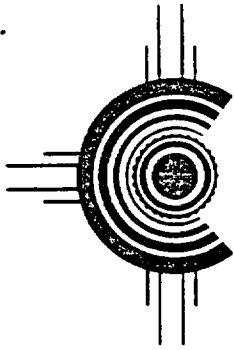

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the Strawman SCP HQ Proposed Plans. Please find below our comments :

1. The period of January 8-March 31, 1988, for the consultation seems to be too short. The closing date of March 31 allows less than three months for review and comment on the SCP's consultative draft, the associated references and study plans, the SMMP and the EMMP. We cannot conduct a complete review of any of these documents by March 31, 1988.
2. The date and location (January 26-27, 1988, Denver) of the plenary meeting seems to be reasonable to us. However, the agenda contained in the DOE HQ memorandum of November 4 is not adequate. The agenda of day two is problematic. It should be at least as detailed as that of day one.

In the specific discussion on the BWIP Site, we would like to have at least the following topics:

- a. Introduction to the SCP, SMMP, and EMMP.
 - b. Discussion of SCP references and Study Plan.
 - c. Comments to date by States, Tribes, NRC, and LAR on adequacy of SCP, SMMP, EMMP.
 - d. Changes to SCP, SMMP, EMMP due to those comments.
3. The date of February 23-25, 1988, for the first workshop is inadequate, because of the long period after the release of the final SCP, SMMP, and EMMP. It needs to be rescheduled in early February. Also, the third workshop seems to be worthless as planned, because the date is too close to the consultation period's end, if that remains the same as now.
 4. There is a need for more than two workshops (Ralph Stein's memorandum on November 4, 1987).

5. The workshops should be held on each major topic concurrently, but scheduled as to allow our technical staff to attend all the sessions dealing with related problems. We would like to be consulted in determining the schedule of those meetings.
6. The "formal summary record," and the "comment log" should be "records of the meetings." They should not be identified as affected parties and the NRC written comments on the SCP, EMMP, and SMMP received by DOE during the consultation period.

Thank you again for the opportunity to express our proposals and concerns.

MAJOR COMMENTS

1. The YIN would prefer independent interactions with the DOE during the consultation period whenever institutional/technical issues warrant.

2. Due to the difference in the technical issues raised by each of the affected parties, it may not be possible to include and resolve these issues within the scope and time frames of the plenary meeting. Technical workshops would need to be developed during consultation with the affected parties.

3. Approach/Focus

The YIN does not agree with the idea that the state should be the "primary contact" for the SCP review. The NWPA states specifically that the DOE will conduct interaction with affected tribes at the same level as with the state.

4. Consultation Team

In the Approach/Focus section above, there was a statement that the policy issues would not be addressed during consultation. In the Consultation Team section the statement is made that the consultation teams will discuss policy issues "which may be expected to arise". This contradiction would have to be resolved so that the YIN has a clear idea what the scope of these interactions would be.

Comment 1: The YIN requests its participation in all meetings of the site specific consultation teams or subgroups of that team.

Comment 2: There needs more clarification of the role of programmatic and policy issues in the technical consultation workshops.

Planning Phase:

Question: At what point are we in this process? Should the YIN be suggesting the subjects of technical workshops or at some later date?

GENERAL COMMENTS

Comment 1: More information would be required to identify major topics of discussion in a proposed workshop.

Comment 2: Notifying affected parties must be done in a timely manner. Adequate time (minimum 2 weeks) should be given to the affected parties in order to make meaningful suggestions and modifications to suggested and proposed items.

SPECIFIC COMMENTS

Item 5: It is recommended that two weeks be considered a minimum for obtaining comments on the information provided and the approach being used in the consultation process.

Item 7: The specific language relating to interactions with the NRC should be changed to include the affected parties in this same process. This item seems inconsistent with the "primary focus on the state" language found in the approach/Focus section above. (See Major Comment 3 above.)

Item 8 and 9: Qualification of information which is directly or indirectly used during the briefings and workshops should be made available to the affected parties prior to publication.

6. Proposed Time Line/Schedule for the Consultation

There is a column which indicates that the DOE will be soliciting the S/T input on the process to use in consulting on the SCPs. A two week consultation periods should be considered a minimum.

USDOE has requested recommendations on interactions during review of the Basalt Waste Isolation Project (BWIP) Consultative Draft Site Characterization Plan (CDSCP). A very preliminary recommendation follows. I understand this will be used as a basis to begin discussions with the Nuclear Waste Advisory Council and the Nuclear Waste Board.

Assumptions: USDOE plans to release the CDSCP, study plans affected by exploratory shaft construction, the Environmental Monitoring and Mitigation Plan (EMMP), the Socioeconomic Monitoring and Mitigation Plan (SMMP), and the Environmental Regulatory Compliance Plan on or before January 8, 1988. These recommendations assume all the documents will be released at that time.

General Briefing and Plenary Session: USDOE plans a general briefing and plenary session to introduce the CDSCP, EMMP, SMMP, AND ERCP to key representatives from NRC and the affected states and tribes. Details of the final Consultation Plan would probably be announced. This meeting is tentatively scheduled for mid- to late-January 1988, in a convenient city such as Denver.

General Briefing for the state of Washington: I recommend that USDOE conduct a general briefing for the Washington State Nuclear Waste Board, the Nuclear Waste Advisory Council, legislators, affected state agencies, university personnel, and interested parties. Because the legislature would be in session, the meeting should be held in the Olympia area.

Draft Outline for Nevada Nuclear Waste Storage Investigations Public Participation Plan

1.0 Introduction and Background

This section will contain a summary of the Nuclear Waste Policy Act, the waste program schedule and history, and reference the DOE organizations managing the NNWSI Project.

2.0 Purpose and Scope

This section will describe the purpose and content of the Public Participation Plan. It will reference the sections of the OCRWM Mission Plan relevant to the Participation Plan, and summarize the consultative process by which the plan will be finalized.

3.0 Public Participation

This section will define "participation." In addition to recognizing formal mechanisms for public involvement (i.e., public hearings and briefings), it will recognize the representative nature of the state's nuclear waste program and include draft policy for state and local government involvement in the NNWSI Project. The draft policy, based on past experience and on early discussions with the state, seeks to establish a framework for future state and local government participation. The preliminary framework identifies three major categories of NNWSI Project actions: policy development, project management, and program execution. Examples of each type of activity (i.e., policy development = PETT Guidelines, program execution = technical field work) will be given. Then the process for each category (i.e., preliminary discussions, first draft, subsequent reviews, etc.) will be identified. Finally, the draft Participation Plan will identify potential points at which the state and local governments may choose to become involved. This preliminary "strawman" will be used as the basis for consultations with the state and local governments to develop final policy for DOE/Headquarters' concurrence.

4.0 Public Information Activities

This section will define the elements that a public information program must address: the audience, message, product format, and distribution network. It will recognize that the region surrounding the site may require special emphasis, while at the same time considering the concerns of all Nevadans. Major issues raised by Nevadans will be listed, as well as potential formats for information products. This section also will describe a range of public information activities that may be scheduled.

5.0 Evaluation

This section will recognize the importance of evaluating the effectiveness of participation activities and indicate that public feedback will be solicited, as well as peer and other reviews as appropriate.

Appendices


SUBJECT: SRP STATE, LOCAL, AND PUBLIC PARTICIPATION PLAN
