 Thank you for your e-mail about the orphaned library. Since this was a private library, the collection is outside of NRC's jurisdiction. Based on the e-mail, the collection does contain some information that the NRC currently treats as sensitive.

I will give you the same information that the NRC recently gave the Government Printing Office and the National Technical Information Service. The NRC prefers that the owners of this specialized energy collection destroy the following NRC publications on the attached list. We also suggest that they also destroy any FSARs that they can readily identify. If they need further guidance, then they can call me at 301-415-7204.

There is a library in Pittsburgh that contains energy-related documents dating from 30 years ago to the present. Many of these reports pertain to coal; but there are a significant number of nuclear-related reports, including FSARs and NUREGs. The owner, an energy consulting firm, went bankrupt, and the library has been left to the landlord, the University of Pittsburgh. The landlord (probably a licensee for medical materials) has not indicated what will be done with the reports, nor what access controls will be used,

What, if anything, should the NRC do about the disposition of the library's contents?
