Here is what Carroll Leavell , state congressman said about the storage of the waste:

"LES must post a bond that assures clean up of the site that will return it at some point in time to a "green site". The Department of Energy and US Enrichment Corporation has a large volume of the "tails" or waste product from uranium enrichment stored in Ohio, Kentucky and Tennessee. It is my understanding that the Federal Government has requested proposals for a plant to "deconvert" the product to a low grade product that can go to a site in Utah. When a plant is built to handle the product in the other states, LES could contract for the handling of waste at the Eunice plant.
