<p><u>Summary:</u> Ms. Berger and I exchanged a number of voice-mails.</p> <p>12:30 I spoke with Ms. Berger. She is a consultant for the licensee and was asked to put together the information concerning the ECD in the Perkin Elmer gas chromatograph. She informed me that she had copies of the leak test results, shipping papers, and receipt letter from the waste broker and needed an address to send the information. She also stated that the licensee indicated that its license was in timely renewal. I informed her that the license was not in timely renewal since a renewal application or a request to terminate the license had never been received. If the licensee still possessed licensed material it would have to be placed in storage until such time as a new license was issued. At this point, Ms. Berger asked what the licensee should do with the Cesium level gauges they possessed. I told her that the only thing the license authorized was a Perkin Elmer ECD and that the licensee should include a letter indicating that the license should be retired since the expiration date of the license had passed. Ms. Berger stated that she would have the licensee send in the required paperwork to retire the license and would look into the situation with the gauge containing Cesium. I thanked her for her attention to the matter.</p>
