Dear Mr. Lynch:

I, Michael Donald Moseman, would like to take this opportunity to express my honest feelings to your Agency concerning my inappropriate actions during the process of transmitting a revised preceptor statement to the Iowa Department of Public Health (IDPH) on January 24, 2005. I consider this a most serious event and my lack of sleep, anxiety and constant thinking about what I should have done bear witness to my commitment to being a credible and honest person both on and off the job.

I openly admit to having a preceptor statement altered and faxed to the IDPH without knowledge of the individual who signed the original document. There was never my intent to deceive, misrepresent, or provide material false statements to the IDPH. I have no excuses as to why and how the document was revised and resubmitted to IDPH without being reviewed by the original signature provider. I wrongfully assumed that it was acceptable to revise the service hours to a new value, which was still true and verifiable.

Even though I did not think I had done anything inappropriate at the time this occurred, I now realize that I displayed very bad judgment in my actions and feel embarrassed and professionally humiliated. I should have ensured that Mr. Hatten was contacted regarding the revised document before having the document faxed to IDPH.

What I'm trying to say is that I am, today, well aware of the correct methodology to revise a preceptor statement prior to resubmission to a Regulatory Agency and have no justification for what transpired. I can only say that I now know what I did was inappropriate and give you my promise to never allow this to occur again.

I want to continue my career in Radiation Safety and I appeal to you to allow me to work as a Health Physics Consultant for Stan A. Huber Consultants, Inc., in your areas of jurisdiction. It would most likely end my career in this field if you restrict me from working in your areas of jurisdiction. Losing my job at this stage of my career would cause serious

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hardship for both my family and me. I really like the work I do and have an honest passion for Radiation Safety including solving problems and always trying to do the right thing. In my approximate twenty-five year history in this field, I have always shown that I am a trustworthy, credible, and honest person.

My firm has already adopted administrative actions to prevent recurrences of this nature. My personal corrective action will be to maintain a high level of scrutiny and attention to detail when working with any type of documentation that could be considered Regulatory related. I believe that the restrictions requested by the IDPH on February 18, 2005 is an adequate personal disciplinary action and I request that your Agency allow me to continue to perform my current consulting activities in your areas of jurisdiction. I would be willing to come and meet you personally to further discuss this matter, if you so desire.

In closing, I sincerely apologize for my actions. I shoulder the responsibility for my inappropriate actions and, using the 20/20 vision of hindsight, would have had the preceptor statement reviewed by Mr. Hatten before having it faxed to IDPH. I cannot change the past and can only admit my wrong doing and sincerely promise to not let anything like this ever happen again.


