Dear Chairman Diaz:

We write to request your assistance in providing the Committee on Energy and Commerce with documents and information relating to your agency's compliance with Section 610 of the Regulatory Flexibility Act (RFA) of 1980, through which Congress sought to ensure that agencies remain constantly vigilant of opportunities to reduce unnecessarily burdensome rules and regulations on small businesses.

Under Section 610 each federal agency must plan for, and conduct, the periodic review of its rules that have or will have a significant economic impact on a substantial number of such small entities-that is, small businesses, small governmental jurisdictions, and other small organizations. The purpose of these reviews, which must be conducted within ten years of publication of the final rule, is to determine whether each such rule should be continued without change, amended, or rescinded to minimize the economic impact on these organizations.

After 25 years, Section 610 remains the only crosscutting statutory requirement through which federal agencies reexamine certain rules after they have been issued, as the Congressional Research Service (CRS) reports. However, assessments of agency implementation of this requirement by the Government Accountability Office reveal a troubling track record; some agencies have not performed required reviews, others have not implemented the requirements properly, or have defined review criteria so that rules that may significantly affect small entities are not subject to review.

In a March 2005 review, CRS reported that, according to submissions to the Unified Agenda of Federal Regulatory and Deregulatory Action, some agencies routinely identify hundreds of new regulatory actions that could have a significant economic impact on a substantial number of small entities (and thus subject to RFA). Yet these very same agencies list a relative handful of planned Section 610 reviews. As CRS notes, it would be reasonable to expect that, because agencies intend to issue a large number of rules each year with a significant effect on

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small entities, those same agencies would need to reexamine a large number of rules each year under Section 610.

Given the potential for Section 610 review to reduce unnecessarily burdensome regulation, particularly on small businesses and other small organizations, we seek to assess directly how agencies within the Committee's jurisdiction have been implementing Section 610 reviews and to assess the general impact and effectiveness of this requirement for meeting the goals of Congress. To assist us as we begin this review, and pursuant to Rules X and XI of the U.S. House of Representatives, please provide for the time period starting on January 1, 1995 to the present the following documents and answers to questions detailed below on or before Tuesday, April 26, 2005:

- 1. Please provide a copy of your agency's plans, and related guidance documents, for the periodic review of rules, pursuant to Section 610 of the Regulatory Flexibility Act.
- 2. Provide a detailed narrative explanation of (a) the steps your agency takes to identify rules and regulations for review under Section 610, (b) how your agency tracks rules that may be subject to Section 610 review, and (c) the analytical process your agency follows to perform Section 610 reviews.
- 3. Provide a list of all rules that have been reviewed by your agency under Section 610, including the dates upon which notice was provided that the rules were subject to review, when the reviews were completed, the results of those reviews, the specific factors considered (pursuant to Section 610), and reasons for making review decisions.
- 4. What rules has your agency identified as having "a significant economic impact on a substantial number of small entities," and will those rules be subject to Section 610 review, and if not, why not?
- 5. What percentage of proposed rules and final rules has your agency certified as not having "a significant economic impact on a substantial number of small entities," pursuant to the Regulatory Flexibility Act?
- 6. Provide guidance documents used by your agency to assess whether proposed rules could be certified as not having a "significant economic impact on a substantial number of small entities."
- 7. Identify the offices, job titles, and names of individuals responsible for devising, implementing, and ensuring adherence to procedures for conducting periodic review of rules pursuant to Section 610.
