USEC INC.'S MEMORANDUM ON THE BOARD'S JURISDICTION TO ENTERTAIN PROPOSED NEW CONTENTIONS

This memorandum is submitted by USEC Inc. (USEC) in response to the October 18, 2005 Order of the Atomic Safety and Licensing Board (Board), which directed the NRC Staff and USEC to submit memoranda on whether jurisdiction to entertain new late-filed contentions resides with the Board or the Commission. USEC believes that this Board would have jurisdiction to consider such proposed contentions.

The Commission, at the outset of this licensing proceeding, directed that "the Commission will issue an order determining standing and refer petitions from persons with the requisite standing to the Board for further processing in the proceeding." *USEC, Inc.* (American Centrifuge Plant), CLI-04-30, 60 NRC 426, 427 (October 7, 2004). The Board has been designated to preside over the conduct of this hearing, including consideration of proposed contentions. *See USEC, Inc.* (American Centrifuge Plant), CLI-05-11, 61 NRC 309, 310 (2005).

NRC regulations direct that "the Commission, the presiding officer or the Atomic Safety and

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Licensing Board designated to rule" consider certain factors in ruling on non-timely filings.

10 C.F.R. § 2.309(c). Finally, "[t]he presiding officer's jurisdiction in each proceeding terminates when the period within which the Commission may direct that the record be certified to it for final decision expires, when the Commission renders a final decision, or when the presiding officer withdraws from the case upon considering himself or herself disqualified, whichever is earliest." 10 C.F.R. § 2.318 (a) (2005). Nothing in the regulations suggests that the Board would lose jurisdiction to consider a late-filed petition simply because the Commission may be reviewing the Board's earlier decision concerning contentions that were proffered in an earlier petition. In fact, the Commission's order and the regulations clearly indicate that the Board retains jurisdiction to consider proposed late-filed contentions.
