(4) Nothing herein shall be construed to authorize the Board of Regents to contract a debt on behalf of, or in any way to obligate, the state; and the satisfaction of any debt or obligation incurred by the Board of Regents as trustee under the provisions of this section shall be exclusively from the trust property, mortgaged or encumbered; and nothing herein shall in any manner affect or relate to the provision of the educational institutions law of 1935.

240.225 Applicability of certain sections.—The Department of General Services shall by rule provide for delegation to the State University System of the functions and duties in ss. 273.04, 273.05, and 273.055 and chapter 287 as they pertain to the State University System. The Governor and Cabinet, sitting as the State Board of Education, shall approve or disapprove the award of information technology resources procurements under s. 287.073 for the State University System which are reviewed by the Board of Regents pursuant to this section. No additional positions shall be authorized for the State University System to implement the provisions of this section.

240.227 University presidents; powers and duties. The president is the chief administrative officer of the university and is responsible for the operation and administration of the university. Each university president shall:

(1) Develop and adopt rules governing the operation and administration of the university. Such rules shall be consistent with the mission of the university and statewide rules and policies and shall assist in the development of the university in a manner which will complement the missions and activities of the other universities for the overall purpose of achieving the highest quality of education for the citizens of the state.

(2) Prepare a budget request to be transmitted to the Board of Regents. Such request shall be prepared in accordance with the fiscal policy guidelines, formats, and instructions prescribed by the Board of Regents.

(3) Develop an operating budget.

(4) Conduct biennially a space utilization study to support the university budget request for capital outlay.

(5) Appoint university personnel and provide for the compensation and other conditions of employment consistent with applicable collective bargaining agreements and the Board of Regents rule for university personnel who are exempt from chapter 110.

(6) Certify annually to the Board of Regents the actual classroom contact hours conducted by each faculty member.

(7) Maintain all data and information pertaining to the operation of the university.

(8) Govern admissions, subject to rules of the Board of Regents and as provided in s. 240.233.

(9) Develop a program of continuing education within the university service area when there is a demonstrated and justified need. The university is authorized to cooperate with any public utility, any other governmental entity or private individual, or any type of profit or nonprofit legal entity in connection with the establishment and operation of such a continuing education program, including the acceptance of money and other things of value.

(10) Provide and coordinate credit and noncredit extension courses in all fields which the university considers necessary to improve and maintain the educational standards of the university service area.

(11) Make rules necessary for the establishment and maintenance of a personnel exchange program, by which persons employed within the university as instructional and research faculty and comparable administrative and professional staff may be exchanged with persons employed in like capacities by institutions of higher learning which are not under the jurisdiction of the university, by units of government either within or without this state, or by private industry. The salary and benefits of State University System and state personnel participating in the exchange program shall be continued during the period of time they participate in the exchange program, and such personnel shall be deemed to have no break in creditable or continuous state service or employment during the period of time in which they participate in the exchange program. The salary and benefits of persons participating in the personnel exchange program who are employed by institutions of higher learning which are not under the jurisdiction of the university, by units of government either within or without this state, or by private industry shall be paid by the originating employers of those participants. The duties and responsibilities of a person participating in the exchange program shall be the same as those of the person he replaces.

(12) Approve and execute contracts for goods, for equipment, for services, including educational services, for leases for real property, and for construction to be rendered to or by the university, provided such contracts are made pursuant to the provisions of chapter 287, as applicable, are for the implementation of approved programs of the university, and do not require expenditures in excess of \$500,000. Goods and equipment may be acquired by installment or lease-purchase contract. Such contracts may provide for the payment of interest on the unpaid portion of the purchase price.

(13) Manage the property and financial resources of the university pursuant to s. 240.225.

(14) Establish the internal academic calendar of the university within general guidelines of the Board of Regents.

(15) Administer the university's program of intercollegiate athletics.

(16) Recommend to the Board of Regents the establishment and termination of degree programs within the approved role and scope of the university.

(17) Award degrees.

(18) Supervise all construction contracts.

(19) Administer personnel programs established by the Board of Regents and any applicable collective bargaining agreements under the supervision of the Board of Regents.

(20) Recommend to the Board of Regents any fees applicable to the university and not otherwise prescribed by law.

(21) Organize the university to efficiently and effectively achieve the goals of the university; however, any reorganization which increases the number of administrators or their level of compensation shall be reviewed and approved by the Board of Regents.

(22) Review periodically the operations of the university in order to determine whether the rules and policies of the Board of Regents and the universities are being followed and to determine how effectively and efficiently the university is being administered.

(23) Otherwise provide for the effective operation of the university in the achievement of the goals established for it in the master plan adopted by the Board of Regents.

(24) Adopt rules and enter into agreements for student exchange programs which involve students at the university and students in institutions of higher learning, either within or without the state, which are not in the State University System. Such agreements may provide that the tuition and fees of a student who is enrolled in a university in the State University System and who is participating in an exchange program shall be paid to the state university during the period of time he is participating in the exchange program. Such agreements may also provide that the tuition and fees of a student who is enrolled in an institution which is not in the State University System and who is participating in an exchange program shall be paid to the nonstate institution in which he is enrolled.

240.229 Universities; powers; patents, copyrights, and trademarks.—Any other law to the contrary notwithstanding, each university is authorized, in its own name, to:

(1) Perform all things necessary to secure letters of patent, copyrights, and trademarks on any work products and to enforce its rights therein. The university shall consider contributions by university personnel in the development of trademarks, copyrights, and patents and shall enter into written contracts with such personnel establishing the interests of the university and such personnel in each trademark, copyright, or patent.

(2) License, lease, assign, or otherwise give written consent to any person, firm, or corporation for the manufacture or use thereof, on a royalty basis or for such other consideration as the university shall deem proper.

(3) Take any action necessary, including legal action, to protect the same against improper or unlawful use or infringement.

(4) Enforce the collection of any sums due the university for the manufacture or use thereof by any other party.

(5) Sell any of the same and execute all instruments necessary to consummate any such sale.

(6) Do all other acts necessary and proper for the execution of powers and duties herein conferred upon the university. Any proceeds therefrom shall be deposited and expended in accordance with s. 240.241. Any action taken by the university in securing or exploiting such trademarks, copyrights, or patents shall, within 30 days, be reported in writing by the president to the Department of State.

240.231 Universities; payment of costs of civil action.—A university may defray all costs of defending any civil action brought against any officer or employee of the university for any act or omission arising out of and in the course of the performance of his duties and responsibilities, which costs may include reasonable attorney's fees and expenses together with costs of appeal, and may save harmless and protect such person from any financial loss resulting from the lawful performance of his duties and responsibilities. Claims based on such actions or omissions may be settled prior to or after the filing of suit thereon. The university may arrange for and pay the premium for appropriate insurance to cover all such losses and expenses. The university may use funds available to the university system, not subject to the obligation of contract, covenant, or trust, to carry out the purposes of this section in the amount necessary. Failure by the university to perform any act authorized by this section shall not constitute a cause of action against the university or its members, officers, or employees.

240.233 Universities; admissions of students.—Each university shall govern admissions of students, subject to this section and rules of the Board of Regents.

(1) Minimum academic standards for undergraduate admission to a university shall include the requirements that:

(a) Each student have received a high school diploma pursuant to s. 232.246, or its equivalent, except as provided in s. 240.116(2) and (3).

(b) Effective August 1, 1989, each student have earned two credits of sequential foreign language at the secondary level or the equivalent of such instruction at the postsecondary level. A student who receives an associate of arts degree prior to September 1, 1987, or who enrolls in a program of studies leading to an associate degree from a Florida community college prior to August 1, 1989, and maintains continuous enrollment shall be exempt from this admissions requirement.

(2) Effective August 1, 1991, each student who is admitted to a state university must have completed two credits of sequential foreign language at the secondary level or the equivalent of such instruction at the postsecondary level. A student must earn such credits prior to admission to the upper-division of a state university.

6C1-1.001 University of Florida; Organization. The University of Florida is a state university and land-grant institution awarding bachelor's degrees, master's degrees, specialist's degrees, degrees on the doctorate level, and professional degrees. Its functions are to educate students, to perform research, and to render service

to society. It is one of nine state institutions of higher education, all independent of each other, forming the State University System of Florida. Its uniqueness lies in its land-grant status, giving it a specific and special role in teaching, service, extension, and research. Policies for the State University System are set by the Board of Regents, a public body corporate. The Board of Regents is responsible for administering the Division of Universities of the Department of Education, which is under the direction of the Commissioner of Education, a cabinet officer under the Constitution of the State of Florida. The University of Florida is organized and operates as follows:

(1) The President, who is appointed by the Board of Regents, and serves at the pleasure of the Board, is the Chief Executive Officer of the University, and as the agency head is responsible for general administration and supervision over all the University's activities in accordance with the powers and duties set forth in Chapter 6C-4 of the Florida Administrative Code. The Provost, vice presidents, academic deans, and policy level positions reporting directly or through a designee to the President shall be appointed by the President who has the authority to appoint, remove, and reassign these persons. The President, in accordance with University rules, delegates the powers and duties to administer and supervise academic and budgetary units to their appropriate administrators, including, but not limited to, the authority and responsibility for appointments, removal, reassignments, and other personnel decisions. Appropriate authority is delegated to administrators including, but not limited to, the Provost, Vice Provost, Vice Presidents, Deans, Directors, and Chairmen. Refer to 6C1-7.004(4) F. A. C.

The Provost assists the President and exercises the functions of the President in the President's absence. In the case of death or incapacitating illness of the President, the Provost exercises the functions of the President until formal provisions are made by the Board of Regents. Responsible to the President are the following eight Vice Presidents each of whom is vested with the powers and duties to administer and supervise in the area served:

- (a) Vice President for Academic Affairs
- (b) Vice President for Administrative Affairs
- (c) Vice President for Student Affairs
- (d) Vice President for Health Affairs
- (e) Vice President for Agricultural Affairs
- (f) Vice President for Development and Alumni Affairs
- (g) Vice President for Research
- (h) Vice President for Governmental Relations

The Administrative Council of the University shall consist of the following members; the President of the University, Chairman; the Vice Presidents of the University; all deans of academic units or functions; three faculty members to be elected by the faculty members of the University Senate under procedures to be established by that body; three students to be designated by the

Student Senate; and other administrators appointed by the President. The primary function of the Administrative Council shall be to provide a channel for communications between the President and other Council members with respect to matters of general University concern. The Council shall serve in an advisory capacity to the President and shall not be a policy-making body. However, it shall provide a vehicle for consideration of, or reaction to, policies brought before it by the President or other members of the Council.

The General Assembly shall consist of all members of the University faculty of the rank of instructor and above, or the equivalent in academic rank. The purpose of the Assembly shall be to permit general communication between the President and faculty members. The Assembly shall have no legislative or executive power. The presiding officer shall be the President or, in the President's absence, the Provost.

(2) The Provost who also serves as Vice President for Academic Affairs is the chief academic officer of the University and advises the President on academic matters. A Vice Provost shares the duties and responsibilities of the Provost and acts as the Provost's designee in his or her absence.

Responsible to the President, through the Provost/Vice President for Academic Affairs, are the Deans of the colleges or functions and the Directors of academic units or functions. In the cases of the Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences and the J. Hillis Miller Health Center, the Deans and Directors are responsible to the Provost/Vice President for Academic Affairs, through their respective Vice Presidents, for academic procedures relative to resident instruction and academic personnel matters. In all other matters the Deans and Directors in the Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences and in the J. Hillis Miller Health Center are responsible to their respective Vice Presidents. Refer to 6C1-7.001 F. A. C.

The college is the basic degree-granting unit of the University and may include departments and schools. The college is a unit of the University organized to conduct curricula of study and research and to recommend the granting of degrees. The faculty of the college establish requirements of the college for entrance and for graduation and the form of degrees to be conferred, determine the arrangement and content of the curricula, and recommend to the President, by at least a two-thirds vote, the granting of degrees to those students who have complied with the college's requirements for degrees. The faculty of the college elect annually a secretary whose duty is to keep a permanent record of their proceedings. The Dean is the chief administrative officer of the college. The Dean is appointed by the President. Refer to Rule 6C1-1.0062 F. A. C. The Dean is responsible to the President through the President's designee and has the authority and the responsibility for the administration and supervision of the college and is

the agent of the faculty for the execution of educational policy.

The colleges and schools at the University of Florida are the following: College of Agriculture, College of Architecture, College of Fine Arts, College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, College of Business Administration, College of Dentistry, College of Education, College of Engineering, College of Health Related Professions, College of Journalism and Communications, College of Law, College of Medicine, College of Nursing, College of Pharmacy, College of Health and Human Performance, College of Veterinary Medicine, School of Accounting, School of Building Construction, School of Forest Resources and Conservation and the Graduate School.

Generally, except for the Graduate School, a school is a unit subordinate to a college organized for a special program of studies. The administrative officer of a school — except for the Graduate School whose administrative officer is the dean — is the director. The school may have departments. The department is the fundamental unit of academic and administrative organization. The administrative officers of departments are chairmen. Chairmen and directors have the authority and responsibility for the administration and supervision of all activities of the department or the school. Chairmen and directors are responsible to their deans and to their respective vice presidents. The University Libraries and Florida Museum of Natural History are responsible to their directors and to their respective vice presidents. In the case of IFAS, the chairmen and directors are responsible to their dean for programmatic matters and to the Vice President for Agricultural Affairs for administrative matters.

The teaching, research, and extension functions of a department or school shall be conducted by the faculty under the auspices of the chairman or director. Chairmen or directors are recommended for appointment through the appropriate administrative channels to the President or the President's designee, which for this purpose is the Provost/Vice President for Academic Affairs. Refer to 6C1-1.0062, F.A.C.

Evaluations of each department, college, school or other academic unit shall be conducted in accordance with procedures adopted by the Senate.

The College of Liberal Arts and Sciences administers the courses required of all freshman and sophomore students, and courses designed to meet upper-division college requirements.

The Graduate School exercises general supervision over graduate programs within the University. The Dean of the Graduate School is the chief administrative officer of the Graduate School. The Graduate Council assists the Dean of the Graduate School in establishing policies related to graduate study and associated research. Appointments to the Graduate Faculty are made by the Dean upon the approval of the Graduate Council after nomination by the appropriate department Chairman and/or Director of a School and the Dean or Director of the academic unit.

(a) The various interdisciplinary centers, bureaus, and institutes at the University are established and abolished according to specific funding and program needs. The administrative officers of these units are Directors. These Directors may be responsible to the Provost/Vice President of Academic Affairs directly or indirectly through academic deans or other vice presidents or may be responsible directly to the Vice Presidents for Health or Agricultural Affairs.

(b) The faculty of a College consists of all faculty who hold the rank of instructor and above, or the equivalent in academic rank, in the departments which are part of the College; teaching and nonteaching officers of research or extension, who hold no less than the rank or the equivalent in academic rank of instructor; faculty paid by another College but teaching regularly in the College as part of their duties when so appointed by specific action of the Deans concerned, and the Deans, Associate Deans, and Assistant Deans of the College and the President of the University as ex-officio members.

(c) Advising the Provost/Vice President for Academic Affairs is the Council of Deans which is a body composed of the Academic Deans and Directors.

(d) The Dean of Academic Affairs for Continuing Education is responsible to the Provost/Vice President for Academic Affairs for general supervision of the Division which administers the non-credit evening program, short courses, independent study by correspondence courses (credit and non-credit) and nonagricultural international programs.

(e) Responsible to the Provost/Vice President for Academic Affairs are the Dean of Academic Affairs for Community College Relations, the Dean of Academic Affairs for Instructional Services and University Ombudsman, the Director of Academic Support Systems, and the Director of the Office of Instructional Resources.

(f) Responsible to the Provost/Vice President for Academic Affairs is the University Registrar who is in charge of the admission and registration of students, the maintenance of academic records, the scheduling of courses, and the issuance of transcripts of student records.

(g) Responsible to the Provost/Vice President for Academic Affairs, are the Assistant Vice President for Minority Affairs, who implements, monitors, and coordinates programs of Affirmative Action for faculty, staff and students, and the Vice President for Planning and Budgeting, who administers university-wide financial planning and budgeting, resource allocation, enrollment planning, and incidental revenue management, serves as the Information Resources Manager and the Data Administrator, and directs institutional research.

(h) The Libraries are under the direction of the Director of Libraries who is responsible to the Provost/Vice President for Academic Affairs.

(i) The Florida Museum of Natural History is a unit of the University of Florida created by the

Legislature, and is under the direction of the Director who is responsible to the Provost/Vice President for Academic Affairs. The Museum carries the dual responsibility as the State Museum of Florida and the University Museum.

(j) The University Gallery is under the responsibility of the Chairman of the Department of Art and is part of the College of Fine Arts.

(k) The Harn Museum is under the direction of the Director of the Museum.

(l) The Radio and Television stations, WRUF-AM and -FM and WUFT, respectively, are operated by the College of Journalism and Communications. These provide broadcast experience for students enrolled in the College of Journalism and Communications.

(m) The Center for Instructional and Research Computing Activities (CIRCA) is under the direction of the Director of CIRCA who is responsible to the Provost/Vice President for Academic Affairs.

(3) The Vice President for Student Affairs advises the President on extracurricular and co-curricular matters relating to students. This Vice President formulates, develops, coordinates, implements, and directs University policies and programs relating to matters concerning all aspects of services for students and student life. The units under this Vice President's direct supervision are the Office of the Dean for Student Services, Division of Housing, J. Wayne Reitz Union, Student Financial Affairs, Career Resource Center and the University Counseling Center.

(4) The Vice President for Administrative Affairs is the chief fiscal and business officer of the University and is advisor to the President on all fiscal and business matters pertaining to the University. Among the units this Vice President directly supervises are the Divisions of Finance and Accounting, Human Resources, Administrative Computing Services, Physical Plant, Environmental Health and Safety, Purchasing, Office of Facilities Planning, and Business Services, which includes certain auxiliary enterprises such as Laundry, Printing, Bookstore, Traffic and Parking, and the coordination of all vending and food service contracts on campus. This Vice President also supervises the University Police Department, the Campus Mail Service, and the Operations Analysis Division.

(5) The Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences (IFAS), administered by the Vice President for Agricultural Affairs, is a separate budgetary unit within the University of Florida, receiving its appropriated funds from the Florida Legislature, through the Board of Regents and the President. Its three functions are resident instruction, research, and extension, each function having a Dean who has general supervisory responsibilities with respect to that function. The Dean for Resident Instruction is responsible to the President, through the Vice President for Agricultural Affairs and, in academic procedures relative to resident instruction and academic personnel matters, through both the Vice President

for Agricultural Affairs and the Provost/Vice President for Academic Affairs. Resident instruction is executed through the College of Agriculture, the School of Forest Resources and Conservation, and the College of Veterinary Medicine, which latter College is jointly administered with the Health Center. Generally, in the College of Veterinary Medicine, the professional Veterinary Medicine Degree resident instruction is coordinated through the Health Center; the graduate degree programs and related research in Veterinary Medicine are jointly coordinated through the College of Agriculture, and the Agricultural Experiment Stations, IFAS and through the Health Center; and the research and extension programs involving food and agricultural related animals including horses and aquaculture are respectively coordinated through the Agricultural Experiment Extension and the Cooperative Extension Service, IFAS. IFAS research is executed through a network of seven (7) regional research and education centers, and fourteen (14) agricultural research and education centers, and one (1) statewide laboratory located throughout the State of Florida as a part of the Agricultural Experiment Station, through four IFAS multi-disciplinary centers; the School of Forest Resources and Conservation; the College of Veterinary Medicine; and through twenty discipline or commodity-oriented IFAS departments. IFAS Extension is executed through the Florida Cooperative Extension Service, a program of non-resident educational programs in all 67 counties of Florida in cooperation with the various Boards of County Commissioners and the United States Department of Agriculture. Programmatic support of the County Extension program is provided by Extension faculty in IFAS departments, multi-disciplinary centers and programs, and agricultural research and/or education centers. The Vice President for Agricultural Affairs also serves as Director of the Florida Agricultural Experiment Stations and the Director of the Florida Cooperative Extension Service.

(6) The J. Hillis Miller Health Center is a separate budgetary entity within the University of Florida receiving its appropriated funds from the Florida Legislature through the Board of Regents and the President. The Health Center is administered by the Vice President for Health Affairs and the Associate Vice President for Health Affairs who have the duties and responsibilities for the general supervision of the Health Center which consists of: the Colleges of Dentistry, Health Related Professions, Medicine, Nursing, Pharmacy, and Veterinary Medicine, and the Shands Teaching Hospital and Clinics, Inc., Veteran's Administration Medical Center, Veterinary Medicine Teaching Hospital, the Student Health Service, University of Florida Health Science Center — Jacksonville, University Hospital (Jacksonville) and affiliated clinics throughout the state. The College of Veterinary Medicine, including the veterinary teaching

hospital and clinics, is jointly operated with IFAS. Deans of the Colleges named above are responsible to the Provost/Vice President for Academic Affairs through the Vice President for Health Affairs for academic procedures relative to resident instruction and academic personnel matters. In addition, the Vice President for Health Affairs has major responsibility for the administration and supervision of the Shands Teaching Hospital and Clinics, Inc., which is a non-profit corporation.

(7) The Vice President for Development and Alumni Affairs is responsible for, directs and coordinates the operations associated with the receipt, management and administration of resources generated for the University by the University of Florida Foundation, Inc. and The University of Florida National Alumni Association Inc. This Vice President's primary responsibilities include increasing the involvement and support of alumni and other interested individuals, corporations and foundations in the University of Florida and its programs. Additionally, this Vice President, in conjunction with the Vice President for Research, provides direction, coordination and management of the University of Florida Research Park. This Vice President serves as Executive Director of The University of Florida National Alumni Association, Inc. and Executive Vice President of the University of Florida Foundation, Inc. The University of Florida Foundation, Inc. is a non-profit corporation, and a direct support organization of the University whose purpose is to encourage and administer private financial support for the University of Florida.

(8) The Vice President for Research is responsible for the general supervision of the Division of Sponsored Research; the coordination and development of policy with the University of Florida Foundation, Inc.; general research activities in the University's Research and Development Park; and the promotion and development, in coordination with the University of Florida Foundation, Inc., of research contract and grant activities from the private sector. This Vice President serves as chairman of the University's Research Policy Council.

(9) The Vice President for Governmental Relations is responsible for handling all municipal, county, state and federal relations for the University. Additionally, the Director of the Stephen C. O'Connell Center reports to this Vice President. The duties of this Vice President include the coordination of the legislative program for the University, its Health Center and Shands Teaching Hospital, the Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences and the Engineering Industrial Science Experiment Station (EIES). This Vice President also coordinates the relation of IFAS with governmental bodies and represents the Health Center and EIES before governmental bodies at the local, state and national levels. This Vice President serves as a member of the Administrative Council of the University, participating in general policy-making affecting the entire University.

(10) Also directly responsible to the President are the Assistant Vice President for University Relations, who serves as the University's protocol officer and plans and implements special events and public relations programs, the Assistant Vice President for Information Services, who serves as the primary media liaison for the University and is responsible for directing media relations activities, the General Counsel, who advises the President on legal matters and is in charge of University legal affairs, and the Director of Internal Management Auditing, who evaluates the adequacy and effectiveness of the University's system of internal control and the quality of performance in carrying out assigned responsibilities.

(11) The University Senate is the legislative body of the University and has the power to act on matters of concern to more than one college, school, or other major academic unit or matters of concern which are otherwise of general University interest, subject to approval of the President, and in appropriate instances the Board of Regents, and which are not otherwise required to be adopted as rules by the University pursuant to the Administrative Procedures Act. In exercising its legislative function the Senate may make such rules, regulations and by-laws as it deems advisable for the fulfillment of its duties. Membership in the Senate includes ex-officio members, elected members and student members.

Policies adopted by the University Senate and their application are set forth in the Senate By-Laws and in the Constitution of the University of Florida. The provisions of the Constitution are governed by, and subordinate to, the policies of the Board of Regents and the University rules as set forth in the Florida Administrative Code, and the Collective Bargaining Agreement for those faculty members and Administrative and Professional staff in the bargaining unit.

(12) P. K. Yonge Laboratory School is a laboratory and experimental school operated by the University of Florida through the College of Education. In charge of the school is the Director, who is responsible to the Dean of the College of Education.

(13) The Division of Sponsored Research was established by an act of the Legislature to support and to foster sponsored research and training as a resource essential to excellence in education and to provide maximum service to the State. The Division is a development arm of the University, coordinating its efforts closely with the Office of Academic Affairs and the Graduate School. The Vice President for Research is in charge of the Division and is the chairman of its Board of Directors. This Vice President is also the Chairman of the Research Policy Council, a university-wide research policy council made up of the Provost/Vice President for Academic Affairs, the Vice President for Administrative Affairs, the Vice President for Agricultural Affairs, the Vice President for Health Affairs, the Vice President for Development and Alumni Affairs and the Vice President for Governmental Relations.

(14) The Florida Engineering and Industrial Experiment Station was created by an act of the Legislature as a division of the College of Engineering. Its functions are to organize and promote the prosecution of research projects of engineering and related sciences, with special reference to such problems as are important to the development of industries in Florida. The executive head of the station is the Director who is either the Dean of the College of Engineering or a person nominated by such Dean and approved for appointment by the President. In the latter case the Director's relationship to the Dean is equivalent to that of a head of a department in the College of Engineering.

(15) The budget of the University of Florida appropriated by the Legislature of the State of Florida to the Board of Regents, is divided into five areas, as follows: Educational and General (E & G), J. Hillis Miller Health Center, Institute for Food and Agricultural Sciences, Auxiliary Enterprises, and Contracts and Grants. The Provost is the chief budget officer of the University of Florida.

(16) The University Athletic Association, Inc. a non-profit corporation, has the responsibility for administration of the University's intercollegiate athletic program. Its executive officer is the Athletic Director. The President of the University appoints and is Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Athletic Association. The Athletic Director reports directly to, and serves at the pleasure of, the President of the University.

(17) The University operates on a modified semester system, with one full semester beginning in late August and another in early January. There are two Summer Terms. The dates of all terms are established by the University on an annual basis.

(18) The public may obtain information about the University of Florida from the Office of the President, located at 226 Tigert Hall, University of Florida, Gainesville, Florida 32611.

(19) Florida Statutes that affect the University of Florida are primarily contained in Chapters 110, 240, and 243. Rules of the Florida Administrative Code affecting the University of Florida are primarily contained in Chapters 6C and 6C1.

(20) The principal office of the University is the President's Office, 226 Tigert Hall, Gainesville, Florida 32611. The office is open from 8:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M., Monday through Friday except holidays.

(21) Forms, publications, documents or information relating to where documents may be obtained should be sought at the President's Office, 226 Tigert Hall, University of Florida, Gainesville, Florida.

As Vice President for Administrative Affairs of the University of Florida, I exercise express authority and responsibility to approve funding for decommissioning activities associated with operations authorized by U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission Material License SNM-50. This authority is established by Florida Statute 240.227 and Florida Administrative Code 6C1-1.001(4). Within this authority, I intend to have funds made available when necessary in an amount up to \$25,000 to decommission university facilities in which the material is used or stored. I intend to request and obtain these funds sufficiently in advance of decommissioning to prevent delay of required activities.
