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in 2001, no one ever approached you about being 1 2 unfit for duty or having alcohol on your breath or 3 anything of that nature? 4 MR No. SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: All right. 5 Did vou ever voluntarily go and self-report yourself for a 6 fitness for duty test? 7 8 MR MR NO 9 SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: While working at Kewaunee, have you ever called in and not come into 10 work because you were unfit for duty? 11 12 MR MR SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: 13 Do you know why 14 anyone would suspect that you were unfit for duty, 15 if the allegation is true? No, not really, because 16 MR 17 like I said, I don't know how I could pass through security and everything else if I was unfit for 18 duty, especially after September 11th with the 19 increased security and stuff like that. 20 SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: Okay. 21 I'm just 22 throwing this out as hypothetical situation. Have there been occasions where you and the crew have 23 24 been out drinking at night, and someone might get 25 the impression that you might be unfit for the next

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1 day? 2 Because I don't go MR No. 3 out anymore. SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: You don't have that 4 5 kind of relationship with your crew? MR 6 'If I stop, it's like for 7 a couple beers and that's it. Then I go home. SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: Any problems with 8 any of your workers that you can think of? 9 I had a problem with two 10 11 of them. SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: 12 Would it be a problem that's worth mentioning that someone might 13 start a rumor about you or something like that? 14 15 It's possible. MR. Now 18 19 again, can you characterize what the problem was? 20 Was it a personality conflict? 21 Probably, but like I. MR. said, I think it was -- I don't want to use the word .22 23 jealousy, but -- how do I want to put it? And 20 if there was a problem with alcohol and stuff like 21 that, I think that they would have noticed it, also. 22 And like I said, nobody ever said anything to me. They have to take the first five people, 17 okay.
