

SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: Now would there be any record that supervised you that day? Or was it kind of an off-the-cuff thing, you guys were going to go work for him that day?

SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: Do you remember where he worked? Time of day?

It was probably around an hour after our start time which would have been around 8 o'clock a.m. We were in our fab shop and I cannot remember what the name of that building is. tractor shed is what it was. It had been converted



over into a temporary fab shop for us. SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: Okay. Was anybody 2 3 else present? 4 5 SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: Who else? 6 There were several other 7 people in the vicinity, but as far as being in our little circle of people having a conversation, it was 8 9 just me and 10 SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: And what wa 11 response to you when you raised the concern? 12 It was kind of like a -- I 13 can't remember exactly word for word what he said, but 14 it was kind of put to me like okay, don't worry about I'll take care of it. 15 16 As a result, we didn't go work for him because of the fact that we did bring that up and the 17 issue wasn't pushed. 18 19 SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: Did anybody else go to work for him? 20 No, not that day. 21 22 SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: Do you know if 23 was requested to be tested? .. 24 No, I have no idea. 25 SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: Back to your

Yes, I did. 8 9 SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: And was that 10 provided by NMC or was it provided by Day & Zimmerman? No, it was provided by NMC. 11 12 SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: Okay. Were you required to take a test on the material? 13 14 Sure. 15 SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: Did you pass the 16 test? 17 18 SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: Do you recall whether there was specific questions about 19 fitness-for-duty? 20 21 Yes, there was. 22 SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: And you just stated 23 what you felt was the appropriate procedure? 24 MR. Correct. SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: If you or any 25

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You're not supposed to drink 1 2 -five hours. • 3 SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: Five hours? You can even drink six, 4 5 seven hours before you come to work and still be on. the limits. I mean you have limits that you have to б 7 be under. . SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: And you told him you 20 21 reported it to 22 Correct. 23 SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: Did you tell the 24 Investigator that you were told to keep your mouth 25 shut, however, it was taken out of context?

1 I was told to keep my mouth 2 shut about the problems with the welding. 3 SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: Right. 4 It wasn't nothing to do with 5 FFD. SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: Okay. Was there any 6 animosity between you and 7 8 9 SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: How about between you and 10 11 12 SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: Before 13 happened? 14 Yes. 15 SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: Yes, okay. You want 16 to explain that a little bit on the record? Sure. I'm going to have to. 17 To really give you a real good feeling of what 18 19 happened, I was here in New Jersey working. 20 Artz called me. This was about a week before the 21 Point Beach outage. They were needing welders really 22 bad. She called me three times and asked me to come 23 over to to work. 24 The third time the project superintendent 25 for DZ, Jack Hammers, was in the office. I was on the

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36 speaker phone with him. Mr. Hammers told me that -my concern was coming all the way to Wisconsin to work for 14 days and then be without a job and he told me that if I would come and help him out with the outage at Point Beach that they would roll me directly over to Kewaunee and I could stay right there and work all the way through the January change out. Which was expected SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: to be? Eighty some odd days

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starting in -- the end of September.

kept Jack's word that I didn't have to worry about becoming unemployed. And I stayed





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

motive would be for that, admitting that you -guys had mentioned this to him?


MR. Well, several things there. He had animosity towards me for being there knocking one of his local brothers out of work. Okay. Also, he knows that if he was to have told Security when they did their investigating and I mean NMC, when they did their investigation, the initial investigation about this, if he had told them that we did tell him, then that would put him in hot water. He could possibly lose his access.

SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: Because he didn't do anything about it at the time?

MR. Because we find out now that nothing was done about it when it was reported, so therefore that would put him in the hot seat, instead of us.

When this investigation was done, I wasn't in the area, so my investigation, the interview was done by telephone. Everybody else was done in person, like we are now. You can get a whole lot more out of a person by looking at them than you can by with the telephone.

SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: Yes, you can.



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1 you suspected he might be unfit for duty? Did you do 2 -it to get back at him because there was some problem about the welding issues? 3 No; no. 4 5 didn't have nothing to do with welding issues. 6 SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: Okay. R. As far reporting them, no.

SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: But -- it sounds like you want to say something else.

MR As far as how I report it, no. There's a -- I won't report it the same way.

It will be done in writing with a witness, you know, such as Security or a member of upper management.

SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: Okay, but at the time you worked there, no one ever told you it's inappropriate to report somebody for fitness-for-duty?

MR. No, nobody ever told me.

SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: You were given the training and that's what the expectation was or you believed was the expectation at the time?

And until the investigation was completed by them, that flag would remain in PADS and with that flag being in PADS, there was no nuclear plant in the United States that is going to give me unescorted access.

SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: Now is this conversation with Darlene Peters before you spoke to the Investigator or after?

MR. This is after.

SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: After. So you had already spoken to Mr. Walker?

MR. Yes. Mr. Walker, I spoke to him on January 14th.

SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: Okay. Did they send you any sort of formal documentation that you have been denied access?

R. Yes, I received a register

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2 filth or 12th. I don't have that letter with me, so 3 I'm not sure about the date. SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: Did that letter say 4 basically the same thing that Darlene had told you? 5 Well, it explained to me why 6 I had been denied access. This letter that I got from 7 them did officially deny my access for a period of one 8 9 year which the period began September of my denial of unescorted access was due to untrustworthiness. 10 Was that explained 11 SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: in the letter or is it just that vague reference? 12 13 It was that vague reference. MR. The only thing that I really want you to know on the record is that the whole issue of the FFD violation with Mr the day that it happened and the week that it happened, that that was probably fumbled by a lot of people and it all revolved around Mr.

The investigation that was done or the interview that was done by Mr. Walker, I feel was done illegally and it was done with deception by him stating that he was an Investigator for Employees' Concerns. Employees' Concerns and Nuclear Security are two totally different things. You're told every nuclear plant that you go in that if you have any

issues, have any questions, you're free to talk to Employees' Concerns. They're there to help you to resolve issues or problems.

And us, as workers, rely on things like that to help us get things across to people that are a little bit stubborn, maybe, hard headed, that may be trying to take things too fast. You know what I mean?

And when somebody calls you on the telephone and identifies themself as that person, you're supposed to be able to talk to them and not fear any type of retribution. In this case, I talked to him like I felt I didn't have to worry about anything that I said because it was supposed to remain confidential.

I talked to him on January 14th. My access was denied on January 15th, the very next day. That's kind of coincidental.

And also, he worked very diligently to find me by telephone to do this interview. He could have called me back the next day and told me don't bother drive all the way to Ohio, don't spend your money to work because you're not going to be able to. Which I know are minor little things there that really don't matter to anybody, but they matter to me.

As far as FFD rules and regulations, I

think they're very important. I'm not going to bend the rules for anybody, whether they're a friend of 2 mine or somebody I don't like. They're there for all 3 of us. 4 5 SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: And asked you about the rules? 6 No. And this is the 7 No. type of person I am. This ain't got nothing to do 8 with -- but this tells you what type of person I am. 9 My best friend used to work for me. I fired him one 10 day and he lived with me. That's what type of person 11 When it comes to rules, when it comes to rules 12 on a job, I hold them --13 You fired him 14 SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: 15 because he broke the roles? 16 Yes. Fitness-for-duty 17 SPECIAL AGENT FAHEY: rúles? 18 Insubordination. No. 19 20 That's just to show you what type of person I am. If somebody has done 21 don't show any favoritism. 22 something wrong, something needs to be done about it. 23 And I'm going to try my best. I hope that this gets straightened out, I really do. The whole thing was screwed up from the get go. NMC's

investigation and also I do want to let you know this, 1 2 I don't know if anybody has told you or if you know, but Mr. Cleveland, when I talked to him in July of 3 4 this year, actually June, I'm sorry, end of June this 5 year, I did give him a copy of this affidavit I have from A 6 I talked to him on the telephone. Told him that I did have this information and I did 7 8 feel that it would help my case as far as being denied 9 access. He told me that as far as he was concerned, the only sites that this denial of access pertained to 10 was NMC sites, which the way I understand it there's 11 12 only five of them and they're in Wisconsin and 13 Minnesota, I believe, if I'm correct. He was unaware that him denying me access 14 15 in those plants had also denied me access everywhere 16 else and I figured that somebody being in the position

that he is ought to know that.


