Dear Chairman Dale Klein,

I live in Cold Spring, just north on the river from Indian Point nuclear power plant. I hear all of the sirens being tested -- including the continual testing of a few weeks ago. I also know the congestion of traffic at our stoplight that can occur on 9D and 301. Therefore I am deeply concerned about the emergency evacuation routes should the NRC relicense the plant for another 20 years.

My concern first arose a few years ago. As you may know 9D is one lane in either direction and is the only direct North/South route through Cold Spring. There happened to be a thunderstorm one day that blew out the electricity in all of Cold Spring -- including (of course) the stoplight. My husband and I witnessed the absolute confusion and back up that resulted at that intersection. This was not while people were freaking out, trying to evacuate. This wasn't even a "rush hour" situation, it was a simple thunderstorm.

What came to our minds was that was to be an evacuation route -- the main way out of town for many Philipstown residents as well as folks further south on the river. What would the same intersection look like with the added dimensions of hundreds? if not thousands? of evacuating families in the event of a nuclear accident or terrorist attack at the plant? How long would it be before people started trying other routes -- over lawns and sidewalks, around the gaspumps, through the parking lot? It became clear to each of us that the evacuation plans would never work. We had never really considered that the power would or might also be shut down in areas making streetlights and stoplights ineffective in a mass chaotic migration.

Our town, Philipstown, has since passed a resolution that Indian Point be made into a non-nuclear facility. Many members of our town, as well as my husband and I, worked to inform others in our community of the situation. Once people considered the

evacuation plan and our small streets it wasn't difficult to understand the enormity of the confusion that would result.
