The NRC's regulations now assess Part 170 fees using two professional hourly rates, currently \$217 for the Nuclear Reactor Safety Program and \$214 for the Nuclear Materials and Waste Safety Program. With this final rule, the NRC is establishing one professional hourly rate of \$258 to assess Part 170 fees. For most other NRC licensees the annual fees decreased in FY 2007, primarily due to removal of generic homeland security resources from the fee base. The most significant factor affecting the annual fees is the approximately \$45 million increase in the NRC's total fee recoverable budget for FY 2007 compared to FY 2006. Other factors include changes in budgeted costs and estimated Part 170 collections for the different classes of licenses.
