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**SUBJECT: REGULATORY OVERSIGHT OF LAKE CITY ARMY AMMUNITION PLANT  
AREA 10 REMEDIATION**

Gentlemen:

I am responding to your letter dated July 26, 2001. In that letter you noted that due to delays in completing work on the Engineering Evaluation and Cost Analysis, the Department of the Army (the licensee) proposed to perform a non-time-critical removal action of Lake City Army Ammunition Plant (LCAAP) Area 10 under the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act (CERCLA). The licensee will address all contaminants of concern that may be present, including depleted uranium (DU). The parties (the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), the Missouri Department of Natural Resources (MDNR), and the licensee) agreed that the licensee will remediate Area 10 of the LCAAP under the provisions of Executive Order 12580, CERCLA, and the LCAAP Federal Facility Agreement (FFA). This LCAAP Area 10 removal action will, among other things, satisfy U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) Site Decommissioning Management Plan cleanup criteria for DU in soil (35 pCi/g). EPA and MDNR will have regulatory oversight for such a response action under the LCAAP FFA. The NRC license will remain in effect until this removal action and any other LCAAP removal action related to NRC's letter dated October 20, 1998, are completed.
