relative to a licensee's overall financial health rather than assess the magnitude of accounting data for specific plants. The financial information, in combination with other performance indicators, may warrant additional NRC inspection activity at specific sites. The NRC staff believes that NRC's inspection program will be effective in this regard in identifying potential operational safety problems. The NRC staff intends to use this approach with TVA, as necessary.

With respect to the potential need for a bailout of TVA, we do not believe that the levels of TVA's debt necessarily indicate that TVA has, or will have, serious financial problems. Unlike its neighboring utilities, which are investor owned and can, therefore, issue stock, TVA must rely on debt or internally-generated cash to provide funds for financing capital projects. The NRC notes that Moody, a major debt-rating company, has consistently rated TVA's bonds as "Aaa." (See, for example, Moody's Public Utility News Reports, November 7, 1995, p. 4882.) This is Moody's highest rating and indicates that it believes that TVA has substantial underlying financial strength adequate to be able to repay the principal and interest on its bonds.

Ms. Birnie provided no information that suggested that the attendance of Ms. F. Young and Ms. J. Honicker at the TVA board meeting involved any safety-related aspects pertaining to operation of Watts Bar Unit 1. Accordingly, we consider those events to be beyond the scope of the NRC's regulation of the Watts Bar Nuclear Plant.

Dear Senator McCain:

According to the enclosed informative article, the U.S. taxpayer may soon be forced to provide a massive bailout to rescue TVA from bankruptcy and subsidize TVA's wasteful and non-productive nuclear power program.

The August 1995 GAO report states that TVA is \$26 billion in <u>debt</u> in addition to \$14 billion in non-producing assets tied to its nuclear power program. Watts Bar I reactor has cost \$6.8 billion so far, and is still not complete. If finished, its costs will cause rate shock to users and further complicate a serious economic hemorrhage which TVA mis-management has caused.

I urge you to insist on an <u>independent and thorough</u> investigation of mismanagement of the whole TVA program with special emphasis on their nuclear components, including Watts Bar. A study commissioned by Greenpeace offers a solution: Scrap Watts Bar I and switch to wind and/or natural gas to meet any new power needs. TVA could become a showcase of how to turn red ink into black and still provide low cost power to users.

If the treatment of the two grandmothers mentioned in the article is any reflection of how TVA is being run, then we are in deep trouble. It is outrageous that the two women (and the son of one) were treated so viciously. It makes a mockery of our supposedly democratic system.

Please don't let the taxpayers pay for another scandal. Please help turn TVA around and stand on its own feet.

# WATTS BAR FUEL LOAD DELAYED UNTIL OCTOBER OR LATER; EVIDENCE MOUNTS OF SEVERE ECONOMIC PROBLEMS FOR TVA; TVA RESPONDS BY ARRESTING GRANDMOTHERS

The Nuclear Regulatory
Commission last week told the
Tennessee Valley Authority that
there is still considerable work to
do before the NRC will approve
fuel loading for TVA's Watts Bar-1
reactor—the last nuclear plant
under construction in the U.S.

Although the NRC does not believe any of the problems Watts Bar faces are insurmountable--and fuel loading permission is likely during the Fall--TVA has not completed a substantial amount of paperwork needed to demonstrate that the reactor meets NRC regulations.

Still outstanding are confirmations about critical issues such as fire protection, penetration seals, and other basic safety issues.

The NRC's action buoyed a rapidly-growing coalition of Watts Bar opponents, led by whistleblowers and local citizens, and supported by Greenpeace.

Meanwhile, two new reports suggest that operating Watts Bar could put TVA into bankruptcy, or force a taxpayer bailout of the once-shining federal agency.

The U.S. General Accounting Office, in a lengthy

report prepared for several Congressmembers, charged that TVA is \$26 Billion in debt and has another \$14 Billion in "non-producing" assets tied to its nuclear power program.

Concluded GAO, "As a result, TVA has far more financing costs and deferred assets than its likely competitors have, which gives TVA little flexibility to meet competitive challenges. To the extent that TVA cannot compete effectively and improve its financial condition, the federal government is as risk for some portion of TVA's debt.

"TVA's troubled financial condition has been largely caused by construction delays, cost overruns, and operational shutdowns in its nuclear program. Because TVA has excluded the costs of its nonproducing nuclear assets from its electricity rates for a long period, its current rates are too low to recover all relevant costs. To complete is nuclear construction activities and modernize its coal and hyrdroelectric plants, TVA will have to spend billions of dollars more, adding further pressure to increase electricity rates."

But raising rates to pay off its debt, GAO noted, would make TVA's rates less competitive in a deregulated utility economy, "thus aggravating its long-term financial health."

In short, TVA has spent itself nearly into bankruptcy on its nuclear power program, relying on the federal government to protect it from its own profligate ways. But the day of reckoning is near; about the only question is who will bail the agency out—its ratepayers or taxpayers generally.

Greenpeace offers at least a partial solution. It commissioned an economic study prepared by MSB Energy Associates, which was released September 4, 1995.

The study notes that TVA's fundamental assumptions about Watts Bar-1 are flawed. For example, TVA estimates Watts Bar will operate a whopping 76% of the time, and at a lower cost than any other TVA reactor ever has operated. Moreover, TVA has not included decommissioning costs in its economic analysis of Watts Bar-1, nor has the agency even factored in the \$6.8 Billion Watts Bar-1 so far has cost to build.

The result, the study finds, is that it would be far

watte Bar, continued from page I cheaper for TVA to scrap Watts Bar now-even considering the construction costs--and switch to wind and/or natural gas to meet any new power needs. Otherwise, warns Greenpeace, large electric rate increases are in the offing if Watts Bar-1 operates--perhaps as much as 46%--and even then

taxpavers may still have to bail out

the agency.

Attempting to make these point, long-time activists Jeanine Honicker and Faith Young attended a TVA board meeting in Knoxville August 30. With them was a basket full of lemons.

Deadly, vicious lemons, to TVA--at least that's how the agency treated the women.

When Ms. Young got up to speak and to explain about the basket of lemons (which were meant to demonstrate the economic consequences of Watts Bar), she was arrested.

Ms. Honicker, with her broken arm in a cast, rose to protest. She was arrested too, with a security guard grabbing her broken arm.

Her son, Cliff Honicker rose to protest the manner in which his mother was being treated. He too was arrested.

Actually, at first, none were arrested, they were merely led from the room. But shortly afterwards, while still under custody, word came down--apparently from TVA Board Chairman Craven Crowell--that the three were to be arrested and sent to jail.

The Honickers were set free on bonds of \$500; Ms. Young's bond was \$2,000.

After their release, Cliff Honicker wrote a long, impassioned letter to their family's old friend and fellow Tennessean, Vice President Al Gore.

Honicker detailed the abusive treatment his mother and Ms. Young received, and concluded by demanding a full investigation into TVA and Watts Bar.

A few days later, NIRS and Greenpeace joined this effort in letters to Gore and Congress.

"Frankly," said NIRS' executive director Michael Mariotte, "TVA hasn't shown they're capable of running a public meeting, much less another nuclear reactor. It's time for TVA to permanently end its entire nuclear program.

"I've always had a special place in my heart for TVA," added Mariotte. "TVA was once a great beacon of hope for millions of Americans; now it is an albatross around their necks and a drag on their economies. Franklin Roosevelt would be ashamed to see what TVA has become--but not nearly as ashamed as Craven Crowell and the Clinton/Gore administration should be today."

#### WHAT YOU CAN DO

Write your elected representatives and demand a full investigation into TVA, its finances, and Watts Bar-1. Send a copy of your letter to Vice President Albert Gore.

If you don't want to pay for TVA's nuclear excesses, the time to act is now.
