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Historical Perspective

- Bulletin 2005-02 (July 2005)
 - EP enhancements based on post 9/11 threat environment
 - [Commission expectation] Incorporation of hostile action (threat)based scenarios into routine EP drill and exercise program
- RIS 2006-12
 - Endorsed industry white paper outlining a phased approach:
 - Short-term: Each NPP site would conduct an "off-year" (non-evaluated) hostile action-based EP drill (currently thru CY 2009)
 - Long-term: Work with NRC/FEMA toward incorporating a hostile actionbased scenario as part of a biennial exercise

NEI 06-04

 Proposed industry guidelines for the conduct of hostile actionbased scenarios



Commission SRM (June 29, 2006)

"...coordinate with DHS to develop emergency planning exercise scenarios which would help avoid anticipatory responses associated with preconditioning of participants by incorporating a wide spectrum of releases (ranging from little or no release to a large release) and events, including security-based events. These scenarios should emphasize the expected interfaces and coordination between key decision-makers based on realistic postulated events."

- Refocused efforts on broader picture
- Avoid "preconditioning" of exercise participants



Historical Perspective

- NRC is working with NEI and FEMA in support of the following parallel activities:
 - Conduct of "off-year" hostile action-based EP drills
 - Clarify unique challenges posed by hostile action events
 - Validate proposed industry guidelines (NEI 06-04)
 - Joint FEMA NRC task force to identify potential changes to EP regulations and guidance and facility review/revision process
