Grow and Anderton Constrain SC and Drive Council Dear Mr. Raione: Counties me Service - in meanse 1985 andere for filese acress of the stienteline The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) has received Nuclear Regulatory Commission's (NRC) request to participate in the environmental scoping process and for a list of protected species within the area proposed to construct two new nuclear reactors on the Broad River in Cherokee County, SC. The NRC is reviewing an application by Duke Energy Carolinas, LLC for a combined license for two new reactors, Units 1 and 2 at its William States Lee III facility

near the Town of Gaffney, SC. Your request is being made as required by the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969, the Endangered Species Act of 1973 and the Fish and Wildlife Coordination Act of 1934 to facilitate the development of an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) evaluating potential environmental issues and alternative considerations.

Your request is twofold, to solicit comments from the Service on potential environmental concerns and to obtain a list of threatened and endangered (T&E) species that may be present and affected by the project. This response from the Service will provide the list of T&E species requested, general scoping comments will be provided under separate letter within a timely manner.

A description of the project also includes the installation of new transmission lines extending beyond the footprint of the power plant. As the siting area for the transmission lines encompass York and Union Counties the Service will include T&E species for these areas. Three alternative sites will also be considered in the EIS, Oconee and Anderson County in SC and Davie County, NC. This letter includes the species list found in Oconee and Anderson Counties, SC.
