It is my pleasure to write to you on behalf of the Trustees of McBride Memorial Library. Our organization is located in Berwick Pennsylvania, only a few miles from the PPL Susquehanna nuclear energy plan. Until last year, we were known as Berwick Public Library. Thanks to the generosity of many individuals and businesses in our community, we were able to build a new facility and expand the programs and services of our library.

Not only was PPL Susquehanna a major donor to our capital campaign, but many of the employees of that organization actively supported our effort with their own contributions and by soliciting contributions on our behalf.
