**Lee Nuclear Station Response to Request for Additional Information (RAI)**

**RAI Letter Dated:** August 21, 2008

**Reference NRC RAI Number:** ER RAI 37

**NRC RAI:**

Provide additional quantification of estimates of the economic benefits and costs of the construction and operation of the Lee Nuclear Station.

**Duke Energy Response:**

Benefits and costs shown in Tables 10.4.1 through 10.4.4 have been quantified in monetary terms whenever possible, and their significance to the region has been determined. The market value of net electrical generation at the proposed plant has been estimated. In considering costs, monetary estimates, such as allowance for funds used during construction, are already included in the overnight cost estimate that has been provided. The estimated capital cost of added transmission lines to support the proposed project is also provided.

As noted in the response to RAI 35 (Letter No. WLG2008.10-07, submitted October 17, 2008), the capacity factor is updated to reflect more recent information on the expected capacity factor for an AP1000.

The changes shown below will be provided in the next revision to the ER.

**Associated Revisions to the Lee Nuclear Station Combined License Application:**

1. ER Subsection 10.4.1.1.1 will be revised by adding the following paragraphs to the end of this subsection as follows:

The average South Carolina per capita income for 2004 was \$27,185 (Subsection 2.5.2.1). Personal income taxes in South Carolina are on a tiered system ranging from a rate of 2.5 percent on net income up to \$2250 to 7 percent on net income above \$11,250 (Subsection 2.5.2.3). Personal taxes for the average per capita income listed above would be \$465 plus 7 percent of the excess over \$11,100 or \$1591.

The Lee Nuclear Station would have 4398 construction workers at peak construction, 3079 of which would migrate into the region (Subsection 4.4.2.1). This would result in 1385 new indirect jobs (Subsection 4.4.2.2). At the average per capita income listed above, these indirect jobs would add \$2.2 million to the state's tax base. The U.S. Department of Labor reports construction workers (structural iron and steel workers, plumbers, pipefitters, steamfitters) in South Carolina earn a mean annual wage of about \$35,000 per year (Reference 12). At this wage rate, 3079 construction workers would add \$6.6 million to the state's annual tax base. At peak construction, there would also be 114 operations workers already on site, 41 of which would migrate into the region. This would result in 39 new indirect jobs. At the average per capita income listed above, these indirect jobs would add \$62,000 to the state's tax base. The U.S. Department of Labor reports nuclear power reactor operators in South Carolina earn a mean annual wage of \$56,400 (Reference 12). At this wage rate, operations workers would add \$149,000 to the state's tax base during peak construction. Based upon these figures, total direct and indirect worker wages during peak construction would add \$9 million to the state's tax base.

It is estimated that operations would require a total of 957 workers, 345 of which would migrate into the region (including those accounted for during peak construction). This would result in 327 indirect jobs, including those accounted for during peak construction (Subsection 5.8.2.2). At the average per capita income listed above, these indirect jobs would add \$0.5 million to the state's tax base. At the mean annual operations worker wage listed above, 345 operations workers would also add \$1.2 million to the state's annual tax base.

2. ER Subsection 10.4.1.1.2, paragraph 3, will be revised as follows:

Economic benefits to the local and state economy would begin with the initiation of construction activities. During peak construction, the new units would require a construction workforce of about ~~4398~~ ~~3125~~ people (Section 4.4). These direct construction jobs should generate an estimated 1385 indirect jobs to the local economy. At the average per capita income of \$27,185, these indirect jobs would add an additional \$37.7 million to the regional economy. The U.S. Department of Labor reports construction workers (structural iron and steel workers, plumbers, pipefitters, steamfitters) in South Carolina earn a mean annual wage of about \$35,000 per year (Reference 12). With 3079 construction workers migrating to the region, the Lee Nuclear Station would add approximately \$107.7 million to the regional economy. Operations ~~will~~ require ~~1000~~ 957 full-time workers plus temporary workers during outages, including those who began working prior to completion of construction activities. Of these, 345 are estimated to migrate into the region. The U.S. Department of Labor reports nuclear power reactor operators and technicians in South Carolina earn a mean annual wage of \$56,400 (Reference 12). At this wage rate, the Lee Nuclear Station would add \$19.5 million to the regional economy for the 345 operations workers. Likewise, ~~327~~ ~~316~~ indirect jobs should be generated during operations, including those generated prior to the conclusion of construction activities. At the average per capita income listed above, these indirect jobs would add an additional \$8.9 million to the regional economy. These new jobs should have a long-term beneficial impact on the local economy.

3. ER Subsection 10.4.1.2.1, paragraph 1, will be revised as follows:

Chapter 8 describes the need for power. As discussed in Chapter 8, there is a growing baseload demand and growing baseload supply shortfall in the Duke Energy Carolinas service area. Lee Nuclear Station will generate approximately 2234 megawatts electric (MWe) net (Section 9.2). Assuming an average annual capacity factor of ~~90~~ ~~93~~ percent, the plant average annual electrical-energy generation is approximately ~~17,600,000~~ 18.2 million megawatt hours (MWh). The Energy Information Administration (Reference 13) lists the end customer price of electricity in South Carolina, for all sectors in 2008, as 7.31 cents per kilowatt hour. The value of Lee Nuclear Station electrical generation is estimated at \$1.3 billion per year based on 2008 prices. This new station provides a benefit to the Duke Energy Carolinas service area by meeting the growing industrial, commercial, and residential baseload needs and increasing the reliability of electrical service.

4. ER Subsection 10.4.2.1.1, paragraph 10, will be revised as follows:

Two new transmission line rights-of-way are proposed for the plant (Subsection 2.2.2). This would involve purchasing about 32 miles of rights-of-way for the new lines and costs associated with adding new transmission lines and any required modifications to existing transmission lines. These costs, including real estate, labor, and materials, are estimated at about \$269 million.

5. ER Table 10.4-1, Sheet 1 of 2, Taxes and Revenue, will be revised as follows:

6. ER Table 10.4-1, Sheet 1 of 2, Effects on Regional Productivity, will be revised as follows:

<b>Effects on Regional Productivity</b>	
Construction Workers	<del>4398</del> <u>3125</u> people employed during peak construction, <del>3079</del> <u>3079</u> of whom migrate into the region, adding <u>\$107.7 million</u> to the regional economy. Note: this does not include 114 operations workers who arrive onsite during construction.
<del>Operational</del> <u>s</u> Workers	<del>957</del> <u>1000</u> people employed during operations, <del>345</del> <u>345</u> of whom migrate into the region, adding <u>\$19.5 million</u> to the regional economy.

7. ER Table 10.4-3, Sheets 1 and 2, External Costs, will be revised as follows:

<b>External Costs</b>	
Land and Land Use	Lee Nuclear Station alters about 270 ac. of the 1900-ac. site. No additional land is being purchased for Lee Nuclear Station. A large portion of the land utilized by new structures was cleared during previous construction at the site. There is some land cover change, for example, loss of open fields and meadows. <u>This results in SMALL impacts.</u>
<u>Transmission Lines</u>	<u>Two new transmission line rights-of-way are proposed for the plant. This would involve purchasing about 32 miles of rights-of-way for the new lines and the costs associated with adding new transmission lines and any required modifications to existing transmission lines. These costs, including real estate, labor, and materials, are estimated at about \$269 million.</u>
Hydrological and Water Use	<p>There are some costs associated with providing water for various needs during construction and operation.
