Attachment B - Program Description

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission Historically Black Colleges and Universities Research Participation Program

Introduction

The Higher Education Amendments of 1998 define Minority Serving Institutions (MSIs) as institutions of higher education having a combination of different minority groups that total at least 50 percent of their enrollment. Institutions of higher learning that fit into this category include: Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs): Hispanic Serving Institutions (HSIs); and Tribal Colleges and Universities (TCUs). These institutions play an Important role in the preparation and success of minority students in all disciplines, including science and engineering.

However, HBCUs have traditionally been underrepresented and underutilized In federally supported research, education, and training. HBCUs comprise only three percent of the nation's two- and four-year institutions, they graduate 30 percent of African Americans receiving 4-year degrees and 40 percent of African Americans receiving 4-year degrees In STEM areas (2008 NAFEO Enrollment SUTV9Y of HBCUs).

The Federal Government recognizes MSIs as Important catalysts In the delivery of education to our nation's minorities and has expressed its commitment to strengthening their capacities through White House education Initiatives. Attempts have been made to strengthen HBCUs on many different fronts. Efforts like the Presidential Executive Order 12232 (signed by President Jimmy Carter. August 12, 1980) directed federal agencies to strengthen and expand the capacity of HBCUs to provide quality education. Presidents Reagan, Bush, Clinton, and Bush supported Carters initiative through Executive Orders 12320. 12677, 12876, and 13256 respectively. The National Science Foundation report, Land of Plenty: Diversity as America's Competitive Edge in Science, Engineering and Technology (July 2000), recommended that Congress significantly expand its financial support of historically black institutions and provide colleges with sufficient backing to aid students through grants, scholarships, fellowships, and

internships.

On August 8, 2005, President Bush Signed into law the Energy Policy Act of 2005 (EPA). The U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) received authorization to establish and participate in partnership programs with Institutions of higher education, Including HBCUs, HSIs and TCUs, to enhance their capacity to train students in fields NRC deems critical to its mission. In January 2006 the NRC Office of Small Business and Civil Rights was directed by the NRC to establish a Minority Serving Institutions Program (MSIP), which includes the HBCU Research Participation Program.

In February of 2009, Secretary of Education Arne Duncan stated, "HBCUs cannot simply survive. They have to thrive. The historical importance of these schools cannot be overstated. Their relevance today is as great as at any time in the past." This proposal for the HBCU Research Participation Program is an important component of the NRC/ MSIP's mission to fund minority serving programs, activities, projects, symposiums, and training for the exchange and transfer of knowledge and skills relevant to nuclear safety, security, environmental protection, or any other fields the Commission deems critical to its mission.

ORISE and the NRC-Working Toward the Solution:

The Oak Ridge Institute for Science and Education (ORISE) and the Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) have teamed together to respond to the needs of the HBCUs. With the establishment of the HBCU Research Participation Program In 1992, the NRC became an active proponent for research opportunities for HBCU students and faculty. ORISE brought to the team effort more than 45 years of experience and expertise in education programs. The NRC program will provide HBCU participants a mechanism to achieve the following objectives:

- Familiarity with research areas *an/or* relevant needs of the NRC mission related to science, mathematics, engineering, business, and other fields
- Experience in scientific, engineering, and other relevant research and development activities related to NRC's mission
- Enhanced academic and scientific credentials
- Advanced training and education In areas of the participants' research
- Opportunities for future employment in fields related to the NRC mission

ORISE shall provide assistance to HBCUs, students, and faculty through mentoring. leadership, facilitation of research and development, training, developmental programs, technical assistance, direct institutional subsidies, program evaluations, fellowships, internships, scholarships, cooperative education, student tuition and fees, travel and housing assistance, and other activities that support the science, workforce development, and missions of the NRC. To facilitate outreach and recruitment initiatives associated with the above activities, the NRC may instruct ORISE to purchase various training materials, recruitment and promotional Items of nominal value, and place NRC tagline brand-name logos and NRC telephone numbers on such items.

About the HBCU Research Participation Program

The HBCU Research Participation Program introduces faculty, graduates, and undergraduates from HBCUs to the research and development activities of the federal government through research, education and training activities. In addition, the program provides Incentives for HBCU students to enter into and continue with science, technology, engineering, math, and other careers.

Principal investigators and research staff serve 8S research advisors during the period. Participants receive research training using state-of-the art equipment and technology and interact daily with research scientists in a laboratory environment.

About the Program Administrator. ORISE

The Oak Ridge Institute for Science and Education (ORISE) is a U.S. Department of Energy institute focusing on scientific initiatives to research health risks from occupational hazards, assess environmental cleanup, respond to radiation medical emergencies, support national security and emergency preparedness, and educate the next generation of scientists. ORISE is managed by Oak Ridge Associated Universities. a private not-for-profit consortium of 115 colleges and universities with a mission to provide and develop capabilities critical to the nation's science and engineering infrastructure.

ORISE is in compliance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1984 which protects individuals from discrimination on the basis of their race, color, or national origin in programs that receive financial assistance provided by its clients. In addition, ORSIE is also in compliance with Title IX which prohibits discrimination based on gender/sex in education al programs and activities.

ORISE currently manages dozens of education programs that serve more than 6.000 participants including undergraduate and graduate students, recent graduates, faculty. And postdoctoral fellows. In FY2008, ORISE made appointments at over 220 federal research centers and provided scholarships or fellowships at 215 colleges or universities. These program activities were sponsored by the U.S. Department of Energy, U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission. U.S. Department of Commerce, U.S. Department of Defense, Centers for Disease Control, National Science Foundation, Food and Drug Administration, National Institutes of Health, Oak Ridge National Laboratory, and a number of other national laboratories and federal research centers.

Payments to program participants for stipends, housing allowances, tuition and fees, and travel expenses exceeded \$106 million in 2008. Education programs managed by ORISE are supported by an organization of more than 600 employees, approximately 75 of whom are assigned to direct responsibilities for managing education programs.

Management of ORISE's education programs is facilitated by Government-approved management systems and business processes covering accounting and financial administration, security, procurement, property administration foreign national processing, safety. information technology, and compensation and personnel administration.

ORISE's goal has always been to provide the academic community with access to the resources of federal facilities. Last year, programs administered by ORISE included participants from 604 U.S. colleges and universities, Including participants from 44 HBCUs, 24 Hispanic serving Institutions (HSIs), 1 Tribal College, 5 Native Hawaiian Institutions, 1 Alaskan Native Institution and approximately 350 foreign academic institutions.

ORISE has managed minority-opportunity programs for more than two decades. ORISE's well established networks and other recruitment mechanisms yield applicant pools with much higher proportion of minority candidates are found in relevant target populations. Our success in minority recruitment is well demonstrated by our performance. Among undergraduate student participants in FY 2008, 44.5 percent were women and 17.5 percent were from minority groups underrepresented in STEM fields.

Activities of the HBCU Research Participation Program

The NRC HBCU Research Participation Program offers a variety of research opportunities for participants. For example, the summer program provides opportunities for faculty, undergraduates and graduate students to engage in ongoing research activities at research laboratories or on the HBCU campus. Still other opportunities exist during the academic year. Laboratory scientists may collaborate with HBCU faculty and student teams to continue research projects on a part-time basis at HBCU campuses. The faculty member then serves as research mentor to students on the team.

Both the summer and academic-year components of the program have been successful. Often, HBCU faculty members re-enter the research arena and bring projects back to the classroom. As a result, the ultimate goal of the program has been achieved: new technologies have been Introduced Into the historically black institutions and have been integrated into campus-based instruction and research programs. Students who participate in the program are exposed to cutting-edge research and technology, gain experience in their areas of interest, and are motivated to continue their science and engineering studies.

Opportunities available for faculty, graduates and undergraduates through this program are described below:

Faculty Research. Faculty activities Include, but are not limited to, summer and sabbatical research participation, on-campus research appointments, and travel to attend seminars and orientations or to give research presentations.

- Summer Appointments. Summer faculty participants receive a monthly stipend based on their regular academic salaries or \$3,800- whichever is greater. Round trip transportation is reimbursed for travel between the participant's home or institution and the location of the appointment.
- Sabbatical Leave: Sabbatical leave appointments are normally supported in part
 by the participant's institution. A certified statement regarding sabbatical status
 from the institution is required as part of the application. Sabbatical research
 stipends may include benefits and other costs normally provided by the
 participant's Institution.
- On-Campus Appointments: An HBCU faculty member may develop an NRC mission-related on-campus project after a summer with scientists at a participating laboratory. Others may develop NRC mission-related projects at their HBCU Institutions. The faculty member will generally involve one or more undergraduate or graduate students in the project. Stipends for on-campus research appointments are prorated based on the percentage of full-time

participation. In addition, an academic allowance may be provided to the Institution to cover other costs associated with the research.

Graduate and Undergraduate Student Research. Graduate and undergraduate student activities include summer, semester, and on-campus research appointments. Depending on available funds, travel may be approved if required for carrying out research activities or for making presentations that result from the appointment. Travel and registration fees for participation in professional meetings may also be reimbursed.

- Summer Appointments. Students are eligible to participate In research education and training at participating laboratories during the summer. Typically, an appointment is for ten to twelve weeks. A stipend is paid to the student during the time of the research appointment. Round-trip transportation is reimbursed for travel between the participant's home or institution and the location of the appointment.
- Semester Appointments. Graduate students are eligible for semester appointments when involved in graduate-level research projects or thesis or dissertation research. Undergraduate students will be considered on a case-by-case basis for semester appointments. Appointments are at participating laboratories or on campus for three to twelve months; these may be renewable. Students receive stipends, and tuition and fees may be reimbursed. Round-trip transportation is reimbursed for travel between the participant's home or institution and the location of the appointment.
- On-Campus Appointments. Students are eligible to participate in on-campus research conducted under the direction of a faculty member, typically in collaboration with an NRC contractor. Students participate as members of faculty and student teams and receive" stipends based on part-time participation. Oncampus research appointments may be preceded or followed by summer appointments at participating laboratories.

Applicant Eligibility

To be eligible for the program, the following requirements must be met:

- Undergraduate or graduate student: must be in good standing at an accredited
 U.S. HBCU
- Faculty participant: must be a full-time faculty member at an accredited U.S. HBCU

All applicants should be U.S. citizens or legal permanent residents. It is ORISE policy to recruit an applicant pool that reflects the diversity of our nation and to place participants without regard to race, age, gender, religion, color, national origin, mental or physical disability, or special disabled or Vietnam Era veteran status.

Applicant Recruitment

Cultural differences may affect the participants' education and appointment experiences, and ORISE is familiar with the problems and concerns program participants encounter during their research experience assignments and academic studies. Our policy is to go the extra mile to

help participants resolve any difficulties and ensure that they understand and comply with program requirements. We employ a variety of effective strategies to recruit a demographically diverse group of applicants. The intent is to target as many avenues as possible to reach the largest number of candidates.

ORISE has been recruiting students and faculty for research programs for more than 60 years. The process begins with ORISE's established network of HBCU faculty members who serve as contact points for information transfer, coordination, and recruitment for the program. Special steps are taken to target those HBCU faculty and students who have backgrounds and experience In NRC areas of interest. Then, ORISE turns to its network of scientists and education coordinators at participating laboratories who locate appropriate assignments for prospective participants.

To aid in the goal of reaching diverse audiences, each year ORISE staff members make recruitment visits to 20-25 HBCUs, other MEIs, and majority institutions with diverse populations; attend an average of 10 college and career fairs; and make presentations at regional and national conferences and other meetings attended by minority faculty and students.

Other ORISE recruitment tools include brochures, posters, press releases, advertising, and Web pages. Program brochures are written, designed, and printed for mass mailings as well as for distribution at professional society meetings. ORISE uses customized mailing lists that target HBCU contacts and selected departments to disseminate NRC program literature. Press releases are sent annually to HBCU campus school newspapers to announce the program and its deadlines. If funding is available, ORISE can place advertisements in a number of journals and periodicals, including but not limited to Diverse: Issues In Higher Education Magazine, The Black Collegian, Diversity/Careers Magazine, Graduating Engineer, National Society of Black Engineers Magazine, Black Excellence and US Black Engineer.

In addition to the mailings by e-mail and postal mall, ORAU also has an extensive Web site where potential applicants may review program information 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. During the academic year, the ORAU education information Web site receives 2,500 to 3,500 hits per month. ORISE currently maintains a Web presence for the NRC HBCU Research Participation Program which includes a program description, applications, and links to the NRC and participating laboratories.

ORISE is committed to increasing diversity in science mathematics, engineering business, and other fields. We believe that diversity is a strength in any setting, especially In our nation's premier science and technology centers, where ORISE provides educational opportunities for tomorrow's workforce. It is our mission to attract a widely diverse applicant pool for NRC.

Applications and Selections

In cooperation with NRC, ORISE will design and post an online site for the program materials and application. ORISE will also duplicate and distribute application materials to individuals who request print copies. Interested faculty members and students submit applications and supporting materials to ORISE. These applications are received, processed, and administratively reviewed by ORISE for eligibility and completeness.

Students will submit the following:

- · an application form
- two references
- · transcripts from all colleges and universities attended
- a resume
- a statement of Interests and career goals

.Faculty members will submit

- the application form
- two references
- a curriculum vita
- a research statement
- a proposal, In the case of an on-campus research application

ORISE will review applications to ensure that applicants meet the eligibility requirements established by the NRC. Applicants must be U.S. citizens or legal permanent residents. Students must be In good standing in degree programs at accredited U.S. colleges and universities.

ORISE will enter applicant Information into a database, match applicants with appropriate appointment sites, and prepare flies for transmittal for the selection process. Applications may also be posted on a secure Web site for review.

After an application review, ORISE will contact the selected applicants to verify their continued interest in an appointment and request additional Information as needed to make the appointment. ORISE will then convey written offers to the selected applicant through an official appointment letter. Students are required to sign and return the appointment letter to indicate their acceptance of the offer. ORISE will notify host laboratories of selection acceptances.

The appointment letter and its attachments will describe the specific nature of the opportunity and explain all logistical and administrative processes. Students and faculty will have all the information they need to make a decision about the offer: the nature of the project, name of their mentor, location and duration of the appointment, information on travel and the amount of their stipends.

Selected students and faculty must also sign an official ORISE Terms of Appointment document that is in full compliance with all federal regulations and requirements, and is maintained by ORISE's internal legal staff. This document explains the nature of the relationship between the participant and the administrator. Individuals selected for the appointments do not become employees. They receive guest appointments at the host laboratories and do not enter into an employer/employee relationship with the NRC, ORISE, the host laboratory, or any other office or agency.

Program participants receive stipend payments on a predetermined schedule; faculty members are paid monthly, and students are paid bi-weekly. Because there is no employment relationship, ORISE does not pay FICA, unemployment insurance or worker's compensation, nor are federal income taxes withheld. As non-employees, participants are responsible for the payment of all federal and state taxes based on their program stipend. Participants are informed of their tax liability and are provided with a 1099 form for tax reporting at the end of the calendar year.

ORISE will process stipend and expense reimbursement payments accurately, on-time and with the proper documentation, thereby relieving NRC from having to respond to student inquiries regarding discrepancies in payments.

In processing payments and making logistical arrangements for participants, ORISE will receive Personal Identifiable Information (PII). ORISE has strict safeguards in place to ensure the security of this information. ORISE has a 100 percent compliance rate with respect to the protection of confidential information applicable to our 6000 participants. NRC is assured that it will not be responding to student complaints regarding the unauthorized release of PII.

Appointment Period

The length of the summer research period is generally 10 to 12 weeks. Normally, part-time appointments during the academic year are for nine months, with full-time summer research preceding or following. Appointments for graduate students are for up to one year and may be renewed, subject to the recommendation of the laboratory, the student's advisor, and the continued availability of funds.

Conditions of Appointment

Participants become administratively associated with ORISE. They receive guest research appointments at participating laboratories and do not enter into an employee/employer relationship with ORISE, ORAU. NRC, DOE or any other government office, agency, or host laboratory or university.

Program Evaluation

ORISE requests research participants to submit final reports of research activities and accomplishments. Data gathered by ORISE from participants and research advisors are used to evaluate research experiences and benefits gained by the participants, the HBCUs, and the participating laboratories. ORISE compiles the data into a report that is submitted to the NRC.

Reports and Deliverables

ORISE adheres to NRC's reporting requirements. A summary of these follows.

Monthly Reports: ORISE submits a monthly financial report within 21 calendar days of the end of the preceding month. The report includes a line item breakdown of program costs and the financial status for the reporting period.

Monthly Invoices: ORISE submits Invoices for expenditures within 21 calendar days of the end of time in which services were performed.

Annual Reports: ORISE submits an annual fiscal year report within 45 calendar days of the end of each fiscal year. The report Includes information required in the Fiscal Year Annual Federal Performance Report on the agency's efforts to assist HBCUs, as set forth in Executive Order 13256. The NRC Project Manager offers guidance on the report format. Examples of the type of information In the report include:

(1) For the fiscal year reporting period, total dollar amount and number of awards given and identification of the following: (a) participants and their status (e.g., faculty or student): (b)

HBCUs; (e) amount awarded to each recipient; (d) name and location of each research project: (e) research discipline (e.g., engineering, chemistry); (f) award category (e.g., research and development); and (g) related NRC project or activity.

- (2) Narrative information describing the types of activities performed by the participants: significant accomplishments of the participants and any features of the program that could be replicated in other Federal agencies.
- (3) Information regarding participants' research experiences and the benefits to the participants, HBCUs, and participating laboratories.

Equal Opportunity Compliance Reports: ORSIE will submit an annual Equal Opportunity report on NRC federally assisted program participants.

Other Required Reports: ORSIE will assist NRC in providing data in support of the White House initiative on HBCU report and other NRC related reports associated with program process, outcome and evaluation of MSI programs and activities.

Submission of Other Documents: ORISE provides to the NRC copies of offer letters, along with copies of signed acceptances. Offer letters include the following Information: (1) applicant's name, HBCU represented, and affiliation (e.g., faculty or student); (2) length of appointment; (3) monthly stipend rate; (4) name of research activity, location, and discipline (e.g., engineering. chemistry); and (5) name of NRC project this activity supports, where applicable.

Format of Deliverables: ORISE will provide information and reports to the NRC in software and formats compatible with the NRC environment and with guidance from the NRC program manager.

Conclusion

The NRC HBCU Research Participation Program has had proven success since its inception in 1992. Through ORISE's careful recruitment and placement of qualified faculty, undergraduates, and graduate students in government-related research projects, HBCUs have gained knowledge of and access to the current technology and research of the NRC and the Federal government The program has improved the academic standing of HBCUs and opened doors of opportunity for participants to strengthen the United States' position as a world leader in science and technology.

The Form SF-SAC and the Single Audit Reporting packages for fiscal periods ending on or after January 1, 2008 must be submitted online.

- 1. Create your online report ID at http://harvester.census.gov/fac/collect/ddeindex.html
- 2. Complete the Form SF-SAC
- 3. Upload the Single Audit
- 4. Certify the Submission
- 5. Click "Submit."

Organizations expending less than \$500,000 a year are not required to have an annual audit for that year but must make their grant-related records available to NRC or other designated officials for review or audit.

III. Programmatic Requirements

Performance (Technical) Reports

- a. The Recipient shall submit performance (technical) reports electronically to the NRC Project Officer and Grants Officer as specified in the special award conditions in the same frequency as the Federal Financial Report unless otherwise authorized by the Grants Officer.
- b. Unless otherwise specified in the award provisions, performance (technical) reports shall contain brief information as prescribed in the applicable uniform administrative requirements 2 CFR §215.51 which are incorporated in the award.

Unsatisfactory Performance

Failure to perform the work in accordance with the terms of the award and maintain at least a satisfactory performance rating or equivalent evaluation may result in designation of the Recipient as high risk and assignment of special award conditions or other further action as specified in the standard term and condition entitled "Termination".

Failure to comply with any or all of the provisions of the award may have a negative impact on future funding by NRC and may be considered grounds for any or all of the following actions: establishment of an accounts receivable, withholding of payments under any NRC award, changing the method of payment from advance to reimbursement only, or the imposition of other special award conditions, suspension of any NRC active awards, and termination of any NRC award.

Other Federal Awards With Similar Programmatic Activities

The Recipient shall immediately provide written notification to the NRC Project Officer and the Grants Officer in the event that, subsequent to receipt of the NRC award, other financial assistance is received to support or fund any portion of the program description incorporated into the NRC award. NRC will not pay for costs that are funded by other sources.

Prohibition Against Assignment By The Recipient

The Recipient shall not transfer, pledge, mortgage, or otherwise assign the award, or any interest therein, or any claim arising thereunder, to any party or parties, banks, trust companies, or other financing or financial institutions without the express written approval of the Grants Officer.

Site Visits

The NRC, through authorized representatives, has the right, at all reasonable times, to make site visits to review project accomplishments and management control systems and to provide such technical assistance as may be required. If any site visit is made by the NRC on the premises of the Recipient or contractor under an award, the Recipient shall provide and shall require his/her contractors to provide all reasonable facilities and assistance for the safety and convenience of the Government representative in the performance of their duties. All site visits and evaluations shall be performed in such a manner as will not unduly delay the work.

IV. Miscellaneous Requirements

Criminal and Prohibited Activities

- a. The Program Fraud Civil Remedies Act (31 USC §§ 3801-3812), provides for the imposition of civil penalties against persons who make false, fictitious, or fraudulent claims to the Federal government for money (including money representing grant/cooperative agreements, loans, or other benefits.)
- b. False statements (18 USC § 287), provides that whoever makes or presents any false, fictitious, or fraudulent statements, representations, or claims against the United States shall be subject to imprisonment of not more than five years and shall be subject to a fine in the amount provided by 18 USC § 287.
- c. False Claims Act (31 USC 3729 et seq), provides that suits under this Act can be brought by the government, or a person on behalf of the government, for false claims under federal assistance programs.
- d. Copeland "Anti-Kickback" Act (18 USC § 874), prohibits a person or organization engaged in a federally supported project from enticing an employee working on the project from giving up a part of his compensation under an employment contract.

American-Made Equipment And Products

Recipients are herby notified that they are encouraged, to the greatest extent practicable, to purchase American-made equipment and products with funding provided under this award.

Increasing Seat Belt Use in the United States

Pursuant to EO 13043, Recipients should encourage employees and contractors to enforce onthe-job seat belt policies and programs when operating company-owned, rented or personallyowned vehicle.

Federal Employee Expenses

Federal agencies are generally barred from accepting funds from a Recipient to pay transportation, travel, or other expenses for any Federal employee unless specifically approved in the terms of the award. Use of award funds (Federal or non-Federal) or the Recipient's provision of in-kind goods or services, for the purposes of transportation, travel, or any other expenses for any Federal employee may raise appropriation augmentation issues. In addition, NRC policy prohibits the acceptance of gifts, including travel payments for Federal employees, from Recipients or applicants regardless of the source.

Minority Serving Institutions (MSIs) Initiative

Pursuant to EOs <u>13256</u>, <u>13230</u>, and <u>13270</u>, NRC is strongly committed to broadening the participation of MSIs in its financial assistance program. NRC's goals include achieving full participation of MSIs in order to advance the development of human potential, strengthen the Nation's capacity to provide high-quality education, and increase opportunities for MSIs to participate in and benefit form Federal financial assistance programs. NRC encourages all applicants and Recipients to include meaningful participations of MSIs. Research Misconduct

Scientific or research misconduct refers to the fabrication, falsification, or plagiarism in proposing, performing, or reviewing research, or in reporting research results. It does not include honest errors or differences of opinions. The Recipient organization has the primary responsibility to investigate allegations and provide reports to the Federal Government. Funds expended on an activity that is determined to be invalid or unreliable because of scientific misconduct may result in a disallowance of costs for which the institution may be liable for repayment to the awarding agency. The Office of Science and Technology Policy at the White House published in the Federal Register on December 6, 2000, a final policy that addressed research misconduct. The policy was developed by the National Science and Technology Council (65 FR 76260). The NRC requires that any allegation be submitted to the Grants Officer, who will also notify the OIG of such allegation. Generally, the Recipient organization shall investigate the allegation and submit its findings to the Grants Officer. The NRC may accept the Recipient's findings or proceed with its own investigation. The Grants Officer shall inform the Recipient of the NRC's final determination.

Publications, Videos, and Acknowledgment of Sponsorship

Publication of the results or findings of a research project in appropriate professional journals and production of video or other media is encouraged as an important method of recording and reporting scientific information. It is also a constructive means to expand access to federally funded research. The Recipient is required to submit a copy to the NRC and when releasing information related to a funded project include a statement that the project or effort undertaken was or is sponsored by the NRC. The Recipient is also responsible for assuring that every publication of material (including Internet sites and videos) based on or developed under an

award, except scientific articles or papers appearing in scientific, technical or professional journals, contains the following disclaimer:

"This [report/video] was prepared by [Recipient name] under award [number] from [name of operating unit], Nuclear Regulatory Commission. The statements, findings, conclusions, and recommendations are those of the author(s) and do not necessarily reflect the view of the [name of operating unit] or the US Nuclear Regulatory Commission."
