

**Phone call with the  
State of New Mexico Commissioner of Public Lands  
for the Proposed International Isotopes Fluorine  
Extraction Process and Depleted Uranium De-conversion Plant  
in Lea County, New Mexico**

**Date: Tuesday October 26, 2010**

On Tuesday October 26, 2010, Asimios Malliakos, NRC, had a phone call with David C. Eck, Trust Land Archaeologist from the State of New Mexico, Commissioner of Public Lands. The phone call was with regards to a letter Mr. Eck issued on October 14, 2010, and concurred by Michelle Ensey of the New Mexico State Historic Preservation Officer (SHPO) on October 25, 2010.

Mr. Malliakos received the letter in electronic form without the enclosures that are referenced in the letter. Thus, Mr. Malliakos requested the enclosures which were enclosed as hard copies to Jan Biella, Historic Preservation Division, in Santa Fe, New Mexico. Mr. Eck stated the following:

- 1) The enclosure referred as Lone Mountain Archaeological Services, Inc. (LMAS) report is the report titled "Cultural Resource Survey of the 640 Acres for the Arkansas Junction Site, Lea County, New Mexico, dated May 26, 2009," (available in ADAMS Accession Number ML110940024).
- 2) The referred enclosed map that he prepared can not become publicly available and can not be distributed.
- 3) Enclosures referred as letters between International Isotopes, Inc (III) and Historic Preservation Officer (SHPO) and between III and tribal governments are letters supplied by III (these letters are included in an appendix in the International Isotopes Fluorine Products, Inc., Environmental Report, ADAMS ML100120758).
- 4) His recent e-mail communications with Gordon Environmental, INC (GEI) are not of a significant importance to be transmitted to NRC.

Mr. Eck mentioned that his October 14, 2010, letter is complete and nothing is required of the U.S. NRC. However, if during the NRC's environmental review process any new information becomes available that impacts historical or cultural resources he should be informed. In addition if any cultural material are discovered when ground disturbance associated with construction begins, all work in the vicinity of the discovery should cease, and SHPO should be notified. He also mentioned that the NRC should contact and discuss the letter with SHPO for any information SHPO may need.
