Waiver\_Purpose: UCS provided extensive commentary on the Fukushima accident and continues to engage the NRC staff on lessons learned. The requested information will add to our understanding of the accident so as to more fully inform our positions.

Waiver\_ExtentToExtractAnalyze: UCS has reviewed considerable publicly available information such as the Oct. 2011 INPo report, the June 2011 IAEA report and the December 2011 TEPCO report on the accident. The requested materials will be reviewed to clarify issues and confirm issues covered in other reports.

Waiver\_SpecificActivityQuals: UCS has been very active contributing to the public understanding of the accident. On March 14, 2011, UCS began daily telepressers featuring staffers Ellen Vancko, Ed Lyman, and Dave Lochbaum. Lyman and Lochbaum testified several times before Congressional committees regarding the accident. UCS issued a report in February 2012 about the accident and its implications in the US. The requested materials will reinforce or broaden our understanding of the accident, allowing us to better communicate to these audiences.

Waiver\_ImpactPublicUnderstanding: Based on personal knowledge, the NRC's TTC develops materials with the express intent of communicating information clearly and consisely. TTC personnel were among the NRC staffers sent to Japan following the accident. Their insights coupled with their skill at communicating make the requested materials very useful tools in understanding the accident. The constituent facts may already be available in numerous spots on the web, but the requested materials will likely be the best distillations of that available information.

Waiver\_NatureOfPublic: Many local and state officials and many more members of the pubic have contacted UCS regarding the accident and its implications here. Those interactions continue as NRC issues orders and proceeds with rulemaking on other lessons learned. The requested materials will enable these audiences to better understand the accident so as to better assess potential solutions being debated.

Waiver\_MeansOfDissemination: UCS will continue to provide information to Congress (either via hearings or via direct staff meetings), to the media, to the public (via email, website postings, and public meetings), and issue reports and briefs posted to our website, [www.ucsusa.org](http://www.ucsusa.org).
