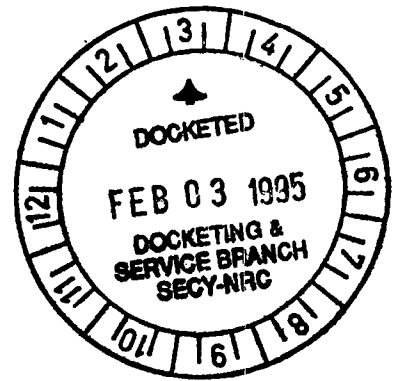

**STIPULATED SUPPLEMENTAL MOTION FOR PROTECTIVE ORDER**

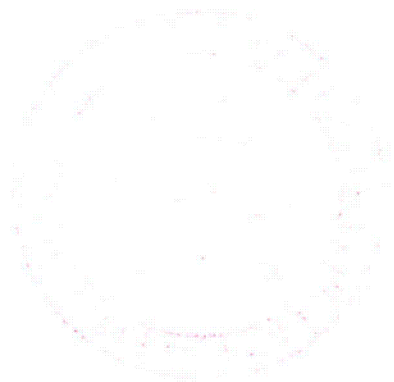
Pursuant to the direction of the Atomic Safety and Licensing Board at the January 27, 1995 hearing regarding the pending Motion for Protective Order, General Atomics respectfully submits this Stipulated Supplemental Motion for Protective Order. All parties to this proceeding except the NRC Staff have authorized the undersigned counsel to represent to the Licensing Board that they agree: (1) that the language set forth below should be included in the Proposed Protective Order, and (2) that it should be included as a numbered paragraph immediately following paragraph 5 of the Proposed Protective Order (attached as Enclosure 1 to the December 2, 1994 Motion for Protective Order of Sequoyah Fuels Corporation). Despite efforts to do so, the undersigned counsel has been unable to determine the position of the NRC Staff on this proposed language.

Proposed Language:

6. Protected Discovery Material may be disclosed to employees of the Commission's Assistant General Counsel for General Legal Services and the Office of Public Information, but solely for purposes of review

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pursuant to any requests filed under the Freedom of Information Act, 5 U.S.C. § 552(a). Such employees shall thoroughly review all Protected Discovery Material covered by requests filed under the Freedom of Information Act and determine whether the exemptions in 5 U.S.C. § 552(b) apply. Documents covered by any such exemption shall not be released. In addition, such employees shall not authorize the release of such Protected Discovery Material to any other person without first providing the party which produced the material notice in writing at least 5 working days prior to such release of the intention to release such Protected Discovery Material. In the event of such notice, the producing party shall have the right to apply to the Licensing Board for a determination that the Protected Discovery Material comes within the exceptions listed in 5 U.S.C. § 552(b) and should not be released or to take such other action as it deems appropriate. If the producing party takes the position that Protected Discovery Material or any other documents produced in discovery are not agency records subject to the Freedom of Information Act, that party may present argument to the Licensing Board in support of that position at that time.

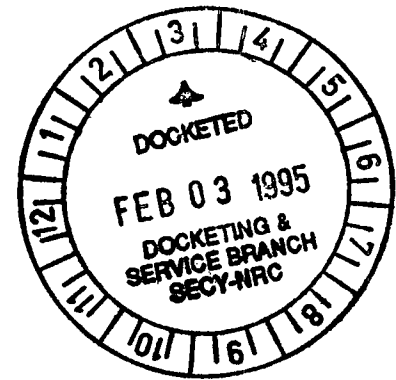


