


PROGRAM SCOPE

This large multi-site engineering and consulting company employed 400 individuals (23 radiographers and 10 assistants) and offered NDE services (isotope, mag particle, ultrasound, etc.). The majority of the licensee's activities were conducted under various Agreement State licenses (Louisiana, Florida, Minnesota, and Wisconsin). The NRC-licensed activities authorized under this license were limited to two field stations in Gary, Indiana, and Beresford, South Dakota. This firm owned 15 QSA Global cameras. Radiography was performed daily at temporary job sites using 2-man teams. All of the radiographic operations were conducted at temporary job sites. No radiography (i.e., on the business property) was conducted under the provisions of this NRC license.

This inspection at the corporate office was limited to a review of selected records and interviews with licensee personnel. The inspector reviewed documents pertaining to utilization logs, certifications, operating and emergency procedures and NRC Regulations. Each field station maintained its records of dosimetry, equipment maintenance, audits, etc.
