Dear Mr. King,

On May 22, 2012, the Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) petition review board (PRB) met internally to discuss your Title 10 of the *Code of Federal Regulations* Part 2, Section 206 (10 CFR 2.206) petition request for immediate action to shut down or not let the nuclear plants, Saint Lucie and Turkey Point, start up until a criminal investigation of the AMES Group LLC is complete and everything has been verified safe. As the basis for the request, you state that the AMES Group LLC submitted forged or falsified training documents to Florida Power & Light Company stating that personnel have attended AMES advanced MOV diagnostic training class.

The NRC staff will make two decisions concerning your petition. First, the Staff considers your request for immediate action. Second, the Staff will decide whether to accept or deny your petition by applying the criteria of 10 CFR 2.206(a). The purpose of this email is to notify you of the PRB's decision regarding your request for immediate action.

The PRB has denied your request for immediate action because the NRC staff does not have sufficient information at this time to support an action to shut down or prohibit the start up of the Saint Lucie and Turkey Point plants. Currently, the NRC has identified no immediate safety concerns at Turkey Point or Saint Lucie, and thus no impact to the health and safety of the public.

The NRC staff is investigating thoroughly the concerns that you have raised.

The PRB will recommend appropriate action should additional information become available that demonstrates unsatisfactory impacts to safety-related equipment.

NRC Management Directive 8.11, Review Process for 10 CFR 2.206 Petitions, allows a petitioner an opportunity to present additional information to supplement or clarify the original request during a PRB meeting to be held via telephone conference or in person. The meeting is an opportunity for you to support your request in advance of the PRB making its initial decision. Please advise me by **Wednesday, June 20, 2012**, if you would like to address the PRB. If you would like to meet in person, I will contact you to schedule a formal public meeting at the NRC Headquarters. If you would prefer to address the PRB via telephone conference, I will coordinate a date/time the meeting in the upcoming weeks.

The NRC Staff continues its investigation concerning your petition. The PRB will review and evaluate all relevant information submitted orally and in writing before it decides whether to accept your petition for enforcement action. Once an initial decision has been made, the PRB will inform you of this decision and offer you a second opportunity to address the PRB before it issues a final decision on whether to accept your Section 2.206 petition.
