The estimated number of annual respondents: 62 (60 recordkeepers + 2 owners groups) An estimate of the total number of hours needed annually to complete the requirement or request: 119,309

*Abstract:* In response to the Great East Japan Earthquake of March 11, 2011, the NRC is seeking to: (1) permanently write into agency rules the requirements already imposed by the Order EA-12-049 and Order EA-12-051; (2) create regulatory requirements for Severe Accident Management Guidelines (SAMGs) to promote consistency across industry; and (3) incorporate emergency preparedness-related industry initiatives into the regulations.

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The U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission is seeking public comment on the potential impact of the information collections contained in this proposed rule and on the following issues:

1. Is the proposed information collection necessary for the proper performance of the functions of the NRC, including whether the information will have practical utility?

2. Is the estimate of burden accurate?

3. Is there a way to enhance the quality, utility, and clarity of the information to be collected?

4. How can the burden of the information collection be minimized, including the use of automated collection techniques?
