SUBJECT: UPDATE OF NATIONAL HISTORIC PRESERVATION ACT, SECTION 106
CONSULTATION FOR THE PROPOSED CROW BUTTE RESOURCES, INC. IN
SITU URANIUM RECOVERY MARSLAND EXPANSION AREA, DAWES COUNTY,
NEBRASKA

Dear President Brewer:

This letter serves to provide your office with an update of the status of National Historic Preservation Act, Section 106 Consultation for the proposed Crow Butte Resources, Inc. (CBR) Marsland Expansion Area (MEA) in Dawes County, Nebraska. On October 30, 2014, the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) sent a letter to the Nebraska State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) seeking concurrence with the NRC staff's finding of no historic properties affected within the area of potential effect (APE) for the proposed MEA project (ML14295A516). Nebraska SHPO replied with concurrence by letter dated November 18, 2014 (ML14343A537). Nebraska SHPO also indicated that their determination does not constitute the opinions of any Native American Tribes that may have interest in Traditional Cultural Properties (TCPs) potentially affected by this project.

TCPs are sites or areas of historic, cultural, or religious significance to Tribes or other historic properties present. Based on the information found in the TCP survey and the NRC staff's independent analysis, the NRC staff has preliminarily concluded that there are no TCPs within the APE of the proposed MEA project. Before finalizing this determination, the NRC staff is providing consulting Native American Tribes with the opportunity to provide additional information regarding the presence of TCPs in the APE. The NRC's final determination will be included in the final National Environmental Policy Act review documentation for the proposed MEA.

For additional information regarding the proposed action, CBR's license applications are publicly available in the Agencywide Documents Access and Management System (ADAMS). As a reminder, public documentation pertaining to the cultural resources evaluation for the proposed MEA project has been made available on the NRC's website, <http://www.nrc.gov/materials/uranium-recovery/license-apps/marsland/section106-marsland.html>. Although the public comment period closed on July 30, 2014, the NRC staff recommends these documents as they may inform your review if you wish to provide additional information.
