Dear Mr. Persinko:

Thank you for your letter of October 21, 2015, which we received on October 30, 2015, regarding the invitation for Section 106 consultation regarding the U.S. Army's request for Amendment of Materials License No. SUC-1593 to include additional sites that possess depleted uranium from the Davy Crockett weapon system. We also received a map of a portion of Fort Jackson as supporting documentation for this undertaking. The State Historic Preservation Office is providing comments to the Nuclear Regulatory Commission pursuant to Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act and its implementing regulations, 36 CFR 800. Consultation with the SHPO is not a substitution for consultation with Tribal Historic Preservation Offices, other Native American tribes, local governments, or the public.

Over the past decade Fort Jackson has carried out historic property identification surveys on the installation. Based on the map provided, it appears that one archaeological site (38RD752) may be within the boundary of Range 62, but it is ineligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP). Other adjacent sites are also ineligible for listing in the NRHP. Based on these previous identification efforts, our office would concur with an assessment that **no properties listed in or eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places will be affected** by this license amendment. If the boundary of the affected area changes from that shown in the enclosed map, we would request that we be provided with the new boundaries.
