Dear Mr. Cooper:

Enclosed is Amendment No. 09 to your NRC Material License No. 21-32793-01 in accordance with your request. Please note that the changes made to your license are printed in **bold** font.

We reviewed your amendment request dated February 18, 2016. Based on your provided information, we have concluded that all licensable radioactive material has been removed from your facility and residual radioactive material attributable to licensed activities does not exceed NRC requirements. Therefore, we have authorized the release of facilities located at 2520 S. University Park Drive, Suite D-200, Mt. Pleasant, Michigan, for unrestricted use.

In addition, we updated License Condition 15 regarding the inventory record retention period in accordance with our licensing policy and License Condition 17 regarding the additional security requirement for portable gauges because a part of this condition is superseded by 10 CFR 30.34(i).



You will be periodically inspected by NRC. Failure to conduct your program in accordance with NRC regulations, license conditions, and representations made in your license application and supplemental correspondence with NRC will result in enforcement action against you. This could include issuance of a notice of violation, or imposition of a civil penalty, or an order suspending, modifying or revoking your license as specified in the General Statement of Policy and Procedure for NRC Enforcement Actions. Since serious consequences to employees and the public can result from failure to comply with NRC requirements, prompt and vigorous enforcement action will be taken when dealing with licensees who do not achieve the necessary meticulous attention to detail and the high standard of compliance which NRC expects of its licensees.

The NRC's Safety Culture Policy Statement became effective in June 2011. While a policy statement and not a regulation, it sets forth the agency's *expectations* for individuals and organizations to establish and maintain a positive safety culture.
