SUBJECT: NRC INSPECTION REPORT NO. 03012851/2016002, CHILDREN'S NATIONAL MEDICAL CENTER, AND NOTICE OF VIOLATION

Dear Dr. Newman:

On June 20, 2016, James Cassata of this office commenced a safety inspection, which continued in office until October 12, 2016. The inspection was an examination of your licensed activities as they relate to radiation safety and to compliance with the Commission's regulations and the license conditions. The inspection consisted of observations by the inspector, interviews with personnel, and a selective examination of representative records. The findings of the inspection were discussed with Dr. Sarah McKenney of your organization at the conclusion of the inspection on October 12, 2016.

Based on the results of this inspection, the NRC determined that one Severity Level IV violation of NRC requirements occurred. The violation was evaluated in accordance with the NRC Enforcement Policy. The current Enforcement Policy is included on the NRC's Web site at <http://www.nrc.gov/about-nrc/regulatory/enforcement/enforce-pol.html>. The violation is cited in the Notice of Violation (Notice), provided as Enclosure 1 to this letter. The violation is cited because it was identified by the NRC. Enclosure 2 provides a determination of severity level and a description of the corrective actions taken by Children's National Medical Center to address the violation.

The NRC has concluded that information regarding the reason for the violation and the corrective actions taken and planned to correct the violation and prevent recurrence is already adequately addressed in our records. Therefore, you are not required to respond to this letter unless the description of your corrective actions in Enclosure 2 does not accurately reflect your actions or your position. In that case, or if you choose to provide additional information, you should follow the instructions specified in the enclosed Notice.
