

RE: PROPOSED SAN JOAQUIN NUCLEAR

We commend the staff of the Nuclear Regulatory Commission for your diligent investigation into the earthquake fault conditions at the site of the proposed San Joaquin Nuclear Project in Kern County, California (NRC #499).

Our review of documents in the local public library indicates that the Commission has not wavered in its determination to receive accurate and complete information from the applicant before considering issuance of preliminary site approval in regard to limited issues including earthquake safety.

The recent discovery of the importance of the Hosgri Zone Fault offshore the Diablo Canyon facility in California reportedly imperils licensing of that facility when construction is completed.

Clearly, the cautious approach being taken by the Commission in connection with the San Joaquin Project is very wise.

It is always less expensive to learn about major siting deterents, such as earthquake dangers, before binding commitments are made or any site work commences.
