I am writing to you because I am adamantly opposed to Pacific Gas and Electric Company's request to extend the operation of the Diablo Canyon Nuclear plant for an additional 15 years, until the year 2025. This plant should never have been allowed to operate in the first place since it was mistakenly sited next to a major active earthquake fault, and experienced more than 10 years of serious errors in its design and construction. It is outrageous that the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission is seriously considering this extension, and it is important that you know that many of your constituents find this completely unacceptable. Not only does the plant present special dangers because of its very dangerous location, but PG&E has no plans at all for storing an extra 25 years of high level radioactive wastes which would be produced at the plant. The plant site has also become a radioactive waste storage site, with all of the dangers attached to that.


As you know, the prevailing winds blow south from Diablo Canyon, putting Santa Barbara directly in the path of all radioactive emissions, whether planned routine emissions, or accidental releases. This extension is simply too much to ask the residents of Santa Barbara to accept, since it poses dangers both now, and for generations into the future.

I want you to demand that the Nuclear Regulatory Commission reject the request for a license extension! I look forward to hearing from you.
