On our materials licenses, we explicitly list materials that are only authorized for storage only, then we verify during inspection that no work has been done with them and check on progress to dispose of the materials. It helps us as inspectors to know that certain materials should not be 'used'. So my vote is to at least keep that information in the tie-down.

Nothing else for renewal, except to remove the source material that is under the Commonwealth of Massachusetts jurisdiction.

I'm still plugging along on the MIT renewal. I pretty much have most of my input. There are some crit issues we are still dealing with. I'm putting together my SER. I wanted to ask you two things:

- 1) Can you give me any kind of summary of enforcement history for MIT? I don't need you to give me a formal report because I know you have plenty of things to do, but if you can give me a few sentences to let me know of anything you've found in recent history? If there was anything major since the last renewal (April 2006), I would appreciate either an accession number or some kind of statement on the matter.
- 2) Right now in their license, there is a tie-down for material they possess for storage only. Do you feel that is important as tie down condition? Would it be enough to note that in the cover letter for the renewal when it comes out or do you feel like it should continue to be tied down?
- 3) Since I've got your attention, if there is anything else you feel should be noted or included in their renewal, please let me know.
