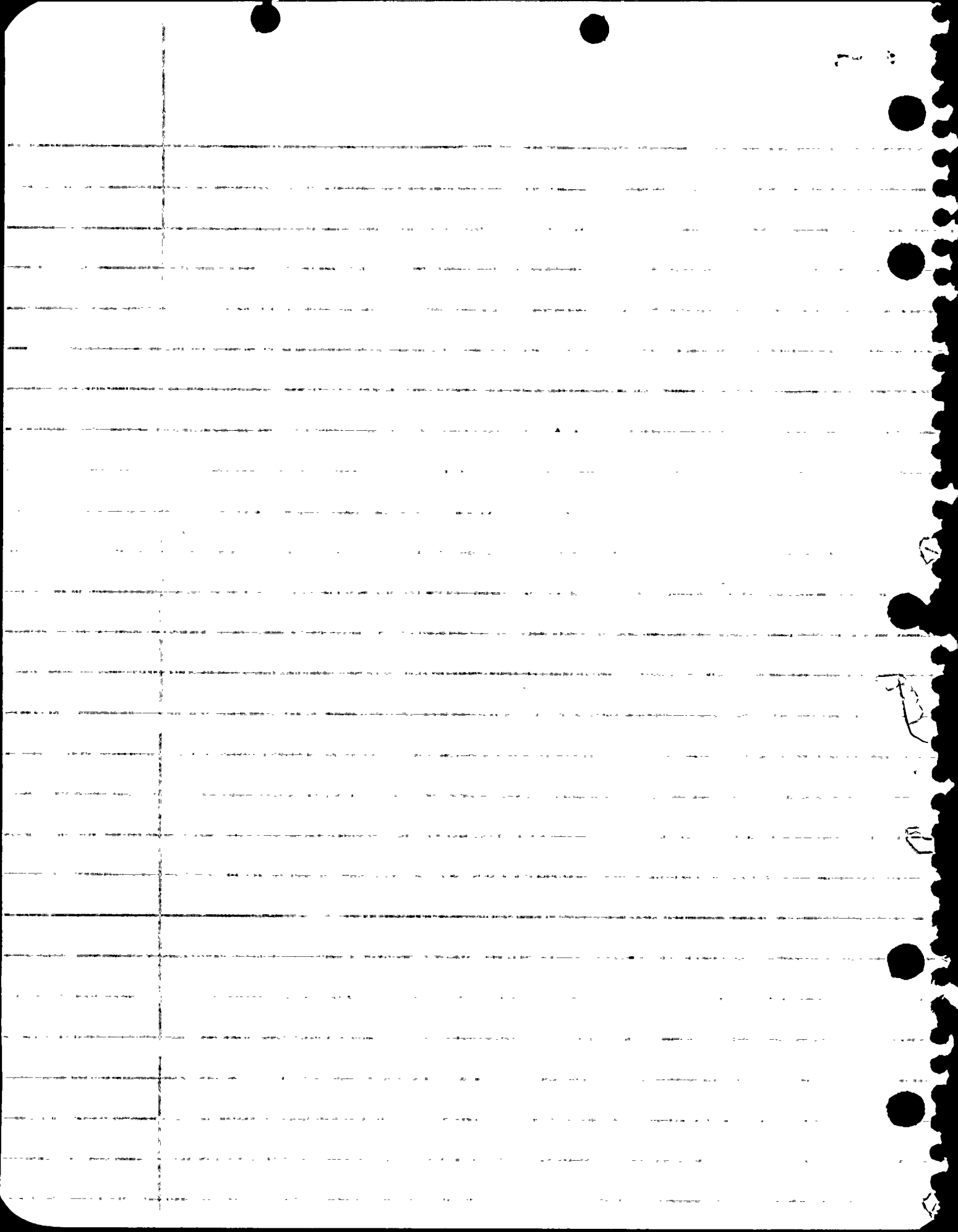

If I may ask a favor of you, I would be greatly grateful if you could send me

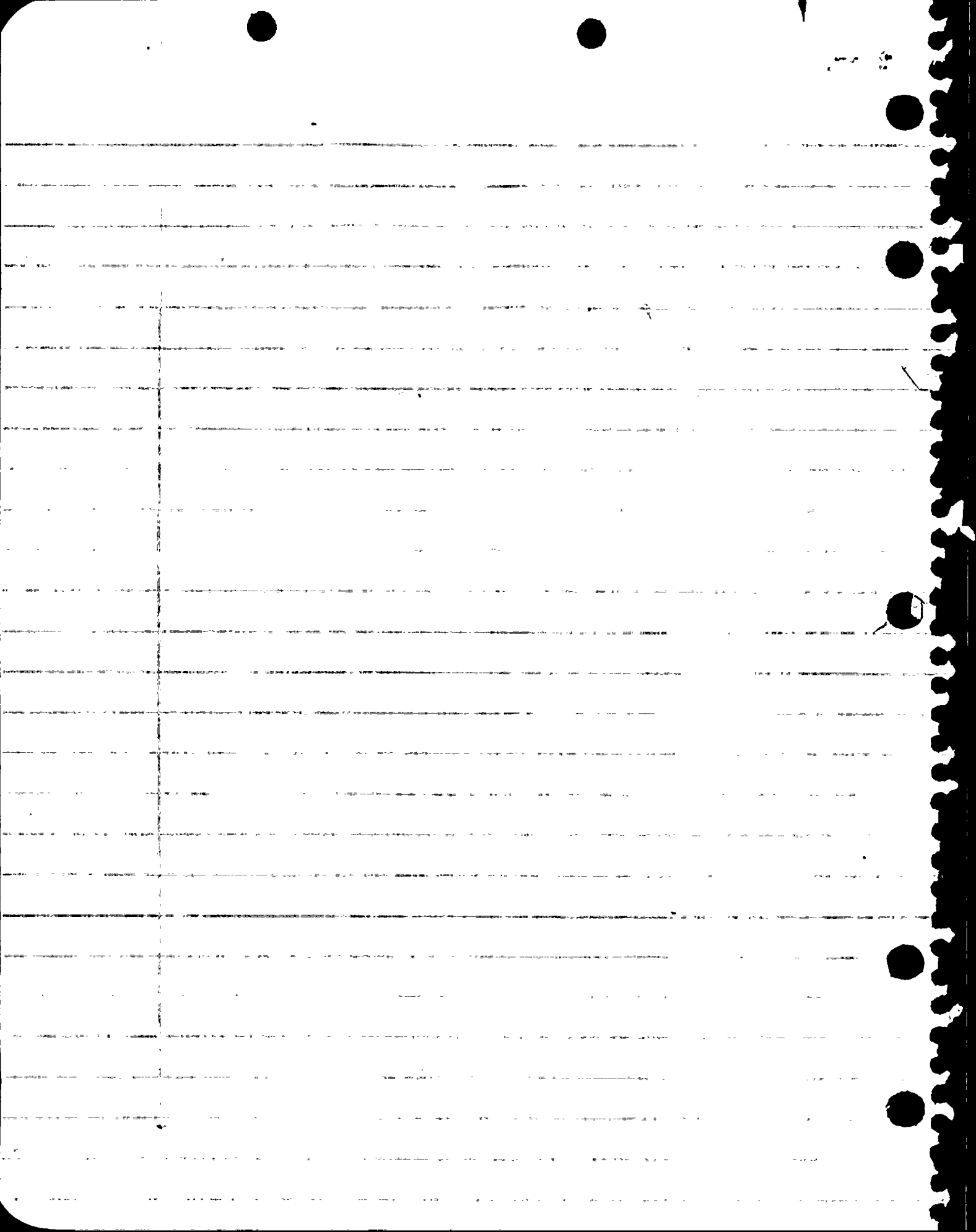


the straight facts on nuclear power as a

Dear Mr. & Mrs. Erickson:

This is in response to what appears to be a form letter opposing nuclear power in general and Diablo Canyon Nuclear Plant in particular, a copy of which was addressed to Chairman Hendrie.

The Nuclear Regulatory Commission is the federal agency established by Congress to regulate the peaceful uses of nuclear energy, including nuclear power. As a regulatory agency, we do not take a position for or against nuclear power per se. Rather, our job is to make every effort to reasonably assure protection of public health and safety from potential radiological hazards. To carry out these responsibilities we conduct a comprehensive regulatory program of licensing, rulemaking, inspection and enforcement.

The Diablo Canyon Nuclear Plant is still undergoing the licensing process. Whether or not the license applicant will receive an operating license will depend upon the results of that process which is described in some detail in the enclosure.

Is a future, contaminated by the diseases of radiation what you'll choose for "our" world's children?



Beyond that, we have no reason to assume that local, state and/or Federal law enforcement personnel will not carry out their respective duties as appropriate in any given circumstances.

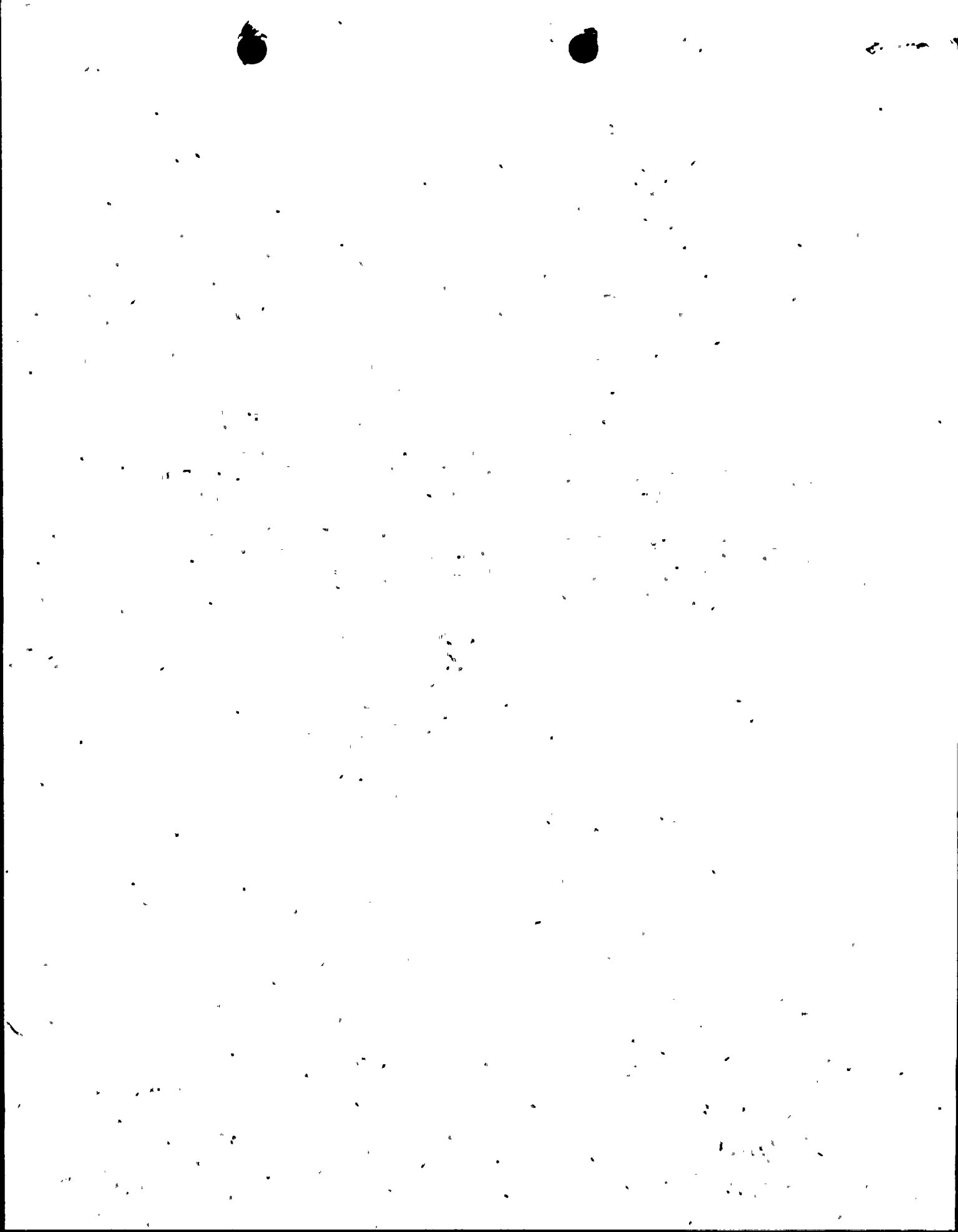

Dear Ms. von Ruden:

Your recent letter to Chairman Hendrie has been referred to our office for reply.

Your first three questions involve matters which do not appear to fall under this agency's regulatory purview, so I will address briefly questions four through six.

The Diablo Canyon Nuclear Power Station is not built on an earthquake fault; there is, however, a large, active fault a short distance off shore from that facility. The plant has been designed to withstand a postulated earthquake on that fault. The Maine Yankee Nuclear Power Station was not prevented from opening but was shutdown to determine if any modifications were required in some safety-related piping systems to bring them into conformance with design requirements for withstanding earthquakes.

As you may be aware, the Atomic Safety and Licensing Board which is conducting a public hearing to consider Pacific Gas and Electric's application to operate the Diablo Canyon facility has issued a Partial Initial Decision making favorable findings on some issues including the ability of the plant to withstand earthquakes. However, the Board has received a motion to reopen the hearing on issues related to the March 28 accident at the Three Mile Island Nuclear Power Station and is waiting for a report from the NRC Staff before deciding this matter. Also, the Board will be bound by the provisions of the Commission's October 4 Interim Statement of Policy and Procedure on the licensing of nuclear power plants. A copy is enclosed for your information.

Finally, I have seen Paul Jacobs' production "The Nuclear Gang," but I do not remember enough about it to comment.

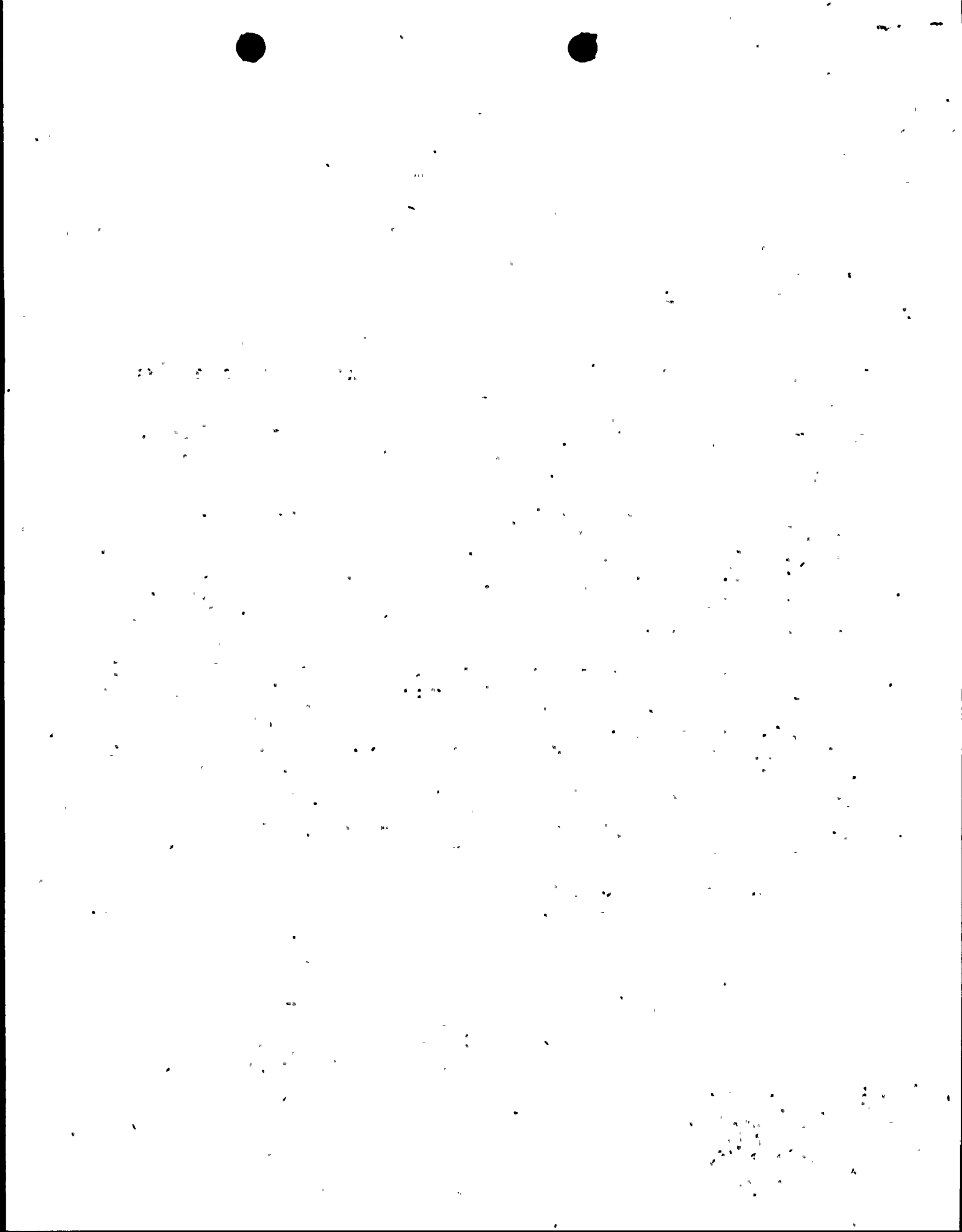
