Dear Mr. Hendrie:

We are citizens of the California central coast, living in a town called Cayucos, which is approximately 25 miles north of the Diablo Canyon nuclear power plant. We are very opposed to and concerned about the recent push to license Diablo.

We feel that the "emergency planning" has been a failure. If there was in fact an accident, we feel that there would be such a panic that any "plan" would be ineffective. Also, our physician and many others in the area have expressed the opinion that our medical facilities are inadequately staffed and equipped to assist any number of accident victims.

With the plant site less than three miles from the Hosgri fault, we are naturally concerned about earthquake damage to the plant.

There remains too many questions that have gone unanswered. Because of these unresolved issues we are strongly opposed to the licensing of Diablo Canyon.

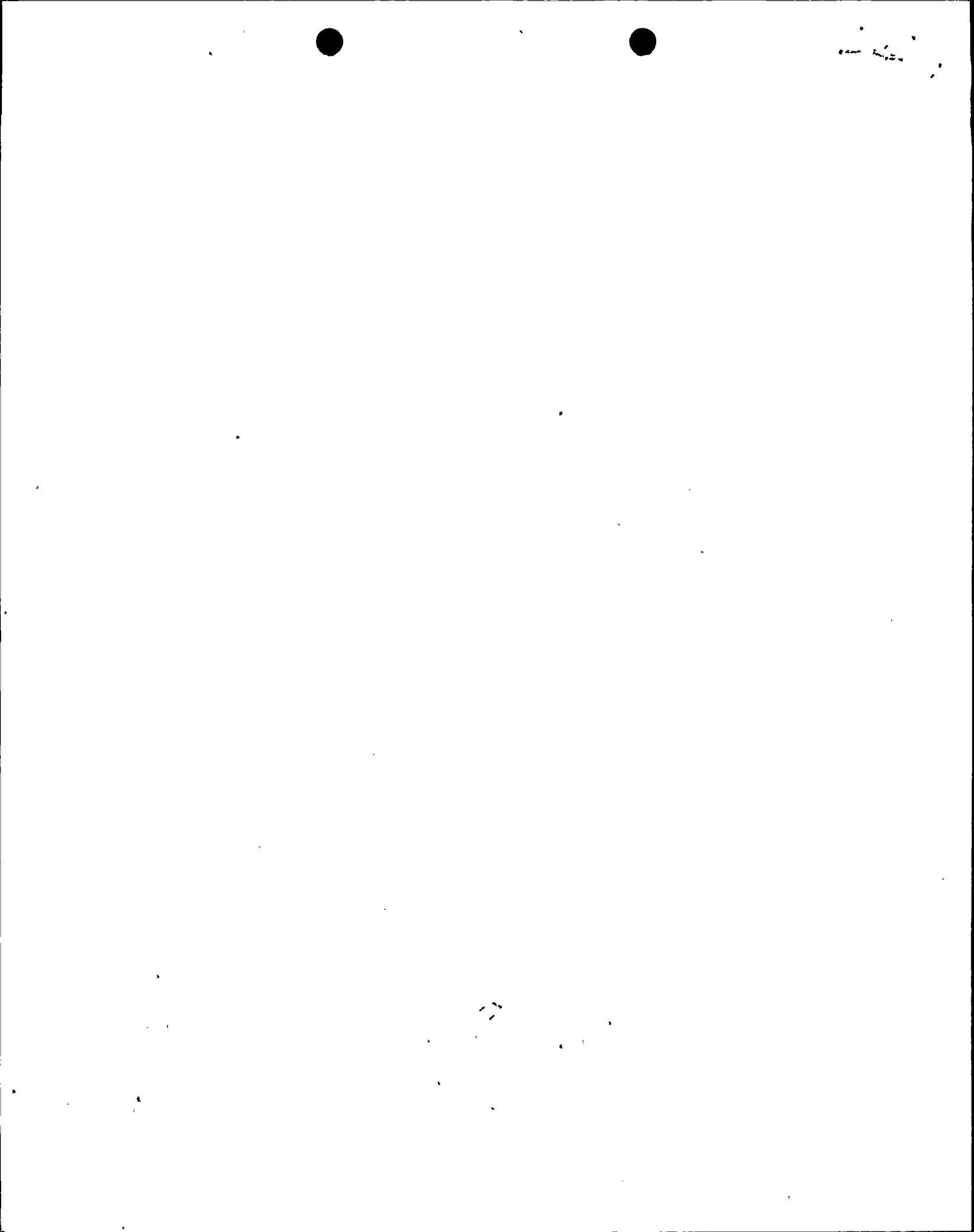
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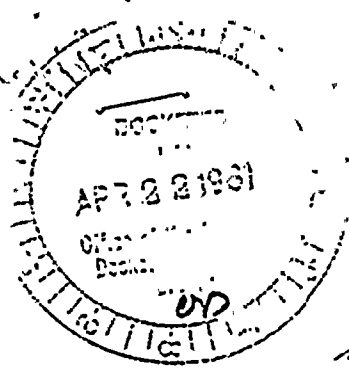

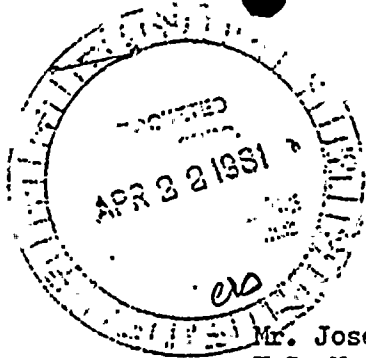
Dear Mr. Hendric,

Technological advances in conversion of solar energy into electrical, space and water heating are making solar power a logical, safe, and economical means of collecting and using energy.

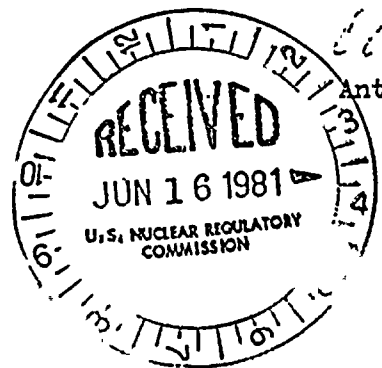

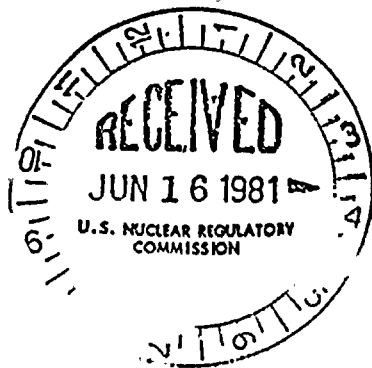
Because of severe seismic problems, Diablo Canyon is the most poorly-sited nuclear plant in the world. It should not be issued any kind of operating license.

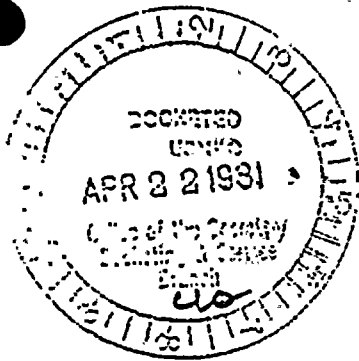

I hope that my letter has not arrived too late for the hearings on the licensing of Diablo Canyon Nuclear Power Plant. I have been questioning the safety of this facility since my son took a course in Oceanography at UC Santa Cruz in 1973. He convinced me that/lying less than three miles away from the Hosgri fault,

an earthquake from the fault could deliver motion to the area about ten times stronger than the plant was originally designed to endure.

I am also concerned about the storage of the waste material. I do not believe that proper waste storage methods have been devised yet to protect the citizenry in the case of a nuclear accident or even under normal conditions.

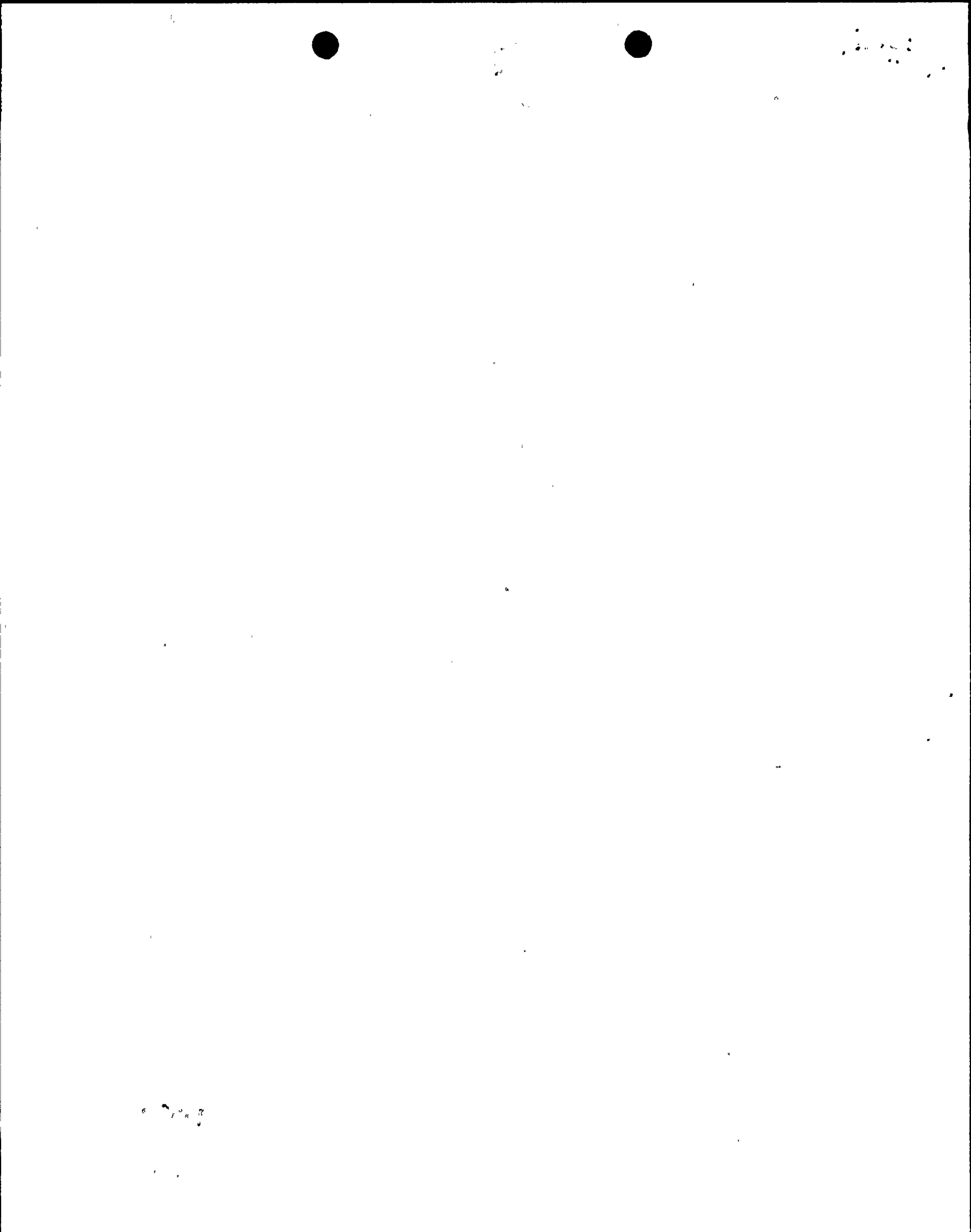

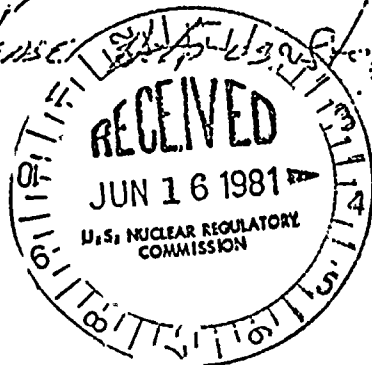
MR. HENDRIX,

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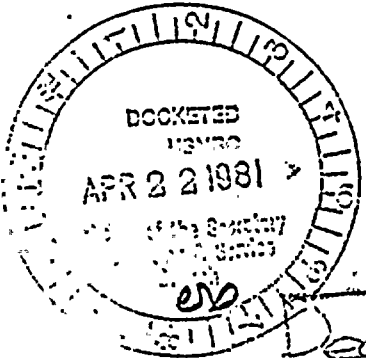

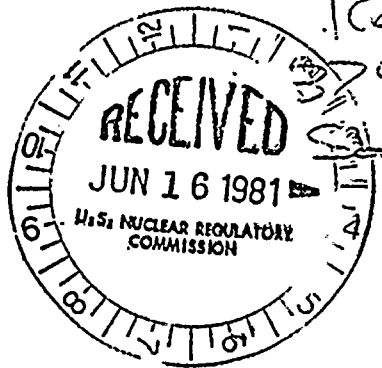

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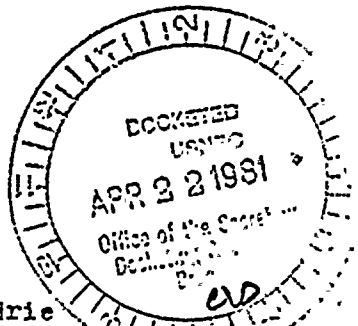

Dear Mr. Hendrie:

The issue of nuclear power is of vital concern to me and my family, and it scares me to death to think that the Diablo Canyon nuclear power plant may be operating just north of us in the near future. I am a 36 year old junior high school teacher, and I am concerned about the potential harm that nuclear power could do (and is doing) to ourselves and our children.

First of all, I am amazed that you would even consider letting the licensing go ahead without a public hearing. Such procedures are among the cornerstones of our democratic process. I hope we can count upon you not to knuckle under to big business pressures and to let the people have their input. They, after all, will be the ones affected the most by your actions.

My second concern is environmental. I recently heard a program on KPFK, 90.7 FM Pacifica radio, about the effects of the TMI nuclear power plant on animal and plant life, after the plant started operation and before the March 1979 accident!! Births of all kinds of animals were affected; a farm that had hatched several hundred ducklings hatched only one deformed duckling the year after the plant began operation. Cattle were born with bones so soft that one fall could completely crush a hip joint. The animals then had to be destroyed.

If being exposed to radiation does this to animals, what is it going to do to humans? It will be especially lethal to our children!! How can we let these kinds of things go on happening???

In addition, there are other problems that many of us are concerned about; Location of a power plant near an earthquake fault and disposal of nuclear wastes are only two of the most pressing problems.

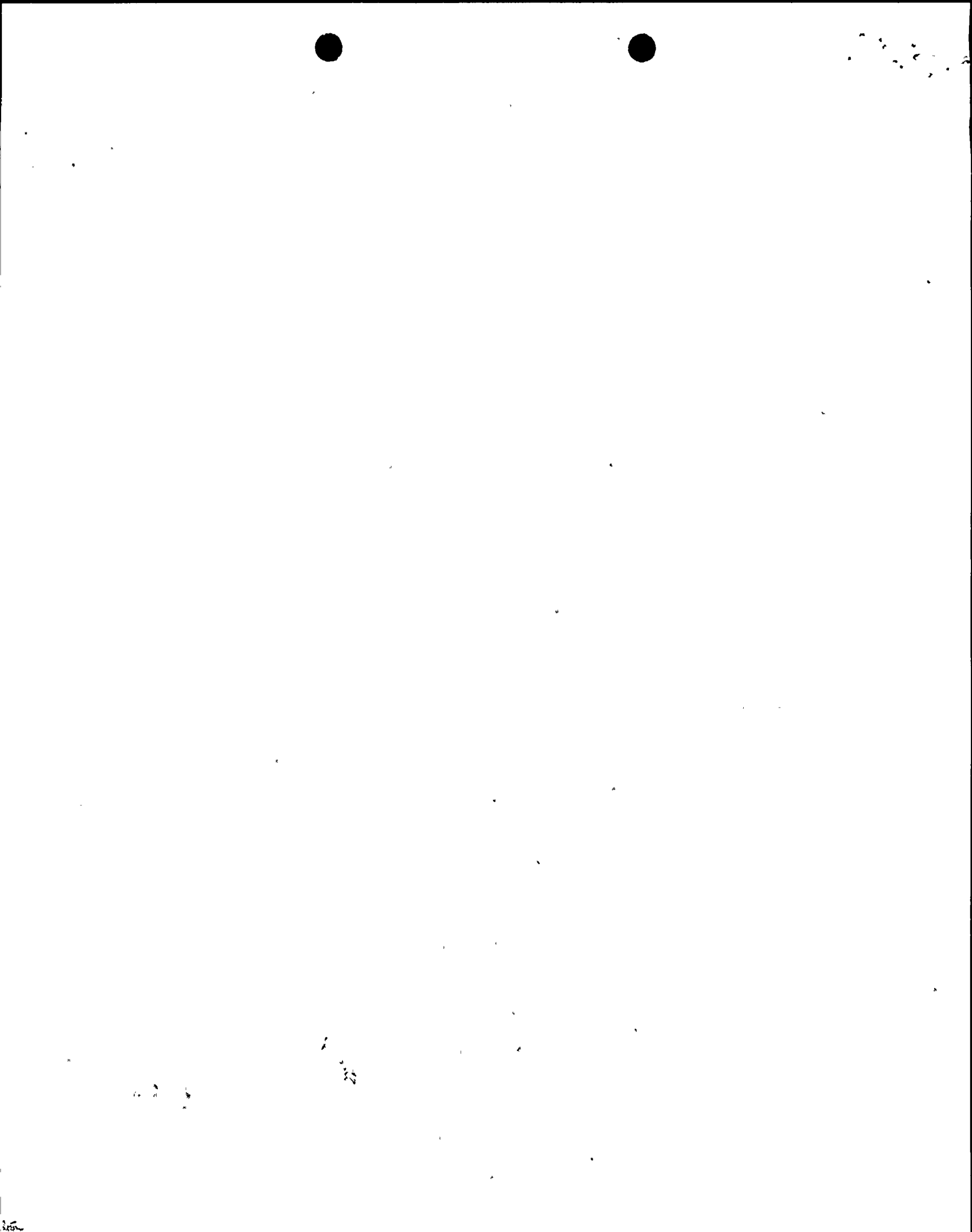
PLEASE... until these major problems have been resolved, do not license Diablo Canyon.

And please... let the public hearings take place.



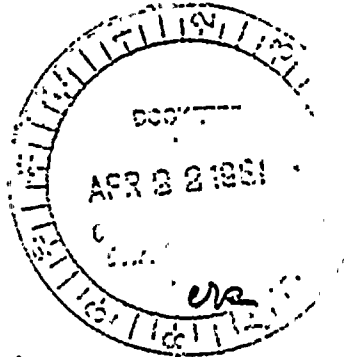

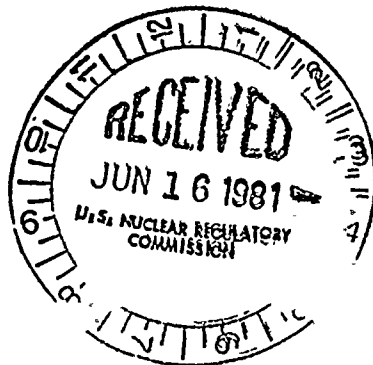

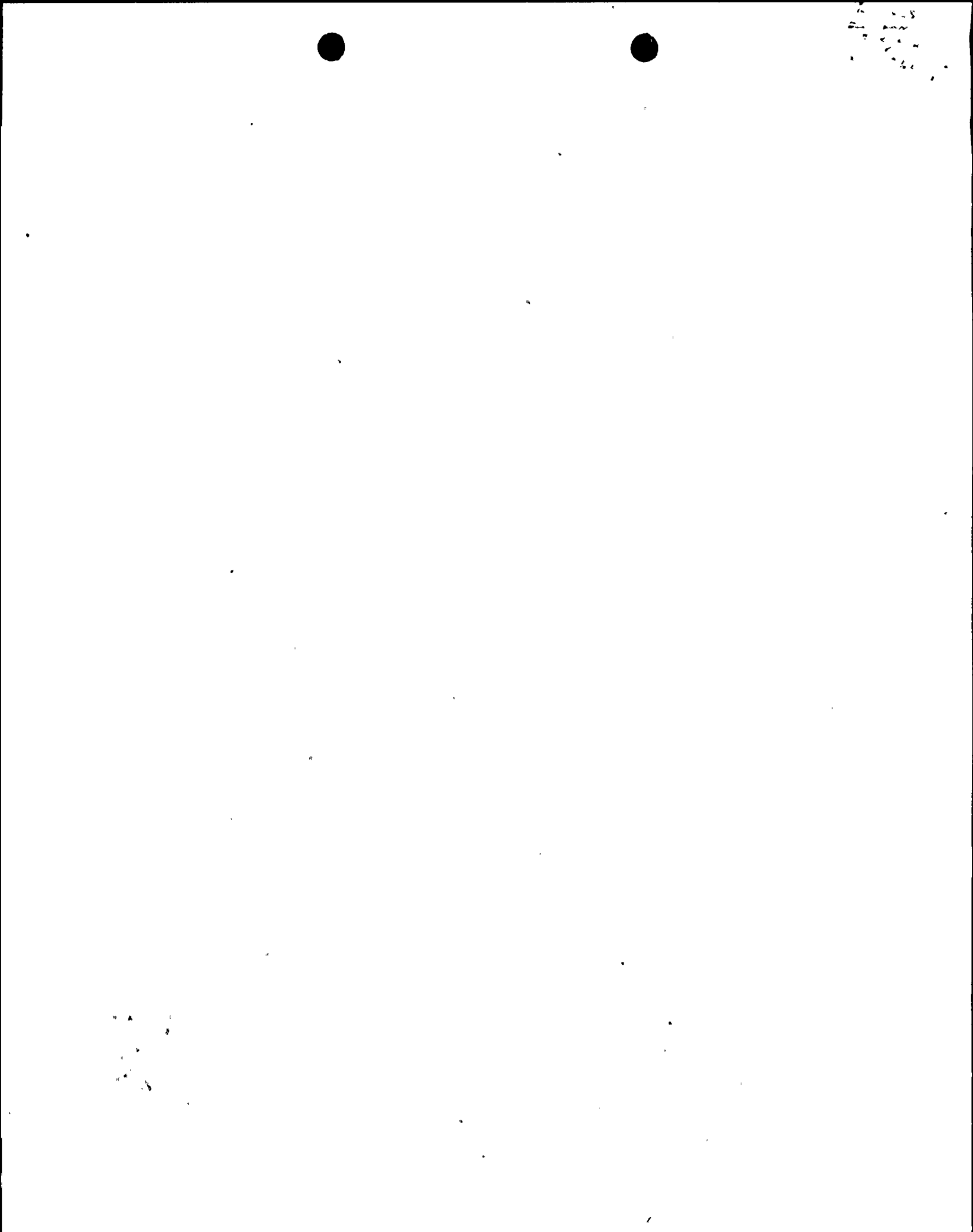
The purpose of this letter is to inform you of my vigorous opposition to the licensing of the Diablo Canyon Nuclear Power Plant. This facility is located only 3 miles from an active earthquake fault and it is doubtful that present technology can make it strong enough to survive a possible major quake. Such a quake would probably render major (and minor) highways impassable and the population of the entire area would be placed in serious jeopardy. At the present time there is no evacuation plan (such a plan would have to take earthquake effects into account) nor have the P.G. + E. engineers been able to convince this community that their plant is (or could be made) safe from a major quake.

The basic question of opening the plant should certainly be decided before any low-level testing is allowed. I implore you to hear all arguments "in toto" before coming to a decision. Do not make this community or any other community pay for P.G. and E's mistakes with its life.

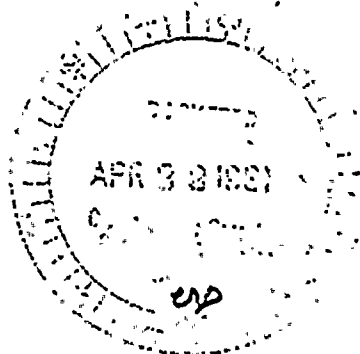

Those who debate nuclear power issues are frequently required to deal on very scientific and highly technical bases; however, with respect to Diablo Canyon power plant, Mother Nature lifts the burden of technical argumentation from the peoples' shoulders: discussion of licensing a nuclear power plant lying three miles from an earthquake fault is irresponsible, under any circumstances.

Furthermore, attempts to dismantle ill-conceived federal and state programs have, by and large, been unsuccessful: the costs of dismantling such projects are enormous and highly inaccessible. This waste of unreplenishable public funds should be stopped before Diablo Canyon power plant and its dangers become irreversible.

Among other issues, I implore you to address the problems of nuclear waste. And yet this request is obviously futile: experts and scientists inform us that no safe means of dispensing and storing nuclear waste exist.

Not surprisingly, I disagree with your current position to license the Diablo Canyon nuclear power plant.

The N.R.C. should risk loss of face rather than the loss of lives.

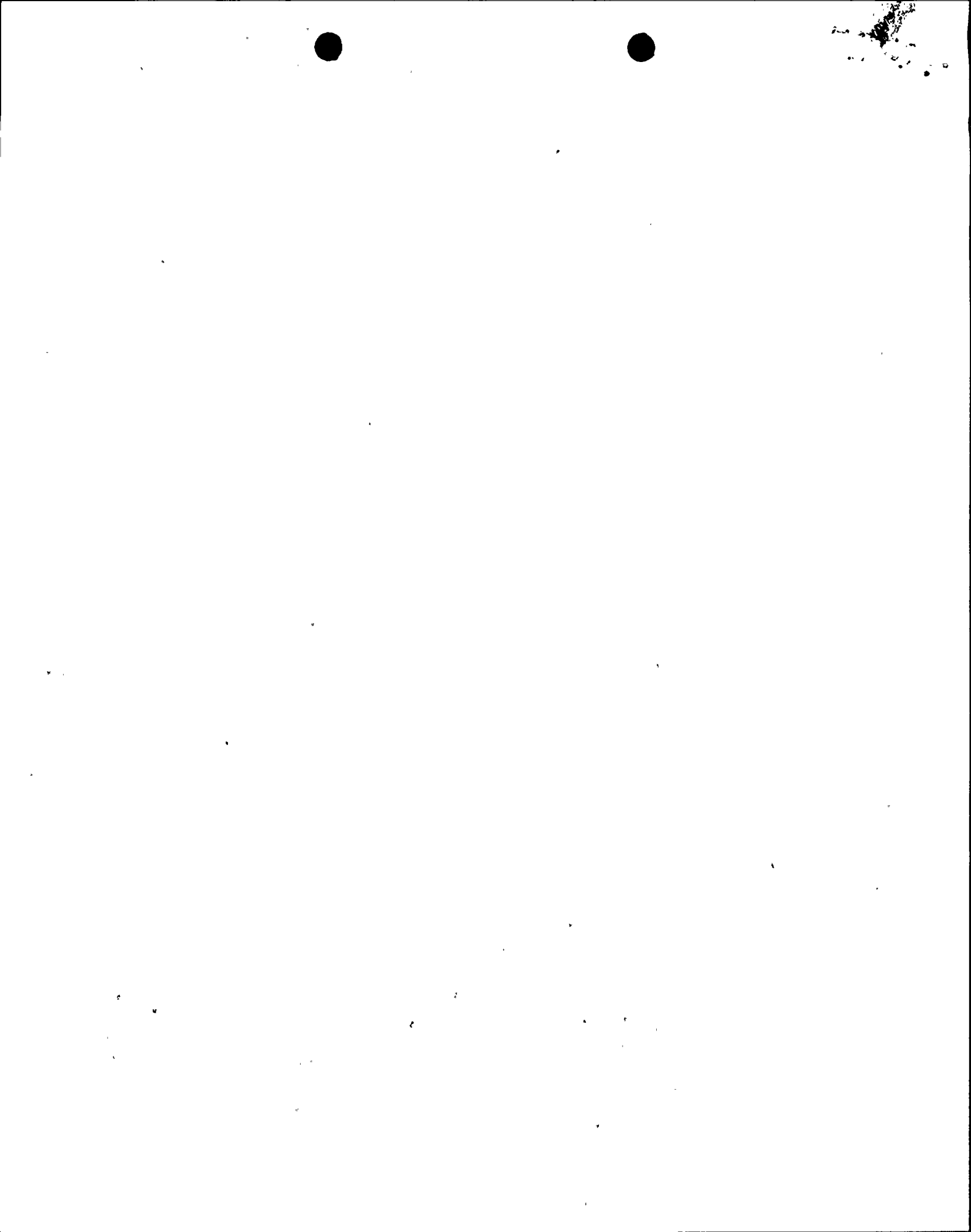

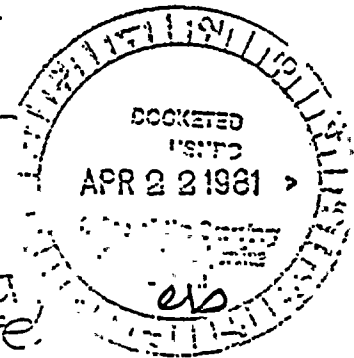
