
Dear Mr. Knighton:

This letter is to inform you that the low temperature over-pressure protection system on Unit 2 has been installed and start up testing has been completed. The system has been installed at both Units 1 and 2 to address PGandE's commitments stated in SSER 6 (Section 5.2.2). As stated in SSER 27, the NRC has reviewed the Diablo Canyon Unit 1 and 2 low temperature overpressure protection systems and concluded that the systems met the requirements of Reactor Systems Branch position RSB 5-2 and are, therefore, acceptable.

The system which uses the pressurizer power operated relief valves (PORVs) for pressure mitigation is enabled by the control room operator when the reactor coolant system (RCS) temperature is at 323°F and activates whenever the RCS pressure exceeds 450 psig and the RCS temperature is below 323°F. All components of the system meet seismic Category 1 and IEEE 279 criteria.
