Dear Ms. Bladey:

The U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission received a license application for Waste Control Specialists LLC on April 28, 2016. By this application, WCS requested authorization to construct and operate a Consolidated Interim Storage Facility for spent nuclear fuel at WCS's facility in Andrews County, Texas. If approved and licensed, the CISF would store up to 5,000 metric tons uranium for a 40-year license period. The WCS has expressed intent to store up to eight times that amount in the CISF.

I am writing to urge the NRC to deny the permit to have high-level radioactive waste, the most dangerous of all radioactive materials, transported and stored in Texas. High-level radioactive waste is a risk too great to be transported through the state of Texas. It is unprecedented and poses a huge threat to our future generations. The potential for terrorist threats increases largely due to the storage of this hazardous material.

No other state wants high-level radioactive waste, so why should Texas? The risk is simply too great. Thank you for your consideration in this matter.
