DISCLOSURE THE FEBRUARY 1, 2017, WESTINGHOUSE ELECTRIC
COMPANY (WESTINGHOUSE), SUBMISSION

Dear Mr. Gresham:

By letter dated February 1, 2017 (Agencywide Documents Access and Management System Package Accession No. ML17039B061), Westinghouse submitted an affidavit dated January 30, 2017, executed by J. A. Gresham, requesting that the information contained in the following document be withheld from public disclosure pursuant to Title 10 of the *Code of Federal Regulations* (10 CFR), Part 2, Section 2.390:

PWROG-16043-P; Revision 2, "PWROG Program to Address NRC Information Notice 2012-09: 'Irradiation Effects on Fuel Assembly Spacer Grid Crush Strength' For Westinghouse and CE PWR Fuel Designs"

A non-proprietary version of the document can be found at ADAMS Accession No. ML17045A466.

Westinghouse detailed the reasons for withholding the information in the affidavit.

The NRC staff has reviewed your application and the material in accordance with the requirements of 10 CFR 2.390 and, on the basis of the statements in the affidavit, has determined that the submitted information sought to be withheld contains proprietary commercial information and should be withheld from public disclosure.

Therefore, the version of the submitted information marked as proprietary will be withheld from public disclosure under 10 CFR 2.390(b)(5) and Section 103(b) of the Atomic Energy Act of 1954, as amended.

Withholding from public inspection shall not affect the right, if any, of persons properly and directly concerned to inspect the documents. If the need arises, the agency may send copies of this information to its consultants working in this area. The NRC staff will, of course, ensure that the consultants have signed the appropriate agreements for handling proprietary information.

If the basis for withholding this information from public inspection should change in the future such that the information could then be made available for public inspection, you should promptly notify the NRC staff.
