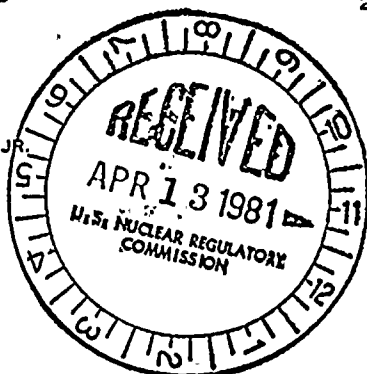

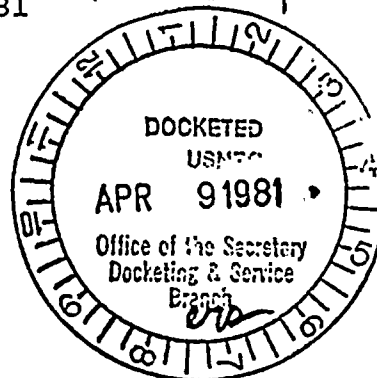

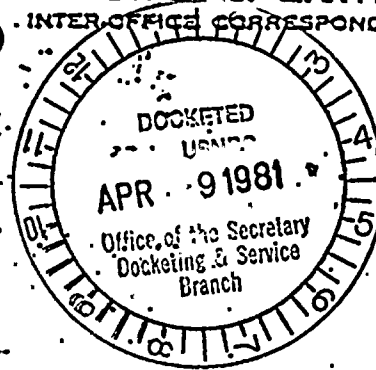

A meeting was held in Mr. Breedlove's office this morning, October 13th, with Mr. Bathen and Carl Porter of the R. W. Beck & Company, along with Commissioner Lee Nelson from Fort Pierce, who was accompanied by Milton Davis, City Manager, and Bob Skinner, Distribution Engineer, and Mr. Breedlove, Mr. Browning and myself.

Discussed by the group was the tie that had been negotiated for emergency and scheduled service the first of this year with the City of Fort Pierce.

The reason for additional discussion was that recently the City had difficulties with their generation and some of the generators were off for as much as 30 hours. The emergency tie line was to our 69 Kv line at 29th and Virginia Avenue from the Rhode Island substation. We were able to supply Fort Pierce at the time of the interruption with approximately 10, 000 or 11, 000 Kw.

Now, the City, because this temporary line is built, is very desirous of making it a permanent tie. This tie would not be satisfactory so far as the writer is concerned because our system would not be adequately protected and would not be practical to parallel or synchronize into the city's, nor could we control the supply when we could not afford to supply them.

Since this request has a lot of electrical ramifications, we told them, the City Manager and City Engineer, we would discuss this with our planning group and would advise them; but we felt compliance with the agreement would be the only way we could practically serve them when power was desired and when power was available.

During the discussion it was brought out that on November 2 their 33 megawatt unit would have to be out of service for approximately 2½ weeks due to maintenance and overhaul. They are very anxious to utilize this tie for at least this emergency, making service available to the Rhode Island substation a supply of approximately 12 megawatts.





The matter of firm power was discussed but we told them we were not interested in supplying firm power at this time.

Mr. Bathen brought up the question of a national discussion regarding displacement of nuclear power. We told him we would not discuss nor make any comments at this time; that this matter was under discussion in higher circles and when we had any knowledge we would advise him. He, in behalf of Fort Pierce, is thinking of displacement in the amount of 40 megawatts.

It was interesting to note that last year's peak at Fort Pierce was 45 megawatts and that they are growing and planning on the basis of 12% compounded per year. In other words, by 1985 they expect to have 250,000 Kw demand.

There were a number of other side-play remarks but, while they were a part of this discussion, were not important enough to comment.

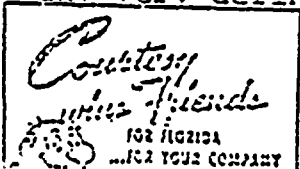

Mr. Bathen opened the meeting by reviewing the proposed tie with the City of Fort Pierce as outlined in the agreement presented to them several months ago. Mr. Bathen inquired as to the possibility of making the temporary 69 KV line, with necessary refinements, a permanent connection with the #1 substation, which is located at 25th Street and Rhode Island Avenue. This is the substation served during the recent power failure experienced by the City of Fort Pierce. Mr. Bathen also mentioned a parallel tie for an undetermined period of time.

Mr. Bathen was informed by me that we could not plan on using the temporary line for any given length of time, and that this line was not normally energized. Also, we did not know what our General Engineer Section had in mind as far as future usage was concerned.

At this point during the conference, everyone except Mr. Nelson, understood the difficulty, waste of man hours, and equipment, to make the necessary arrangements at #1 substation. Mr. Nelson's view seemed to be that since Florida Power & Light had made it clear that we would help Fort Pierce only on an "if power was available" basis, that they, the City, should not spend money to make the temporary tie permanent and not have assurance against power failures. There were various comments exchanged as to what additions would be required to make the temporary connections suitable for parallel operation, what the cost would be, how much could be salvaged and transferred to a future connection point on the Fort Pierce-St. Lucie 69/138 KV line without any very definite conclusion being reached.

The point of the Conference seemed to be to influence Florida Power & Light to accept a substation connection scheme that would give the City the benefits of the contracted for arrangement, but permit the City to defer or save permanently the cost of a transmission line and switching station. It seemed to me that if the temporary connection was made permanent and connected for parallel operation, the contracted for plan would be permanently abandoned and there would be pressure to place the future 138/69 KV transformation in Florida Power & Light's Fort Pierce substation; although this was not discussed.

The City asked how long they could keep the temporary normally opened, emergency connection. They were told as long as necessary provided that they proceeded in good faith to follow through under their contract with Florida Power & Light to construct the transmission line and switching station.

They requested power during an upcoming unit overhaul, November 2, for two and one half weeks. They were advised that this would have to be coordinated with our maintenance and overhaul schedules, and that we would advise them later.

Mr. Batten questioned us about the availability of nuclear power from our Hutchison Island Plant. He was informed that we were unable to discuss or make any comment as to power from the nuclear plant at this time.

There were several other minor topics of discussion. None other than the ones mentioned above were significant enough to mention.

Mr. Ernie Settle, Chairman of the Utilities Authority, recently made a verbal request to Al Zinni for a meeting with FP&L to discuss the Authority purchasing generating capacity from St. Lucie # 2.

Mr. Settle, Al Zinni, and I met yesterday morning to discuss the Authority's inquiry. The following is a summarization of Mr. Settle's remarks:

St. Pierce is now adding a steam generating unit which was originally supposed to handle their needs through 1982. It now appears that they will have capacity problems as early as 1978.

The present plant site is inadequate for further expansion. Therefore, the Authority is now faced with a rather urgent need to enter into a site study contract at a cost of from \$300,000 to \$400,000.

Prior to doing this, Mr. Settle feels the Authority should consider other alternatives - one of which would be purchasing capacity from St. Lucie # 2. He has read the law on this and is aware of the Authority's rights to intervene. He stated he has no intention of intervening, but would very much like to explore such a purchase with us.

It is both his and their consultant's (Reynold, Smith & Hill) opinion that purchasing additional capacity from us will not prove feasible. However, he feels he would be derelict in his responsibilities if he did not make at least a superficial investigation into this alternative.

We discussed the relative costs of nuclear vs. fossil fuel plants and differences in lead time requirements. He gave me some background information on the origination of the Authority and some of their problems.
