SUBJECT: TURKEY POINT UNITS 3 AND 4 - REQUESTS FOR WITHHOLDING INFORMATION FROM PUBLIC DISCLOSURE (CAW-90-062, CAW-90-103, CAW-90-104, CAW-90-105, AND CAW-90-106)

By your applications dated August 22, 1990 and December 20, 1990 and affidavits dated August 23, 1990 and December 19, 1990, which were updated with applications and affidavits dated April 2, 1991, you submitted the following documents and requested that they be withheld from public disclosure pursuant to 10 CFR 2.790:

1. WCAP-8687, Supplement 2-E69A, Rev. 0, "Equipment Qualification Test Report, Eagle 21 Process Protection System (Environmental and Seismic Testing)";
2. WCAP-10271-P-A, Supplement 2, Rev. 1, "Evaluation of Surveillance Frequencies and Out of Service Times for the Reactor Protection Instrumentation System";
3. WCAP-11733, "Noise, Fault, Surge, and Radio Frequency Interference Test Report for Westinghouse Eagle 21 Process Protection Upgrade System";
4. WCAP-12374, "Eagle-21 Microprocessor-Based Process Protection System";
5. WCAP-12632, Rev. 2, "RTD Bypass Elimination Licensing Report for Turkey Point Units 3 and 4"; and
6. WCAP-12641, "Median Signal Selector for Westinghouse 7100 Series Process Instrumentation Interfacing with Eagle 21 Protection System for Florida Power and Light."

By letter dated April 2, 1991, you also submitted revised copies of the authorization letters for the above reports.

You stated that the submitted information should be considered exempt from mandatory public disclosure for the following reasons:

1. The information sought to be withheld from public disclosure is owned and has been held in confidence by Westinghouse;
2. The information is of a type customarily held in confidence by Westinghouse and not customarily disclosed to the public;

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- 3. The information sought to be protected is not available in public sources; and
- 4. Public disclosure of the information sought to be withheld is likely to cause substantial harm to the competitive position of Westinghouse because it would enhance the ability of competitors to provide similar analytical documentation and licensing defense services for commercial power reactors without commensurate expenses.

We have reviewed your applications and the material in accordance with the requirements of 10 CFR 2.790 and, on the basis of your statements, have determined that the submitted information sought to be withheld contains proprietary commercial information.

Therefore, the above listed reports marked as proprietary will be withheld from public disclosure pursuant to 10 CFR 2.790(b)(5) and Section 103(b) of the Atomic Energy Act, as amended.

Withholding from public disclosure shall not affect the right, if any, of persons properly and directly concerned to inspect the documents. If the need arises, we may send copies of this information to our consultants working in this area. We will, of course, ensure that the consultants have signed the appropriate agreements for handling proprietary information.

If the basis for withholding this information from public inspection should change in the future such that the information could then be made available for public inspection, you should promptly notify the NRC. You should also understand that the NRC may have cause to review this determination in the future, for example, if the scope of a Freedom of Information Act request includes your information. In all review situations, if the NRC makes a determination adverse to the above, you will be notified in advance of any public disclosure.
