SUBJECT: REQUEST FOR CONSENT TO DIRECT LICENSE TRANSFER

Dear Mr. Garnett:

By letter dated February 6, 2018 Jay County Hospital, submitted to the U. S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) a Request for Consent to Direct License Transfer of NRC Materials Licenses issued to Indiana University Health Jay, Inc. The affected license noted in that letter was License No. 13-20329-01.

Based on the information provided, we understand that as a result of the agreement of Jay County Hospital and Indiana University, Inc. We further understand that this transfer will not result in any change to the licensee's name, licensed materials, persons using the license material, location of use of licensed material, or persons responsible for the licensee's radiation safety program. A request to change the name may be made when the notification of completion of transaction is submitted to the NRC.

Based on the above understandings and as more fully detailed in the enclosed NRC staff's Safety Evaluation Report which documents the NRC staff's review of the request, the NRC consents to the proposed indirect transfer of control. Please note that you will need to notify within 30 days, in writing, after the transaction has been finalized and include a signed copy of the final agreement confirming completion of the transaction. Please also include information to support other necessary changes such as a name change. With this information, we can issue an administrative amendment to your NRC license to reflect the transaction, if necessary. Please contact Daniel C. 
