Biweekly Notice; Applications and Amendments to Facility Operating Licenses and Combined Licenses Involving No Significant Hazards Considerations

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General Comment

Unfortunately, your notices in Sec. III reveal correlation with a pattern of racketeering that involved human test subject experimentation at a domestic violence shelter for women and children. This pattern was observed in the course of observing concurrent efforts to misrepresent necessary safety standards and policies connected to radiological safety and certifications in techniques used to inspect, among other places, nuclear energy facilities. Operating licenses are a significant concern, as is the role that those who are authorized to respond to an incident at or involving a nuclear facility provide in coordinating with other facilities. If such an "alarm" can be so readily apparent in this notice, then it behooves a thorough consideration of other factors involved with facility licenses and/or inclusion of specific entities in connection with assuring safety at nuclear facilities. I contend this IS a significant hazard and steps must be taken to forestall its perpetuation and reconfigure a recalibration so as to prevent this pattern's recurrence. A re-evaluation of the propriety of the January of 2017 Protective Action Guide Manual needs to be undertaken following an appropriate investigation into the processes by which select changes were decided upon. These changes are directly connected to events that have transpired since its publication and running up to its publication that demonstrate the means by which this pattern can be effectuated at an unacceptable level of risk. While the consequences of this pattern have thusfar been mostly experienced by people in sectors not directly connected to the United States nuclear energy program, the high-stakes and high-risk speculation that has occurred in conjunction with this strategy is directly implicated and evident in this very bi-weekly announcement. It behooves an immediate reconsideration and an appropriate contextualization of the September of 2011 Radiological/Nuclear Law Enforcement and Public Health Investigation Handbook.
